WORSHIP AND MUSIC

As the month of March begins, we find ourselves in the middle of the Lenten Season. Lent, as you may know, is 40 days in length (the same length of time Jesus was in the wilderness) minus Sundays' which are always celebrated as days of resurrection. As Jesus continued to set his face towards Jerusalem, where he will suffer and die for us, we invite you to stay strong in your worship and devotional life.

Palm/Passion Sunday is on March 20th. Our service will begin with the procession of palm remembering Jesus' entry into the city of Jerusalem during which he was first hailed as king. Our children will bless us in this worship service as they sing a song. The mood of the service soon changes as we hear the passion narrative read.

On Maundy Thursday our worship service will be held at 7:00 p.m. During this service we recall how Jesus gathered with his disciples to celebrate the Passover meal, but then changed it by saying that the bread was his broken body and the cup his blood, given and poured out for all people for the forgiveness of sin.

Our Good Friday service will be held at 10:30 a.m. Did you hear Jesus speaking from the Cross? Do you understand what love he has for you? Please join us on Friday for this special service.

Easter worship will be held at 6:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. Get ready to rejoice! Death does not will, Christ has Risen.

WHERE SHOULD I GIVE MY GIFT? MEMORIAL FUND OR ENDOWMENT FUND?

There is no right or wrong answer to this question. But you should be aware that each fund has its own purpose. The memorial fund is used to buy or replace items that are used in the church or grounds of the church. For example, the following are items that have been purchased through the gifts made to the memorial fund: new communion linens or communion ware, banners, the hanging cross, bibles, the pew pads, and bell chimes. We are very appreciative of the gifts made to the memorial account.

The Endowment fund has a difference purpose. The principal of the gifts made to the Endowment Fund are never used. Therefore, when one gives to this fund, your gifts last forever as only the interest earned is spent. The fund has specific ministries that are supported by the gifts. These include grants offered for those pursuing a career in ministry, the support of Lutheran ministries locally and worldwide, the enhancement of ministries in the local community and /or congregation, the support of non-Lutheran charities, and to assist with extraordinary events within or congregation. Many who have made it a practice sharing their faith through their lifelong financial stewardship like to give to this fund so that their gifts live on and serve God even after their death.

DELIVER US

We sing and say "hosanna" every Palm Sunday but hardly ever in between. So what does that word mean?

That first Palm Sunday, crowds spread their cloaks before Jesus as people had before Jehu to proclaim him king (2 Kings 9:13). They waved palm branches in greeting — a traditional sign of celebration (Leviticus 23:40). And, of course, they shouted, "Hosanna!"

This was an exclamation of "a people in distress [addressing] their king or their god," explains Bible scholar William Barclay. Drawn from Psalm 118:25, *hosanna* is Aramaic for "save now." By the time of Jesus' Triumphal Entry into Jerusalem, Barclay says, *hosanna* may have "become to some extent only a cry of welcome and of acclamation, like 'Hail!'; but essentially it is a people's cry for deliverance and for help in the day of their trouble."

"Hosanna!" is the plea of an oppressed people to the one they recognize as their true king: Jesus, their Savior.

HAPPY TO HELP

The International Day of Happiness is observed on March 20 (also the first day of spring this year; coincidence?). Jesus said we'll be happy (or "blessed") when we're meek, merciful, pure and so on (see his Beatitudes in Matthew 5:3-12). In other words, happiness results from putting others' needs above our own.

Research confirms that helping others boosts people's self-esteem, forges strong friendships, offers a sense of belonging and purpose, decreases stress, increases gratitude and sparks others to "pay it forward." In fact, University of Texas researchers found that the "activism cure" is a great way to overcome bouts of sadness. So get helping — and get happy!

THE ORIGIN OF "EASTER"

It's not certain where the word *Easter*, which never appears in Scripture, originates. In some places, the day is called Pasch, which comes from "Passover," the festival during which Jesus was crucified. Others call it Resurrection Sunday.

Some scholars think the church absorbed the word *Easter* from pagan roots, because the goddess of spring, Eostre, was celebrated about the same time as Passover.

Others suggest the word derives from an old Latin phrase referring to the white robes traditionally worn by people being baptized on the Sunday that celebrates Jesus' resurrection.

Motorcycle Mass

Seminarian Paul Theiss is serving an internship at Trinity, Towanda with a special assignment to do mission work in Susquehanna County. In an effort to do something new and creative, he is planning a "Motorcycle Mass" for the weekend of June 25.

The idea began with Pr. Gunnar Sigurjónsson, a Lutheran pastor and friend in Iceland, who for the past 9 years has been opening his church to the Motorcycle community in his country. In honor of his 10th year Pr. Sigurjónsson suggested coming to NEPA to begin a motorcycle Mass here! So he and a group of Icelanders will come this June to help lead and guide the Motorcycle Mass.

This effort has received tremendous help and leadership from Joseph Snyder, who is part of the worshipping community at Trinity, and who is the founder and president of the Rolling Souls Motorcycle club. He has connected with Rev. Abner Fuentes, a pastor at Maná Family Worship Center in East Stroudsburg, who is also President and founder of the Least Of Saints MC Pocono PA Chapter.

The vision and hope is that this will be a worship-centered event focused on bringing people together in the name of Jesus to break down walls and stereotypes: from minorities to ecumenical, cultural, or marginalized peoples. Planned for the weekend of June 25-26, the event will include music, food, and fellowship, all centered around the worship and praise of God.

Found Money!



The synod was notified some time ago that it might have money sitting in "abandoned" accounts. There is a form to fill out after finding the information on line. It was not really difficult to do, and in the late fall of 2015 the synod received a check for a total of almost \$11,000 from four different accounts.

Rostered leaders often suggest to their congregation that when nonbudgeted income is received, the congregation give a tithe to some mission outside of the congregation. This is to set an example for individuals to tithe in the same way.

In conversation with the Bishop and synod treasurer Dave Hinrichs, it was decided that the synod would tithe \$1,100 to Lutheran Congregational Services for Refugee Resettlement . The rest of the money was invested in the synod's Student Education Fund.

Environmental Advocacy

The original roof at St. James, Pitman was built in 1944. Because of a leak in the roof In 2007, the congregation spent more that year for heating bills than for mission support; and the congregation met downstairs for worship in the cold winter months to save on heat. An Energy Task Force was formed to deal with the situation. The members of the task force were Jim and Josh Heper, John Melick, and Jim Deeben.

As a result of their efforts a new, heavily insulated roof was installed; the old heating system was replaced with a modern, more efficient one; and the old stained glass windows were covered with a protective shield to provide insulation. A future project is to investigate the use of energy saving lighting throughout the church.

This past year a new natural gas pipeline from Canada was proposed. The issued generated a lot of controversy in the Mahantongo Valley. The proposed route was to pass as close as 700 feet from the home of one Task Force member. As a result, the Task Force, along with the pastor and some others members of St. James, attended fact finding meetings and gave testimony in opposition to the plan. One Sunday afternoon during the controversy, these leaders conducted a walking tour of the valley using scripture that related to their rural environment.

A resolution opposing the pipeline was brought to two local council township meetings; and even though both resolutions were defeated, the task force and members of St. James have been "energized" by their advocacy. The proposed pipeline is to be built starting sometime in 2016.

The Lehigh Mission District is privileged to host three major institutions of our Church – Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Network, Muhlenberg College, and Lutheran Congregational Services. Over the past few months, we've highlighted Good Shepherd and Muhlenberg. This month we'll take a brief look at what it means to share in the mission and ministry of Lutheran Congregational Services (LCS).

LCS's roots can be traced to 1971 when congregations of the Eastern Pennsylvania Synod formed Lutheran Chaplaincy Services of the Lehigh Valley to provide pastoral care and visitation to persons confined in hospitals, nursing homes and local institutions. Lutheran Services of the Lehigh Valley became Lutheran Congregational Services in 1999 as a reflection of the broad spectrum of ministries and services provided. In 2010, LCS joined Liberty Lutheran Services, a larger "umbrella" Social Ministry Organization with its roots in southeast Pennsylvania, thereby economizing costs and expanding our reach beyond the Lehigh Valley and northeast PA.

Throughout our history, LCS has maintained a mission to support and serve congregations and communities with flexibility focusing on areas of greatest needs. LCS is committed to faithfully responding to and supporting those in crisis or need. Over 45 years, LCS has provided a wide variety of programs including the grief groups, teen suicide prevention, refugee resettlement, ministries with those who are deaf, substance abuse education, disaster response, Lay Eucharistic Visitor training, Marriage Preparedness classes, distributing surplus household goods, and more.

Today, LCS provides education and facilitates collaboration and coordination of ministries that strengthen human relationships and build capacity to serve the most vulnerable in our congregations and communities. In 2012, LCS, through its connection to Lutheran Children and Family Service in the Liberty family, became the sole refugee resettlement service provider in the Lehigh Valley. Currently, LCS welcomes approximately 100 refugees per year from around the world and most recently, from Syria, with the assistance and generosity of congregational and community volunteers.

LCS accompanies congregations and communities in response to crisis and disaster as the local affiliate for Lutheran Disaster Response. We support teams serving children who have survived disasters in partnership with Camp Noah, a program run by Lutheran Social Services of Minnesota. On behalf of the ELCA, we have been piloting a new program of Disaster Spiritual Partners who reach out to communities and congregational leaders to accompany the congregation's response to the crises within their own community.

We continue to offer programming like Lay Eucharistic Visitor Training, Marriage Preparedness Series, Workshops for Confirmands, and our Share Our Surplus Warehouse ministry. With a small staff and a nimble structure, LCS relies on volunteers and support from congregations and individuals to share the love of God through our ministries and programs. Thank you for your ongoing support. We look forward to the new things God is doing through our ministries bringing life and hope to the most vulnerable in our communities.
