

Dear Friends,



No doubt as we head into the month of November, many will begin to feel the Christmas pressure. Already in mid-October, Christmas decorations are up in stores and people are trying to figure out what gifts to buy for their loved ones. Many ask themselves: "What can I get them so they know

how much I love them and how special they are to me?" Many of us try to figure out how much money is enough money to spend on gifts.

As I think about this, I am reminded of the book of Micah. In the sixth chapter of the book, we see that the people were trying to figure out how to present themselves before God. They were wondering, 'how much offering is enough offering, to the point of raising the question: "Shall I come before him with burnt offerings, with calves a year old? Will the Lord be pleased with thousands of rams, with ten thousands of rivers of oil? Should I give my firstborn for all my transgression, the fruit of my body for the sin of my soul?" (Micah 6:6-7)

The answer to these questions comes in the next verse of Micah. "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (vs.8)

Perhaps as we enter this gift giving season, it would be good to remember that the greatest gift we can give is that of love, kindness, respect and justice. We do well to remember that God is the giver of all gifts and that we are called to love, respect and care for one another as though they were Christ himself.

As we approach the season of Advent where we wait upon the Lord, let us do a quick scan of our own lives. When Christ does come back, and he will, what will he see as he looks at our life and our interactions with others? Let us all strive to be people who do justice, love kindness and walk humbly with our God.



ABOUT THE LUTHERANS Martin Luther: Monk to Reformer

We live in an era when fame is highly desired. Whether it's getting hits on social media, getting invited to desirable gatherings, or making it big in Hollywood or Nashville, people want to be known, to be memorable—often for the wrong reasons. It's noteworthy, then, that in 2017 the Lutheran church—and the world—marks a big anniversary involving one of our own (our founder, actually). Martin Luther didn't intend to become famous, and yet he changed the world, helping to usher in the modern era.

This little sheet doesn't have room to detail Luther's life and accomplishments, and you will probably be hearing a lot about them from many sources, so this will just provide a brief overview.

Martin Luther was born in 1483 in what is now central Germany but then was a separate principality called Saxony. His parents tried to give him a good education and hoped he would become a lawyer. Instead, when he was twenty-one he became a Catholic monk. He wanted to earn God's love but was tormented by the sense that he could never be good enough. He punished himself mercilessly until finally a wise mentor sent him to study and teach Bible at the then new University of Wittenberg.



Not long after he arrived there, he became incensed by the church saying, in effect, that if people bought a certain document—an indulgence—it would provide God's forgiveness for their (or a loved one's) sins. Being a university professor, he wrote a list of ninety-five sentences to debate about the topic. That list, the Ninety-Five Theses, stirred up a hornet's nest in the church and began the Reformation. He made them public on October 31, 1517—coming up on five hundred years ago.

For challenging the church and refusing to back down, Luther was called

before the Holy Roman emperor, Charles V, at a meeting in the imperial city of Worms. Asked to take back what he had written, he refused and was declared an outlaw. Anyone could have captured him and killed him or turned him in to authorities, in which case his death was likely. Fortunately, his own prince protected him, hiding him out in a castle where he began translating the Bible into German. In the process, he helped create the standard German language.



Luther wrote many influential books, most of which are still valued today. He created the Small Catechism to guide ordinary people in learning about God. He wrote hymns such as "A mighty fortress is our God." He was a passionate, sometimes crudely mannered man, and in later life he wrote terrible, cruel things about the Jewish people, statements for which the Lutheran church has apologized.

Yet Luther was a remarkable man, helping to create the modern notion of what it means to be an individual, not just an atom in a sea of molecules, and, of course, reviving and reforming the church. He is a man worth celebrating!

Our October meeting was attended by 12 ladies. After reading our Purpose Statement we discussed upcoming events.

- The Thankoffering Service is scheduled for November 13. We were reminded to bring our Thankoffering jars to church and place on the baptismal font before service. Joyce will speak to the Pastor about talking about W-ELCA at our church over the years.
- Martha Lindenmuth told us the list of Food Bank Volunteers for 2017. Volunteers go to 6th and Chew Streets from 9:30 – 12, once a month, and can park in the visitor parking space or by the dumpster.
- Sandi Wagaman thanked Judy and Patty for attending the Ingathering meeting in September. The Ingathering will be on Wednesday, December 7, 10:30 a.m. at St. John's, Emmaus. A worship service follows the assembling of gifts. She also had a list of kids looking for gifts which need to be wrapped; baggies with names for Topton Home wish list which are \$10-\$20 gifts; other baggies that give \$ amount for gift. Deadline for gifts is December 4. At this time, W-ELCA members are scheduled to meet December 6th in the afternoon to sort items given for Ingathering.
- Treasurer's Report Our checking account balance is \$436.74. We discussed donating \$100 to Disaster Relief and giving \$75, 2x yearly to the NEPA Synod W-ELCA which is an increase of \$50/year.
- Our Fall Cluster Meeting on Emergency Preparedness was held on October 9 at St. Timothy's in Allentown. Roger Conrad presented a great program which was attended by 11 ladies.
- Our Bible Study was on Jesus and the Evil Eye: When God Blesses the Underserving by Meghan Johnston Aelabouni which was based on Matthew 20:1-16. Some takeaways:
 - As Luther reminds us, "daily bread" is not ours to restrict or deny to others because it is not dependent on how anyone has worked to earn or achieve it. Daily bread is God's gift to us and to all. When everyone has daily bread, the kingdom of God has become real and present among us.
 - What 'fairness' looks like is rarely simple because so many factors privilege some and disadvantage or exclude others.

• We are a church that proclaims that all people are saints and sinners alike; not one of us "deserves" the blessings of God. All is grace, freely given. When we talk about the God who gives grace unfairly to the underserving, let us not forget: *We are talking about ourselves*.

ALWAYS THANKFUL

Martin Rinkart, a German Lutheran minister, wrote the hymn "Now Thank We All Our God" in 1636. At the time, the Thirty Years' War was ravaging central Europe, claiming millions of lives. Rinkart served as pastor in Eilenburg, a walled town that became a crowded refuge for starving fugitives. Although Rinkart was struggling to provide for his own family, he opened his own home to people in need.

After the plague entered Eilenburg, Rinkart conducted up to 50 funerals a day — including services for his wife and the only other two pastors in town. Amid the despair, he wrote many hymns, including "Now Thank We All Our God." Originally intended as a table prayer, it's now sung at Thanksgiving to remember God's "countless gifts of love" — even during hardships.

WHERE IS THY STING?

Death's power is limited. It cannot eradicate memories or slay love. It cannot destroy even a threadbare faith or permanently hobble the smallest hope in God. It cannot permeate the soul and it cannot cripple the spirit. It merely separates us for a while. That is the only power death can claim — no more.


















Remember Our Veterans This Christmas

Reading Lutheran Parish God's Work. Our Hands. Sunday



On Sunday morning, September 11, members and rostered leaders of the Reading Lutheran Parish (RLP), a partnership of the 12 congregations and one synodically authorized worshipping community in Reading, came together to commemorate the 15th anniversary of the 2001 attacks and to participate in the ELCA's "God's Work. Our Hands." emphasis.

The day began with the Lutheran community supporting the Reading Fire Department in its annual remembrance of first responders who lost their lives on 9-11-2001. The Rev. Peggy Wuertele, ministry coordinator of the ELCA's Region 7, spoke about her memories of the day. At the time she served as a pastor in Queens. A joint RLP choir sang *Amazing Grace* just before 10:00 a.m., the time when a plane crashed into the second of the Twin Towers.

Following the Fire Department observance, nearly 200 Lutherans along with visitors from the community remained for a joint worship service. Pr. Wuertele's sermon focused on forgiveness in the midst of grief. The day of remembrance and service continued with a picnic lunch and several service projects, including the assembly of personal care kits for guests at Opportunity House, a local shelter. The day's offering was contributed to *The Battle of the Badges*, a scholarship program for children of police and fire fighters.

"Beer and Hymns" Brings Praise to Public Spaces

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Last November, historic Trinity Lutheran in downtown Reading began offering "Beer and Hymns" events at local pubs and restaurants. About every other month at various venues, participants gather together to sing songs of faith, share a meal, and raise a glass in the finest Lutheran tradition.

Hymn sheets are provided and various accompanists lead sets of 3-4 hymns, providing opportunities between sets for everyone to eat, drink and visit. There is no preaching or proselytizing at "Beer and Hymns".

Trinity's senior pastor, Alan Wolkenhauer, established a similar event with his previous congregation in Dunedin, Florida. He says that "Beer and Hymns" gives members an opportunity to invite friends, neighbors, and family members to experience a Christian community that is funloving, open and welcoming.

He has found that people are often more willing to invite and to accept an invitation to an event like "Beer and Hymns" than they would be for a typical church gathering. Events in Reading have averaged about 80 participants from over a dozen different churches, as well as guests who are unaffiliated with any church.

Pastor Wolkenhauer's favorite "Beer and Hymns" experience is that of a young gay man who said at an event in Florida, "I haven't been to church for over ten years and I thought that God hated me. Tonight was the first time in a very long time that I really experienced the love of God."

"Beer and Hymns" in Reading is co-sponsored by Trinity's covenant partner, Christ Episcopal Church. The next event: "Beer and Christmas Carols," will be held on Tuesday, December 13 at GNA Restaurant in West Reading. Muhlenberg College Community Engagement

Muhlenberg College's Office of Community Engagement (OCE) engages students, employees and local communities through partnerships intended to catalyze personal, institutional and community change. The OCE provides a central location on campus for coordinating work connecting communities including service-learning, community-based work-study, weekly volunteer programs, social justice/civic clubs, Civic Fellows, community-directed research projects, the Community Internship Program and community events on/off campus. With a focus on depth of engagement, students commit to 30 volunteer opportunities that occur on a weekly basis with 16 different community partners. Each year almost 300 students spend 20 hours or more in a given semester connecting with folks in local communities.

The 2015-2016 school year marked the College's 25th anniversary of its partnership with Jefferson Elementary School in Allentown. Over the last 25 years, the College has expanded its relationship with Jefferson from a Field Day and mentoring program to seven different during and after-school programs occurring throughout the year and many visits of Jefferson students to Muhlenberg's campus. Last year faculty in physics and biology partnered with Muhlenberg students and 4th graders at Jefferson Elementary on exciting campus based science experiments. Kids looked at invertebrates in fresh water stream samples, participated in physics experiments related to vision and dissected a sheep's eye. Each year third graders came to campus for College Connect to talk about future careers and push Muhlenberg students to also think about the future. Fifth graders work with students in Muhlenberg's Circus Workshop to tumble, juggle, clown, dance and imagine. Second graders will come to campus this year for a literacyfocused event and the entire school comes for Jefferson Field Day. With focused activities for each grade level and the entire school's attendance at Field Day, each child at Jefferson will come to Muhlenberg at some point during the year. With Muhlenberg students also working in classrooms and after-school programs at Jefferson, it is our hope that the students from both schools will continue to envision each space as part of their own educational experiences.

Mutually beneficial relationships between college students and community members enhance the lives of each. Answering the tough questions of elementary school children, connecting with people with whom you don't share a language and engaging cross-generationally teaches students invaluable lessons outside of the classroom. Similarly, important, is the work of challenging ourselves to reflect on our own social positions within local communities and consider the social structures that influence us. The OCE will continue to engage on and off-campus communities in reciprocal and change-driven ways.
