START DIGGING!

Scripture promises that God has a plan for our lives but also reveals that he wants us to <u>play</u> an active role in that plan. In 2 Kings 3, three kings band together to defeat Moab but end up in an 80-mile desert. Amid this dire situation, God commands the people, "Make this valley full of ditches" (verse 16, KJV) and promises to fill them with water — even though it won't rain.

Before the people's need was supplied, they had to <u>trust</u> <u>God</u> and act. The next morning, water filled every ditch they had dug. Plus, they were victorious in battle.



The takeaway? God will bring the blessing, but we may have to dig first!

THE MANNER OF GIVING: LOVINGLY

"If I give all I possess to the poor and surrender my body to the flames, but have not love, I gain nothing." -- I Corinthians 13:3

In this familiar chapter on love, we observe to what lengths God has gone to emphasize the absolute necessity of love motivating all we do. The first three verses list spiritual gifts and actions raised to their maximum level, attainable only by the Lord Jesus. It's tempting to think these are impossible to accomplish apart from love. From Balaam to the Pharisees to 20th century monks, however, we are reminded that appearing spiritual or self-sacrificing is not proof of loving the Lord above all else and our neighbor as ourselves. We see only outward appearance, but God sees the heart. Paul reminds us in Romans 5:8 that God demonstrated His great love for us by sending Christ to die for us. True love always leads to sacrificial giving of oneself for others. To truly love is to give ourselves away for Christ's sake. When God looks at us, does He see a "noisy nothing"? Do we have little love for Him and our neighbor, therefore giving little? Have we given to Him and our neighbor without love, therefore gaining nothing? Or, does our love for Him overflow out of us, propelling us toward using every gift from Him for the love of the Lord Jesus and our neighbor?

TAKE CARE

In Jimmy Fallon's first monologue as host of NBC's *The Tonight Show*, he expressed thanks to all past hosts. On an occasion when he might have said, "And now this stage is mine!" or "I'm delighted to be counted among such greats," instead he stated with deep humility, "I just want to do the best I can and take care of this show for a while."

Take care of. That's language not of ownership but of stewardship. That's the language of Genesis 2:15 (NIV) — "The LORD God took the man and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and *take care of it.*"

What have we been called to "take care of for a little while"? The earth, surely. Perhaps a congregation, <u>a business</u>, a neighbor in need, a volunteer or an employee. A child, who may need less care — or different forms of it — as time goes on. We don't own these people and things. God invites us to be stewards of them, to care for them, to use wisely and value these precious gifts … and someday, to pass them on to others.

GOD'S CONVERSATION HEARTS

Those familiar conversation hearts that show up every February can be more than just trite romantic or friendly sayings. Use them to remind you — or to teach a child — of the greatest love of all: God's love for us, which empowers our love for others. For example:

TRUE LOVE: What love is truer than giving up one's only Son so
people might have everlasting life? (John 3:16).
WINE: Jesus knows us intimately, as a shepherd knows his sheep. No
one can snatch us from him (John 10:27-29).
FOREVER: God loves us with an "everlasting love" (Jeremiah 31:3).
V LOVE ME: The greatest commandment is to love God with our whole
being (Luke 10:27).
TRUST ME: "Let not your hearts be troubled." We can count on Jesus,
now and for eternal life (John 14:1-3).
SWEET TALK: God's words are sweeter than honey
(Psalm 119:103).
BE GOOD: We show our love for Christ by keeping his commands
(John 14:15).
CALL ME: God longs to be in fellowship with us. We can talk to him
anytime in prayer (Jeremiah 33:3).
FRIENDS: The greatest love involves laying down your life for your
friends (John 15:13) — precisely what Jesus did.
#1: "We love because [God] first loved us" (1 John 4:19).

ABOUT THE LUTHERANS THE AUGSBURG CONFESSION

The Augsburg Confession, written in the midst of the Reformation tumult, is the core statement of what Lutherans believe. It was produced in 1530, thirteen years after young professor Martin Luther posted the Ninety-Five Theses in Wittenberg. A lot had happened in those thirteen years. Thanks to Luther's creative exploration of the gospel and its implications, his colorful personality (opponents had other adjectives), and the availability of the printing press, his views on religious matters as well as the politics of the day had been widely distributed. In many parts of central Europe, people were responding favorably, to the consternation of the Church of Rome, which had been accustomed to being the single expression of the Christian church in that region.

In the sixteenth century there was no nation called Germany. Rather, the various duchies and electorates made up a key part of the Holy Roman Empire, a remnant of the European territory once governed by ancient Rome. For much of Reformation times, Charles V governed as Holy Roman Emperor. He had watched his empire become increasingly fractured by divisions among princes favorable to Luther and other reformers, and those who kept their loyalty to Rome and the pope. The emperor needed the princes to be unified, not least because a Turkish invasion of Europe had reached the gates of Vienna. And so, in January 1530, the emperor called for a diet, or general assembly, in the German city of Augsburg. He asked the German princes and imperial cities to explain their religious convictions.

And so, reforming theologians and the rulers who supported them headed for Augsburg— among them, Luther's colleague Philipp Melanchthon and his pastor, Johannes Bugenhagen. Luther himself could not accompany them because he had been named an outlaw at a previous diet. He had also been excommunicated by the pope. He was, however, consulted on the final text via mail.

Upon their arrival in Augsburg, Melanchthon, consulting with previous preliminary documents, composed the final text of the confession. The German princes who favored the Reformation viewpoint agreed to it and signed it. On June 25, 1530, the Augsburg Confession was read aloud in

German before the emperor and presented in written form in both German and Latin.

The Augsburg Confession (sometimes called Augustana from its Latin title) is now found in a larger collection of Lutheran confessional writings called *The Book of Concord*. It contains twenty-eight parts, or articles. The first twenty-one of these stress points of agreement with the Roman Church of the time, though sometimes with crucial differences. In the last seven, the writers lay out what they see as abuses committed by the church.

The Augsburg Confession continues to guide the teachings of Lutheran churches to this day. Though a product of troubled times, it is filled with witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ.

Christ, Conyngham Outdoor Worship Space



In early 2016, leaders of Christ, Conyngham began exploring ways to commemorate the 200th anniversary of the congregation in 2018. One of three significant projects identified was restoring a courtyard area located between the buildings housing the sanctuary and Christian Education/ Fellowship spaces. The challenge was to re-imagine the space, taking creation care and reaching out to the community into consideration.

An outdoor worship space looking over the Conyngham Sugarloaf Valley was designed and constructed by ThorneCare Landscape Solutions, a business owned and operated by one of the congregation's young adults. Financing was provided by Mission Investment Fund, which allowed the congregation to use existing funds for giving to the Campaign for the ELCA.

The courtyard project and a parking lot restoration project occurred in tandem, along with the congregation's third anniversary project- giving \$100,000 to the Campaign for the ELCA. Lutheran World Relief Hunger Appeal has been the recipient of \$50,000. Plans include giving \$50,000 to Lutheran Disaster Response in 2017.

The space features a fully accessible worship space and stone altar, a baptismal fountain which pours forth from the altar, and a fire pit for social gathering. The fountain color may be changed based upon the season of the church year. The worship space includes capacity for sound and landscape lighting, and utilizes an open area with pavers marked with the sign of the cross. In addition, a Celebration of Life tree on the wall allows folks to have a leaf engraved with the names of their departed loved ones and two benches by the tree for seating.

Because so much food was left over, the staff contacted the Lehigh Conference of Churches, which was happy to stop by and pick up the food to distribute to the hungry and homeless.

Muhlenberg College Institute for Jewish-Christian Understanding

The Institute for Jewish-Christian Understanding of Muhlenberg College (IJCU) is a program office that serves the campus, the community, and Christian and Jewish congregations and clergy. Several of its programs and resources are available to the Lehigh Mission District on a regular basis. Check out the full website at http://www.ijcu.org.

<u>First Friday</u>: a monthly one-hour brown-bag symposium featuring different speakers and focusing on a variety of topics ranging from religion and interreligious relations through civic issues and the arts to history, culture, and the Lehigh Valley.

<u>Clergy Colloquy</u>: a monthly brown-bag interfaith discussion group, often focused on a particular book – classical or contemporary – in the realm of religious and interreligious issues. It's easy continuing education, helping clergy (and lay people with training in the critical reading of texts and history) make the commitment to continue reading and to engage those of other faith communities in safe, meaningful exploration of values and theology.

<u>Pre-Lent Workshop</u>: an annual half-day workshop during Epiphany that provides resources for navigating the texts and themes of Lent and Holy Week without misrepresenting Jews and Judaism along the way. Each year brings another expert presenter on a particular theme, often directly relevant to the year's lectionary cycle.

<u>Minicourse</u>: an annual 4- to 6-session study of a topic in Jewish-Christian relations, aimed at clergy and lay people. Weekly on weekday evenings in the winter or spring.

<u>Images of Israel</u>: This 6-unit introduction to modern Israel in its complicated reality is supported by 14 teaching videos, a participant book with study texts, and a leader's guide that equips any pastor or lay leader to take a congregational group into fresh, enlightening avenues of exploration, discovery, and understanding.

<u>Meals of Freedom for Life</u>: A participatory introduction for Christians to understand the Jewish Passover Seder. Designed for use on Maundy Thursday as a family meal in advance of the congregation's worship, it can easily be used in other settings, too. The leader guide provides all the details for how to learn about the Seder and its relationship to Holy Communion in a fun, tasty, intergenerational event!

<u>Christianity in Relation to Judaism</u>: A 9-hour unit for youth as catechetical instruction or a learning retreat. With leader guide and PDF files to give young people hands-on engagement with the ways in which Christianity is related to contemporary Judaism through Jesus, liturgy, scripture, and calendar.
