Dear Members and Friends,

For many (except our Orthodox friends) the celebration is over. Christmas is over, although there *are* 12 days of Christmas. We are settling in for winter, the trees are bare and at this writing there is snow on the ground. In the church year we are entering the season

of Epiphany which begins January 6th. Although Epiphany is a holiday abandoned by popular culture, it has a very modern message for us today.

The Magi "foreigners" opened the door to a surprise. In their visit, the early Jewish church saw that the baby Jesus was King for all people from every country of the world!

Today the Magi's visit shows us, too, who Jesus is and who we are! As Jesus is Lord of our daily life and our hope of the resurrection, so Jesus welcomes from every race and nation the lost and those searching for meaning. We are witnesses of this.

We learn more of Jesus' mission in events which followed, to be retold in the Gospel lessons for the Season. The Gospel for the first Sunday after Epiphany retells Jesus' baptism. His Father calls out for all to hear: "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased."

As a bookend to this revelation of Jesus' identity, the Gospel for the last Sunday in Epiphany (Transfiguration Sunday) retells the Father's confirmation that Jesus is "my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased. Listen to him." Are you listening?

Yes, the Season of Epiphany is about you and me becoming enlightened – knowledgeable and sensitive to God's presence in us. And aware of the difference he makes in our lives and can make in the lives of others.

Jesus is the light, the Illumination, the Daylight that chases away the gloom and darkness form human life. In that Light we and all humankind can see clearly who we are intended to be – redeemed people of God.

The Season of Epiphany is about the revelation of something else: God's glory seen in Jesus. In spite of the dazzling Transfiguration moment, God's glory is not about a spectacular makeover. In the life and death of His Son, we see that God's glory is about doing the right thing, getting his hands dirty keeping faith with His people. God's Son was born into relative poverty and died like a criminal. Hardly a glamorous career. But Jesus' death for our sake kept faith with His Father's will and revealed His Father's glory - His eternal reputation as the Savior of is people.

BIBLE STUDY WILL RESUME JANUARY 8, 2018

Our bible study group will resume on January 8^{th} of next year. We will be studying "Making Sense of Scripture: Big Questions about the Book of Faith" by David J. Lose (former president of The Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia). In Making Sense of Scripture, David Lose invites the reader to engage in a conversation, one that he imagines discussing around his kitchen table, about seven major questions of the Bible. More than a standard biblical reference book, Making Sense of Scripture is a dialogue that encourages readers to bring their questions or doubts to the table when reading Scripture. During this conversation, there are different opportunities for the reader to interact with the Bible, ultimately leaving room for personal transformation of the heart and mind. We will discuss such questions as: What Is the Bible?, Is the Bible True?, How Is the Bible the Word of God?, Where Did the Bible Come From?, How Can I Read the Bible with Greater Understanding?, Is There a "Center" to Scripture?, What Kind of Authority Does the Bible Hold? Participants will need to purchase the participant book. It can be purchased from Augsburg Fortress, the publisher or, if you have an Amazon account, from Amazon. The cost from Augsburg Fortress is \$12.99. If you purchase it from Amazon it would be cheaper. If you have questions about ordering please see Pastor Miller. SIMPLE GIFTS CONCERT

All are welcome to attend! We would love to see new faces and old friends join us for an enjoyable evening of music performed by Simple Gifts. Please share and tell others about this free event...

Two women plus twelve instruments equals one good time when **Simple Gifts** takes the stage at **St. Paul's Lutheran Church** on **January 30**, **2018**, **starting at 7:00pm**. This award-winning band performs on an impressive array of instruments, including two violins, mandolin, hammered dulcimer, recorders, banjo, and guitar plus some more unusual instruments like the bowed psaltery, baritone fiddle, shruti box, banjolin, guitjo, and doumbek.

Simple Gifts presents a wide variety of ethnic folk music, including everything from lively Irish jigs and down-home American reels to harddriving Klezmer *freilachs*, haunting Gypsy melodies, and exotic Balkan dance tunes. Throughout their performances, they put their own distinctive stamp on traditional tunes, blending styles from diverse cultures with their American roots.

This concert is FREE. However that night we will be collecting donations of non-perishable food items for local food pantries. Donation of these items would be greatly appreciated.

According to the Celtic Classic Festival in Bethlehem, PA, "few musicians can match the warmly personal stage presence Simple Gifts possesses." It is obvious that these women love the music they play, and they know how to share their talents, their enthusiasm, and their sense of humor with the audience.

Linda Littleton and Karen Hirshon have performed as Simple Gifts since 1995. The group was founded by Littleton in 1989 and has performed throughout the mid-Atlantic region, including appearances at the Smithsonian, Brooklyn Museum of Art, National Governors' Convention, Longwood Gardens, National Theater, Whitaker Center, Hershey Theatre, Philadelphia Folk Festival, Philadelphia Museum of Art, Ontario Center for Performing Arts, and dozens of colleges and universities throughout the region. Simple Gifts has opened for Natalie MacMaster, Tom Paxton, John McCutcheon, Robin and Linda Williams, Jay Unger and Molly Mason, and Boys of the Lough. Simple Gifts has recorded six albums. Their newest, "Crossing Borders: Music of Many Lands," received a national award from Indie Acoustic. Their previous album, "Time and Again," won a bronze star (third place) in the Crossroads Music Awards. Their recordings include traditional music from Romania, Hungary, Russia, Bulgaria, Greece, Ireland, Scotland, France, Sweden, Denmark, and America, plus original compositions by each group member.

A PERSONAL LETTER FROM YOUR COUNCIL PRESIDENT

As many of you know, both of my parents died recently after living long and truly wonderful lives. They had formed one of those fortunate, wished-for relationships that lasted them through seventy years of marriage. They raised five children, all of whom get along, love and respect each other. But more than that, they gave of themselves all of their lives. They gave of their time, volunteering sometimes through their church, sometimes directly working for social causes. Almost all of their volunteer work was done quietly, out of public view (except when my mother was arrested protesting the Vietnam War). They gave of their income and assets as well. Much of their giving was through their Church and also to a large number of local and national charities. As much as they gave during their lives, they even gave after their deaths.

And here is my message; <u>Now</u> is the time to think and act on how to best use what you DON'T need.

When I read my mother's will a couple of months ago, I was amazed. Wills tend to be dry and business-like. Of course her will did have a lot of that lawyer language, as they must. But there were a few things in the will that were unusual. First, she included the reasoning behind her decisions of where her assets should go after her death. Her understanding of how those gifts can affect people and institutions was profound. Second, beyond personal effects and small bequests to her godchildren, all of her assets would be given to some of the same charities that she had supported all her life. And what of her family? She knew that we didn't need her savings as much as the causes she cared about did. And she was right. Not all children (or grandchildren) are as fortunate as we are. But my parents were very deliberate about how best to use what they had, what they needed and about what they didn't need. And what they didn't need, they gave.

So I am back now to my message. <u>NOW</u> is the time to think and act on how to best use what I DON'T need. When June retired recently, our income went down quite a lot, and therefore we reduced our giving a similar amount to keep our giving at about 10%. But now that she is receiving a Social Security check, we need to revisit our giving and increase it again. And now that our three children are all independent and we have grandchildren, we need to revisit our wills and make appropriate changes. Those changes will include changes to how our assets will be distributed and used after our deaths. We surely won't need them, but there will be those who can make good use of them.

So think about how you are using what you don't (and won't) need. Now is the time. I know that I'll be in my parents' position before I know it. I want to be ready when the time comes.

Trinity, Bangor Utilizes Contemporary Artwork for Summer Worship

Trinity, Bangor worships in their air-conditioned fellowship hall during the warmer months. Although the chairs were set in semi-circular rows, similar to the pews in the main sanctuary upstairs, the background behind the altar was not very inspiring. The congregation's gaze fell upon rather ordinary windows and a painted wall.

So Pastor Larry Laine had an idea. Using his background in painting, and consulting with his daughter, Britta, who has a degree in painting from Boston University, he attempted to design a background that would to enhance the spirituality of the worship space. In traditional church architecture this is called the reredos-- an ornamental screen with carvings, images, even statues which worshipers may contemplate during a service.

After numerous drafts, Pastor Laine settled on a floor-to-ceiling high and 12-foot wide piece of art that depicts the crucifix in a contemporary abstract painting. The negative space represents the cross, and the arm and head (made of wood) is the resurrected Christ. Red onyx was chosen for the body to show the warmth of the resurrection and to provide contrast for the colder background colors.

Pastor Laine also used his experience with woodworking to assemble the project. With the help of Trinity congregation member, Tom Marino, the piece of art was anchored to the wall where it will likely remain for the foreseeable future.

NEW OPPORTUNITIES

As is always true when we turn the page or completely replace the calendar with a new version to begin the new year, we have at least two options. We can use it as an opportunity to reflect upon the accomplishments or shortcomings of the past year...or we can see it as a challenge to vision the opportunities which the new year will hold in store for us. Because it has long been my general habit to vision the positive options with which it is my expectation that we will be confronted, I choose to share a few of these which we may experience in 2018.

For instance, I am visioning that the new year will afford us a continuation of the worship experiences to which we have been accustomed in the past, but I am hoping that at least some of us will benefit from experimentation with at least a few New Opportunities. During my service as a Stewardship Key Leader for the ELCA, I had the privilege of visiting with parishes in various parts of our country. And I have special memories of my visit to one very active congregation in the Mid-West. Admittedly it had a rather large number of parishioners to serve, but I came away from that experience believing that one of the reasons for this was the various worship opportunities they offered. There was an informal worship in the context of an early Saturday supper, which was attractive to senior folk. There was a rather traditional early service, followed by a mid-morning contemporary service from which the children and young people were excused to Sunday School following a brief but meaningful opening ritual. And there was a late morning traditional worship in the chapel (by this time many of the worship tastes had been satisfied). Some experimentation had gotten them to this point!

I'm also hoping that the new year will afford us *New Opportunities* to broaden our fellowship experiences. Across the years I have heard people affirm that their experiences with the congregations with which they are affiliated comes as close as possible to reflecting a real family of faith. While, on the other hand, I have had people tell me that their experiences with another congregation have been quite cool and that even after several visits no one has extended a hand of fellowship or even said "Hello!" It is to be hoped that the new year will find those parishes which have already become families of faith continue to serve in this capacity, and that those which have not yet reached this level will progress in this direction. The strangeness and busyness of our evolving world suggests an increasing need for the intimate sharing of God's love!

And, there is considerable evidence that the new year and beyond will include *New Opportunities* for the sharing of this love as we respond to the unique and serious needs of people in various parts of our world. Ironically, while I was preparing these materials I was listening to a report of the devastation and the number of people who were being affected by the wildfires in California. And this news was following very closely, of course, on the heels of the various kinds of storms which had recently taken major tolls in Texas/Louisiana, Florida and Puerto Rico. The calendar may change, but *New Opportunities* continue with us!
