Dear Members and Friends,

We are in the season of the church year called Pentecost. On Sunday, May 20th, we celebrate Pentecost. Four of our students will affirm their baptism or as we traditionally say they will be "confirmed." They we will make promise before God

and the congregation will promise to pray for them. So in one sense Pentecost is about promises.

In the rush of a mighty wind and with tongues of fire, the Holy Spirit of God entered into the world on the Day of Pentecost. The Spirit's presence had immediate effect. The disciples preached with confidence. People eagerly listened to the message of the Gospel. Thousands were baptized. Promises Jesus had made were coming true in the Holy Spirit. And we are still feeling the power of those promises coming to pass in this post-Pentecost world.

We are feeling the promise of comfort. Jesus calls the Holy Spirit the Comforter, who will "bring all things to your remembrance. Whenever we are in discomfort, the Holy Spirit surrounds us with peace and reminds us of Jesus' words: "do not worry about anything," "Do not be afraid." "I will heal," and "Come to me, and I will give you rest."

We are feeling the promise of presence. Jesus says that the Spirit of truth "abides with you and will be with you." The Holy Spirit who came at Pentecost is always present with us. We are not left alone to fend for ourselves in this world. The Holy Spirit is our constant companion through the ups and downs and twists and turns of life. Even in the most trying of times, the Spirit keeps us strong in our faith, and keeps pointing us to Jesus, as a forever friend would.

We feel the promise of words to speak. When we are called to defend our faith, we don't need to be concerned about what to say. "The holy Spirit will teach you at that very hour what you ought to say," Jesus says. The Holy Spirit helps us to express from the heart what our relationship with Jesus means to us. The Spirit fills our mouths with words that touch hearts and minds with the Gospel.

We feel the promise of help in prayer. The Bible says, "The Spirit intercedes for us with sighs too deep for words." So with the arrival of the Holy Spirit we are also given a partner in prayer. When our thoughts may get muddled or we have trouble finding exact words to explain to God how we are feeling, the Holy Spirit steps into fill in the gaps for us. The

Holy Spirit enriches our prayer life and draws us into a closer relationship with our God. May the promises of God be realized in your life.

WORDS FOR TODAY, FROM 1968

For America, this marks the 50th anniversary of a turbulent year, which included high-profile assassinations, the Vietnam War and civil rights protests. Five decades on, turmoil still abounds.

May we take hope and inspiration from Robert Kennedy, who, on the night of Martin Luther King's death, replaced a presidential-campaign speech with these words:

"What we need in the United States is not division; ... not hatred; ... not violence and lawlessness, but ... love, and wisdom, and compassion toward one another; and a feeling of justice toward those who still suffer within our country, whether they be white or ... black."

Kennedy added: "We will have difficult times in the future. ... But the vast majority of white people and ... black people in this country want to live together ... and want justice for all human beings. ... Let's dedicate ourselves ... to tame the savageness of man and make gentle the life of this world ... and say a prayer for our country and for our people."

A CHURCH OR A CLUB?

Rev. Theodore Wedel, a former canon of the National Cathedral, once told a parable about congregational life. It began: "On a dangerous sea coast where shipwrecks often occur, there was a crude little life-saving station. The building was just a hut, and there was only one boat, but the few devoted members kept a constant watch over the sea."

Some neighbors and people who'd been rescued began donating time and money, thinking the station needed better furnishings and equipment. As the station grew as a gathering place, members hired lifeboat crews to do the dirty work of saving lives. Those who disagreed with that approach broke away to form their own stations.

The parable concluded: "If you visit that sea coast today, you will find a number of exclusive clubs along that shore. Shipwrecks are frequent in those waters, but most of the people drown."

Rally To End Racism



On Wednesday, April 4, the National Council of Churches led a rally in Washington DC to commemorate the 50th anniversary of the assassination of Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. A small group from Hope, Cherryville, led by Pastor Brian Rajcok, joined the Lehigh Valley Council of Churches' bus trip down.

They left at 4:00 A.M. and arrived at the National Mall around 8:30. The official rally began at 9:00, but there had been a worship service going on since 8:00. They heard prayers from a variety of faith traditions, including a Zoroastrian priest. This portion ended with a Confession for the church's complicity in dealing with issues of racism.

The rally's M.C. was an African American pastor from Chicago. Speakers discussed a variety of issues including systematic racism, police brutality, white privilege, and mass incarceration. Some notable speakers included the current pastor of MLK's church, the Rev. Raphael G. Warnock; actor Danny Glover; Black Lives Matter leader, DeRay Mckesson; and Ben Cohen & Jerry Greenfield, who gave a moving speech on white privilege.

One powerful phrase from DeRay Mckesson stood out: that racism is able to adapt and manifest itself in different ways: from to slavery, to Jim Crow laws, to present day mass incarceration. Others reminded the crowd of what MLK called the triple evils of our society: poverty, racism, and militarism; and they called on the church to do more in confronting these evils.

Pr. Rajcok writes: "I left the rally feeling particularly drawn to educating myself and others about mass incarceration and doing my best to help deconstruct this current manifestation of systemic racism. I was honored to be present that day. It was a day I will never forget."

Confirmation Day at the Synod



On Sunday, April 22, over 90 youth and 42 adults gathered at The Lutheran Center for Confirmation Day at the Synod. Organizers Anja Stuckenberger, Inge Williams, and Seth Noggle were excited about the size of the response, with nearly twice the expected number attending. This year's theme was "One Church under one God."

Taking advantage of the wonderful spring weather, the event began with a time outside dedicated to getting acquainted. This was followed by the keynote presentation from Pr. Kurt Garbe, Associate of the Bishop. Pr. Garbe spoke about the four companion synods to our Northeastern PA Synod: Argentina and Uruguay, Saxony, Slovenia, and the South Central Diocese in Tanzania.

Next the attendees rotated among five groups for a time of experiential learning. Four of the groups dealt with each of the four companion synods; and the fifth group was devotional, providing time for meditation and writing prayers. Then Bishop Zeiser presided at a Service of Holy Communion. The event ended with dinner, consisting of 300 empanadas with a side of rice and beans.

Think about bringing confirmation students from your congregation next year. Confirmation Day at the Synod provides a unique opportunity to celebrate our faith with many other young Lutherans!





On Sunday, April 15, the Pocono Mission District Assembly met at Trinity Lutheran Church in Bangor. A significant portion of the meeting focused on developing a vision for the future of the church and practicing how we can impact the people around us and reach out to others.

Pastor Niels Nielsen, Associate of the Bishop, shared *Our Iceberg is Melting*, a book by John Kotter. This parable takes place on an iceberg inhabited by penguins. They are filled with a sense of urgency because their iceberg is melting. The penguins decide change is needed, and they set out to find a new iceberg.

The assembly experimented with working together to find "a new iceberg," that is, a new way to be the church in the future. Two common ideas were: being more kid-friendly and being more open to new people. The Assembly then broke into discussion groups to share stories of compassion from their own faith communities.

Many of the stories were very moving and personal. There were stories of times of tribulation, when people were transformed by an act of kindness or compassion. There were stories of tough financial times, divorce, and illness. People shared how they were changed by the kindness given to them from their church and individuals.

The experience demonstrated how even the smallest acts of kindness and compassion can make a big difference, and how we need to tell these stories of faith to people outside the church.

REFLECTIONS LMD ASSEMBLY 2018

The Lehigh Mission District met in Assembly on Sunday, April 29, at The Lutheran Center. The 51 people present represented 14 congregations and 2 special organizations (the Synod and Good Shepherd Home). There was a good spirit, encouraged in no small way by the tone set by the leadership, by the creative devotions led by Elizabeth Leibenguth, and the delicious meal which has become a tradition at the opening of these Assemblies.

As usual, the meeting began with the sharing of brief reports regarding the special programs associated with the Mission District. Ron Mordosky reported that Operation Sunshine continues as a very popular program and the number of participants is growing. In the absence of a representative from Diakon, Dean Gade noted that this organization is in the process of celebrating its 150th anniversary. Chaplain Kelly Brooks of Good Shepherd followed by observing that it is celebrating its 110th year of service. And she noted that it is in the process of opening new facilities, but that, unfortunately, there is an approximately two-year waiting period for getting into its residential care. The Dean continued by observing that it was his understanding that Muhlenberg College was about to name a new chaplain. He also welcomed Luke Swanson back from his service year in Argentina and celebrated that he was about to become a seminarian. Cathy Mordosky concluded this portion of the Assembly by calling attention to a program entitled We Thirst: Lessons in Mercy (Christian Reflections on Addiction).

These presentations were followed by the recognition of those pastors and deacons celebrating synodically-recognized anniversaries of service. Pastor E. Frederick Holst (60 years) and Pastor David Hill (50 years) were present, received celebratory boutonnieres, and were applauded. Others known to be celebrating but not present were also noted – Pastor E. Wayne Dreyman (40), Deacon Jane Elliott (40), Pastor Bradley Carroll (25) and Pastor Steven Shussett (25). Congregations known to be celebrating anniversaries were Grace Church, Allentown (125 in 2019), St. Luke's, Allentown (130) and Friedens Church, Center Valley (225).

Elections on this occasion included Catherine Mordosky as a Lay Female Representative to the next Assembly of the ELCA; Elizabeth Leibenguth as a first 3-year term member and Ronald Mordosky as a second 3-year term member of the Mission District Council; Dick Skelly for another 1-year term as Council Treasurer; and Catherine Mordosky for her first 1-year term as Council Secretary (replacing Pastor Dick Stough who chose to "retire" after serving in this position for many years). Dean Gade and Pastor Kurt Garbe, our Synod Staff Liaison, continued with a report of those pastors who were new in our district and noting that three of our congregations would be closing in the near future – San Martin de Porres; St. Paul's, Allentown; and Grace, Allentown. And the proposed budget for 2019 was approved, representing no major changes from the past few years.

As planned, Pastor Nelson Quinones concluded this session with a report of the unique mission and ministry of San Martin de Porres during its 30-year history. His presentation was well received and included a significant amount of information of which the group was unaware.
