Dear Members and Friends,

God's people cherish Advent as a season of hope, a time of waiting for the Lord. Advent begins four Sundays before Christmas, ends on Christmas Eve, and focuses on Christ's coming: in Jesus' birth, in everyday living, and in Christ's final return. Joyful anticipation, loving preparation, and patient waiting for God's wonderful ways characterize the Advent season.

Although many Christians think of Christ's coming only in terms of Jesus' birth, the Advent season encourages us to anticipate God's coming to us now and in the future. Do we not wait for God's wonderful ways in our daily lives? Are we not always preparing for Christ's return? Can we not grow to discover Christ more fully present in the daily wonders of life?

As we prepare the manger for the Christ child, we also make room in our hearts and minds for Christ's daily coming. We long for the Christ to return to fully express God's wonderful ways once again. Such patient waiting and loving preparation embody the essence of Advent.

During Christmas, God's people celebrate Jesus' birth and regard the season as a time of gladness and joy. We revel in God's wonderful ways and rejoice in God's flesh-and-blood presence with us. Although some people put Christmas behind them on December 26, many Christians extend their celebration of Jesus' birth, of God's wonderful ways, of God's deep and abiding love for us, through January 5.

Often, we make an extra effort to reach out to those in need during this season, remembering Jesus' dependence in his infancy upon Mary and Joseph and the people of Bethlehem. So celebrate Christ's coming – graciously, generously, and joyfully!

SMALL PACKAGES, GREAT THINGS

The motto for Hershey's Kisses used to be "Big things come in small packages!" That also could be a motto for Bethlehem, for Baby Jesus and, indeed, for us. "But you, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah," God declares through the prophet Micah (5:2, NRSV), "from you shall come forth for me one who is to rule in Israel." Bethlehem was a mere village. God's ruler for Israel started as an infant. His birthplace was a small stable, not a palace or temple. But size isn't everything. Big — that is, great — things can come in small packages. And thanks to the tiny baby who grew up to share immeasurably huge love with the world, God can do great things through you, too!

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

Bishop Stephen Bouman stood behind an altar in a small crypt chapel of the Church of the Annunciation in Nazareth, supposedly at the location where Mary heard she was going to have a baby. Carved into the altar was the Latin for "The Word was made flesh," but Bouman noticed an addition: *hic*, or "here." *Verbum caro hic factum est*, "The Word was made flesh *here*."

Whoever authorized that inscription probably meant it to refer to that specific location. In reality, however, the Incarnation means God became flesh here on earth, for all of us. The Incarnation means we can speak of the nearness of God. It means God walks with us on earth, and that if we are saved anywhere, it is right here.

Her writing began on a dare. Words started coming to her in rhyme. She wrote what she heard and wrote her first poem in 1990. She continued writing 80+ rhyming poems until 1994, at which time she retired. 
BAPTISM

SYNOD NEWS

Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod, ELCA

Visitors from Saxony, Germany



The Northeastern PA Synod is blessed with four Companion Synods—a special relationship with the Lutheran Christians in five countries. These are Argentina and Uruguay; Slovenia; Tanzania; and Saxony, Germany. From October 4 to 15, we had the privilege of hosting 15 of our brothers and sisters from Saxony, Germany. The visitors ranged in age from 17 to "older".

While our visitors were in our Synod, they were each hosted by two different families—one in the Mountain Top area of the Synod and one in the greater Reading area.

Grace, Reading Back to School Giveaway



The lazy days of summer maybe the norm for some people, but not for the congregation and supporters of Grace, Reading's Back to School Event. For the past four years Grace has hosted this event at their location on the southern side of Reading.

This community project started when four congregation volunteers agreed to assist on a project suggested by Rita Wilk at church council. Rita's dream was to hold an event open to all community members, where needed school supplies and backpacks could be given out to students. Donations were obtained from Grace members along with other churches within the West Berks Mission District. Reaching the targeted recipients was simplified by piggybacking on the resources established by our Growing with Grace Tutoring program. This tutoring program serves two elementary schools located within a few blocks of the church.

In its infancy, this one-day event reached about 120 students with new and used backpacks / bags filled with school supplies. A limited amount of new underwear was given out as well.

To make a greater impact, additional funds were needed to expand the number of backpacks and supplies offered. Over the last three years, grants have been written and granted from Thrivent, Walmart, and the NEPA Synod (your Mission Support dollars at work).
