

Dear Members and Friends,

Since we did not worship on January 20th, I thought I would comment on our gospel text assigned for that Sunday – The Wedding at Cana (John 2:1-11). Some will recognize it as "Jesus turning water into wine."

This is the first miracle Jesus performs that is recorded. Mary was invited. Some

have suggested that she was a sister to the bridegroom's mother although there's no proof of that. She may have had something to do with the arrangements since she had the authority to ask Jesus to supply more wine. Wine was essential. They did not drink to get drunk. Generally, wine was consumed in a mixture of two parts wine and three parts water. Once Mary notices that there is no more wine, she calls Jesus to do something about it – get more wine. Jesus says, "Woman, what concern is that to you and to me?" The word for "woman" here is the same that he used when he called to her from the cross. It is respectful.

His question can be interpreted in a couple ways. Could he mean that "we are intruding on the plans of the wedding and the family?" Or he might have thought his mother was being overly concerned and should step away. He then follows it with "My hour has not yet come." No one would have understood that. What did she know about him? The text doesn't tell us. But she ignores him and gives the stewards orders to do as he says.

He asks for 6 jars to be filled with water. The jars were sitting there used for cleansing at the beginning of the meal and after each course. You know the rest. The chief steward tastes it and it is a much better wine than before. There were about 120 to 150 gallons of wine.

John uses this story as a sign that this is the Messiah and he opened the eyes of the disciples that were present. This Messiah provides abundance at a moment's notice. The light of Epiphany is reflected from the jars of wine to faces that watched it happen. This miracle is a sign that points to who Jesus is. Jesus is God's Son who is revealed through the working of this miracle.

AFFECTIONATELY YOURS

St. Valentine, a Roman priest, was martyred in 270 A.D. for loving Jesus. Some sources say he performed weddings after the emperor banned them; others say he rescued Christians from Roman prisons. Two centuries later, the pope declared February 14 St. Valentine's Day.

According to legend, the priest signed his letters "Your Valentine." Later, Christians followed suit to honor him. By the mid-1700s, friends and sweethearts exchanged heart-shaped trinkets or sent handwritten notes of affection on February 14.

ST. PAUL'S ELECTRONIC GIVING

St. Paul's has added a new way to make your regular and special giving to the mission of our Church. Most of us now pay our bills, buy our groceries and book vacations using some sort of electronic fund transfers. While we may write a check to pay our local, state or federal taxes and pay cash for a hot dog at the Allentown Fair, most of us now pay our utility bills, fill up our gas tanks and make clothing and grocery purchases with some kind of electronic transfer. These payments may include:

- Credit cards
- Debit cards
- NFC cell phone purchases (tapping the terminal with your cell phone)
- ACH transfer (Automated Clearing House)

In fact, when you set up regular payments for your cable bill or your home mortgage on your bank's web site, you are using the ACH system.

Now you can do the same thing for your weekly or monthly offering here at Church. Some of the advantages to using electronic banking for your offering are:

- You will no longer need to keep track of your weekly/monthly pledge since you will only enter it once in your setup page in the online giving website.
- No need to rush around Sunday morning looking for your envelopes and checkbook.
- No reason to worry about either giving ahead or "catching up" when you need to be away on a Sunday.
- No worries about forgetting to bring your offering with you on your way to Church (my big problem)
- It is just easier.
- Many of our members no longer use cash and checks at all.

There are a couple of potential drawbacks to electronic banking:

- All forms of electronic giving are subject to some level of fees from the processor and your bank. (When you give electronically, the Church will receive slightly less than you have given. This is the same thing that happens when you pay for something with a credit card. The merchant does not receive quite as much as you have paid, the bank takes the rest.)
- Your giving records from your electronic offering will come not from the Financial Secretary at St. Paul's but from the online processor. So it is likely that your annual giving reports to St. Paul's will come from two sources.

OK, now that the system is live, what is the process and how do I get started?

For those who are comfortable with internet based banking, online shopping, etc. you will be fine simply clicking on the "GIVE" link on the St. Paul's website home page. The link will take you to the *Tithe.le* web site where you can then set up your giving; choosing St. Paul's Breinigsville, how you will be paying (CC, ACH, etc.) entering your secure account information, contact information and finally how much you will be offering and how often the offerings are to be made. That's it.

If you want to begin electronic giving but are not confident in your abilities online and conducting electronic banking, Tom Kellogg would be happy to sit down with you to help you get started. If you want to speak with or meet with Tom, give him a call at: 610-442-0117.

SMALL PRINT (if you are interested)

- **Tithe.le** fee structure:
 - VISA and M-C Credit Cards 2.4% plus \$0.25 (50.00 contribution, St. Paul's receives 48.55)
 - American Express Credit Cards 3.5% plus \$0.25 (50.00 contribution, St. Paul's receives 48.00)

- ACH System 0.5% plus \$0.25 (50.00 contribution, St. Paul's receives 49.50)
- In any case, you will receive tax credit for the full amount of your contribution.
- Because of the fee structure, the bank's fee percentage is higher, the smaller your contribution is.
- Sign-up things to be careful of:
 - When logging onto the **tithe.le** site, be sure that the URL begins with "**https:**//"
 - When making your payment decision between credit cards and ACH transfers, click on one of the two little icons at the very bottom of the payments page during setup.
 - If you are planning on using the ACH system, have one of your personal checks at the ready during setup.
 - If you plan on using either a credit card or a debit card, you will need that card during setup.
- Other **Tithe.le** options available to you. Once you have set up your account, you can:
 - Change any of your giving decisions or account information any time by logging back into your account.
 - Use the free Tithe.le App (iOs or Android) to quickly log onto the Tithe.le web site with your cell phone. This makes it quick and easy to make a contribution through Tithe.le when you make a one-time contribution such as for Ash Wednesday or some other special occasion at any time, anywhere.
- If you start electronic giving, will you feel uncomfortable not using the offering plate? Your offering is between you and your Lord, but if you would feel more comfortable putting a giving note in the plate, there are offering notes available in the Narthex that you can fill out and place in the offering plate during the service.

CARD MINISTRY



Here at St. Paul's we send cards to members of the congregation who are ill or in need of a cheerful word. These cards are on the table in the narthex. When you are here on a Sunday, or during the week, check the table to see if there is a card. Please sign your name and help bring a smile to a fellow member.

ALTAR FLOWER AND BULLETIN SPONSORS FOR 2019

Please check the dates of items that you are taking from your shelves at home. We can't give out of date items.

HOSPITALIZED?

Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

NEIGHBORLY LOVE

As an ordained minister, Fred Rogers harnessed the power of television to tell children they were loved — and to show them how to love others. In *You Are Special*, he writes, "When we love a person, we accept him or her exactly as is: the lovely with the unlovely, the strong along with the fearful, the true mixed in with the façade, and of course, the only way we can do it is by accepting ourselves that way."

In a review of the touching documentary *Won't You Be My Neighbor?* a writer for *Variety* notes: "Rogers' real secret was ... that the call to love your neighbor as yourself isn't a slogan to hang in your kitchen with flowers around it — it's a decision you make at every moment, to view every man, woman and child on earth as your neighbor. If you don't see and feel that, and act on it, then you're just another narcissist with a kitchen slogan."

Last October, when a synagogue shooting shattered the peace of Rogers' real-life former neighborhood, residents of all religions embraced one another as neighbors. Afterward, the Fred Rogers Center stated, "We long for a day when there is no more tragedy born from hatred."

A Toy Drive in Schwarzwald



Several years ago, Pastor Scott Staub had a dream that the Schwarzwald community could hold a Toy Drive for the children of the Exeter Area Food Pantry. The program began at Schwarzwald Lutheran Church; and now in its third year, it has become a truly community effort. This year the following churches participated in the Toy Drive: Schwarzwald Lutheran Church, Reformation Lutheran Church, Schwarzwald UCC, St. Lawrence UCC, Northstar UMC, and Bethany Lutheran Church.

Financial support was provided by Thrivent Financial and Tompkin's VIST Bank. Wood-to-Wonderful provided their lovely handmade, wooden toys. The Arbor Inn, Effie's Charcoal Chef and Jake's of Mt. Penn provided collection sites, funding and cooking assistance. Boscov's Travel, A Perfect Secretary, Exeter Veterinary Hospital, Five Below, St. Lawrence Women's Club, Rotary of Mt. Penn/Exeter, Exeter Lions Club, the Exeter Girls Scouts and the Exeter Food Pantry collected toys, bought toys and provided many hardworking volunteers.

There was absolutely no problem getting volunteers for this event! We had the hardest working, most joy-filled volunteers ever! Would you believe that we never had to ask for help with this project? The volunteers found us! We had set-up help, truck drivers, bakers, food servers, toy sorters, personal shoppers, tireless gift wrappers, friendly faces; and we even had a full crew at clean up time!

The parents were very grateful and shared their thanks freely. We heard stories of disability, lost jobs, housing complications, sick children and even lost spouses. Most of the parents were relieved to have been invited to the event, expressing that they had no idea how they would have provided Christmas for their children without the Toy Give!

Synod Assembly 2019 New Theme and Logo



The 2019 Synod Assembly will be held on June 1 at Genetti Red Roof Inn and Suites in Hazleton.

The theme, "Freed In Christ For a New Day," highlights that "in Christ, there is a new creation" (2 Cor. 5:17).

BLUE - the skies and the waters that abundantly bless our Synod territory; and the waters of our baptism.

GREEN - the hills, mountains, valleys, and the rich fields and farmlands that are our heritage and our legacy, bestowed on us to steward, share and pass on to those who come after.

GOLD/YELLOW - the rising sun of the new day dawning in Jesus; the light of Christ; and even the fresh loaf of bread, the body of Christ broken for us.

The FISH is the earliest symbol of Christ and his first followers, and connects to his feeding of the 5,000 and his call for us to "fish for people."

Food Pantry Expansion in Dingmans Ferry



Holy Trinity in Dingmans Ferry has been operating a food pantry for 30 years. In recent times, as the number of families coming to receive supplemental food has grown, Holy Trinity has partnered with state and local government, local businesses, the Delaware Valley School District, and the community to purchase and collect food to distribute.

Barbara Hupfer, the Holy Trinity Lay Assistant, coordinates the pantry, ordering food, recruiting and training volunteers and scheduling and meeting with food pantry recipients. The pantry is open 5 days a week.

In recent years the need for additional space for storage, freezers and distribution of food became critical. The congregation was blessed by a \$100,000 gift from a parishioner who volunteers in the pantry and a grant from the Land Share Act of Pennsylvania for \$50,000 to pay for the 980 square foot addition onto the church.

Bishop Zeiser came to preside over the dedication of the new pantry. He spoke about recognizing the mission of God being shared in the church and the community, including the county and local elected officials who were present.



The congregation is filled with joy

over this growing ministry that daily serves people in need. Each month, over 150 families are given supplemental food including, cereal, canned goods, meat, vegetables and a variety of staples. The congregation is blessed by being a blessing.

LOVE CHANGES THINGS

A new commandment I give to you, that you love one another; even as I have loved you, that you also love one another. By this (you) will know that you are my disciples...John 13:34-35.

Even as we began the new year, I had the privilege of encountering several experiences that bore testimony to the fact that people are responding actively to this "commandment" and that their lives are being very positively affected. It is my hope that this sharing will serve as an inspiration as we commence another year of mission and ministry.

My first experience involved providing support to a fellow Lutheran who is in need of daily assistance as a result of surgery which was performed early in December. I was privileged to become part of a team which has been providing this service. And I was particularly moved by a comment from one of the members of the team who indicated that one of his commitments when he recently retired was to see that he extended himself "in love" at least once a day in his retired life. I had never encountered such a commitment previously, but it certainly resulted in some serious reflections. It is obvious that this individual does not call attention to this special commitment as he reaches out to help. But it is clear that he is experiencing special meaning in his life as a result.

Then there was the privilege of reading the article regarding Momoh Freeman in the January issue of Living Lutheran. Admittedly it is not the first such experience about which I have learned, but it was particularly moving in this season of the year and as I contemplated what I wanted to share by means of this article. If you haven't read this brief article, I encourage you to do so. Momoh was born and raised in Liberia during its civil war. Obviously, life was very difficult under those circumstances, but, despite this, he found himself very attracted to the piano and set about learning to play it. He walked miles to a neighboring village to practice the closest piano. And as he became reasonably skilled, he began playing in places where he would receive contributions for his offering. This helped provide food for him and his family in the refugee camp. Now in America he is the organist, pianist and choir director at Immanuel Lutheran Church, Almelund, Minnesota, And the love he extends through his contributions is obviously being rewarded with special meanings in his own life.

And I have also learned recently of an adult Sunday School class that is reaching out to provide special support to the Sixth Street Shelter in Allentown. They have literally adopted one of the apartments in this complex and have agreed to meet the needs of keeping it functioning. Recently this has even led to a request for support to help in repairing some of the equipment in this facility. The spirit of their ask reveals that they are sensing a spirit of love in response to their contribution. I encourage you to think on these things as we begin a new year.
