SAFETY MEASURES

Because of recent "active shooter" incidents around the country, churches have taken steps to try to prevent such things from happening on their properties. Our church council decided that it would be in the best interest of the safety of the congregation to **lock the main entrance doors to the church** <u>10 minutes after the start of worship starting June 2nd</u>. There will be somebody "manning" the doors at all times during worship so that if someone is comes later than 10:40 am, that person will be able to enter the church for worship. The door at the end of the hallway has always been locked at about 10:30 am and that procedure will remain the same.

While I'm sure you will agree that it is unfortunate that we have come to this point in our society where we must take these steps, the council felt that this was necessary for our safety.

WHAT RAIN REVEALS



Unless you're a pluviophile (someone who loves rain), a stretch of sunshine-free days can seem drab and dreary. To make South Korea's long monsoon season more colorful, art students created murals on some Seoul sidewalks with hydrochromic paint. It's invisible on dry surfaces, but as soon as water hits, vibrant images appear. Rain transforms gray pavement into bright scenes of fish, whales and turtles.

Life's storms, whether literal or figurative, can dampen our enthusiasm and even challenge our faith. Yet adversity often reveals God's true colors — and ours. No matter what clouds pass overhead, God remains perfect, loving and steadfast. And by praising God "rain or shine," we, as his artwork, reveal that our Creator and his every brushstroke are trustworthy.

REASONS TO REJOICE

Proverbs 11:10 (NIV) says, "When the righteous prosper, the city rejoices." The Hebrew word for *righteous*, notes Timothy Keller, indicates people who, because they believe in God, "disadvantage themselves to advantage those around them." In other words, people living righteously "will be such a benefit to the public good of the whole city that the entire populace will exult."

Keller then asks: "Are you the kind of person, and is your church the kind of church, about which others in your community might say, 'I don't share their beliefs, but I shudder to think about what this city would be like without them'?"



Saturday Evening at Zion, Tamaqua



One size does not fit all, especially when it comes to worship styles. Five years ago Zion, Tamaqua developed a Saturday evening service to

 provide an alternative time of worship for people who cannot get to a Sunday service, and

• provide an alternative style of worship for people who do not relate to the typical traditional high liturgy.

Pr. Cindy White offers blessings to three companions at a Saturday service

The service includes all the parts of a traditional service but in a more relaxed, informal style. Within a short period of time, we installed a digital projector and purchased the ProPresenter program to organize our worship and to allow us to add purchased music and subject matter videos to our service.

Because of it's flexibility, the Saturday service has been adapted to include a special service for cancer survivors, our annual blessing of the animals, a vow renewal service around Valentine's Day, and a Christmas in July service complete with a full holiday dinner following the service. All the Saturday services begin with Godsightings, when people are encouraged to share where they have seen God at work in their lives during the past week.

In December 2017 we began live-streaming our Saturday and Sunday services through Boxcast. As of March 30, we have webcast 107 services. On our website we've reached 379 unique viewers who watched 1,491 times. We began posting on Facebook in March 2018. Since then we've had 2,522 viewers of Saturday services and 2,830 viewers of Sunday services. Services are archived for several weeks.

Correction: In the last edition of Synod News Pastor Carl Shankweiler was reported as having retired. Although Pr. Shankweiler has stepped down from synod staff, he is still the called pastor at Zion, Frackville and also working under contract with Trinity (Chapel), Buck Run.



Community Breakfast at St. John, Easton



Another church even sent volunteers to help serve. The volunteers served over a hundred people, and comments from the diners were very positive.

A simple breakfast became an example of hospitality in downtown Easton at its best!



2019 ASSEMBLY CELEBRATION AND TRANSITION

The annual meeting of the Lehigh Mission District was held on Sunday, May 5, at the Synod Office. Following Opening Devotions, an enthusiastic group of pastors and lay leaders enjoyed a delicious dinner and set about working its way through an agenda which began with the recognition of seven pastors who were celebrating major anniversaries of service, including three who were present – David Godshall (60 years), John Deisinger (55 years) and John Kuschel (40 years). Although they were absent, the following pastors were also recognized – Richard Elliot (40 years), Donald Schwartz (40 years).

This was followed by a significant election process. As a result of these efforts *Pastor Nelson Quinones was elected Dean* and will begin serving the first of potentially two three-year terms in this position in early June. The second step in the election process led to the election of *Elizabeth Leibenguth as the new Chairperson*. And this was followed by the re-election of *Dick Skelly as Treasurer* (more about this later) and *Catherine Mordosky as Secretary*. Both of these positions are one-year re-electable terms. And Dean Gade concluded this process by asking *Pastor Samantha Drennan* to accept responsibility for the final year of Pastor Quinones' current three-year responsibility as the Mission District's representative on the Synod Council.

Later in the evening Pastor Gade and Joshua Fink were thanked for their service as Dean and Chairperson of the Mission District. And, although not present, Linda Smith was thanked for her continuing service as Editor of the Mission District's monthly newsletter. Obviously, the spirit of the group also included gratitude to Catherine Mordosky for her continuing service as Secretary and to Dick Skelly for his willingness to continue serving as Treasurer. And Sister Janet Stump concluded the evening by leading an interesting group discussion.

But I have agreed to devote some **special attention to the treasurer responsibilities** of the Lehigh Mission District. Dick Skelly's service in this position is approaching a quarter of a century. That's a long time! He assures us that it is not a complicated responsibility and provided the following description which I agreed to share as an encouragement for someone to accept this challenge. This position includes:

- Becoming an active member of the LMD Board, especially involving finances
- Monthly receiving, recording, and depositing of checks from congregations
- Reception and processing of requests for payments (avg 25 checks per year)
- Monthly reconciliation of LMD checkbook and bank statement
- Report financial circumstances to board meetings (approx. 6 per year)
- Record and coordinate financial aspects of LMD Ingathering during fourth quarter
- Prepare Treasurer's Report for presentation to annual LMD Spring Assembly
