Dear Members and Friends,

As I reflect on the past days with the three mass shootings within a week, certainly my prayers are with those in Gilroy, CA; El Paso, TX; and Dayton, OH. But sometimes keeping people in our prayers is not enough. Or maybe the type of prayer we pray is not enough. Are you frustrated about what to pray for in these situations? What *do* we pray for? As I

thought about that, I was searching to find a way to pray about these tragedies and I came across a book that I purchased a long time ago. It's called <u>Prayers for Impossible Days</u> by Paul Geres (Fortress Press, Philadelphia, 1972). There was one particular prayer entitled "Prayer When You Are Tired of War" (p. 55-56). It was written, I suppose, for a time when we find our nation at war. *Are we in a war against perpetrators of mass shooting?* I'll let you determine that. But the prayer's words were very interesting. I'm reprinting it for you to read because I think it takes a little different viewpoint than what we may have been hearing through various media. Please note, as indicated above that it was written in the early 70's so inclusive language was not the norm.

"O Lord, I get depressed by this world of people who act like animals, who cannot rest until they have killed off their prey. Nations which think of nothing but hatred, murder, and massacre bring me close to despair. And I feel like giving up my faith in man, life, in - O Lord, what was I about to say? I want to shout out my disdain for this world, but no, I must not do that.

No, I must resist the despair which overcomes me, and I must not run away.

I must not flee to some ivory tower, far from men and their inhumanity, in order to escape this unbearable world.

I shall remain here, in the midst of this world, in this world as it is, in this world of violence. I shall remain at my post.

Of course I don't amount to much. In the midst of chaos, what does the light of only one soul mean, a faint light which darkness will extinguish? And yet, my God, I must do what I am called to do.

"And what shall I say, 'Father, save me from this hour'? No, for this purpose I have come to this hour . . . to bear witness to the truth." (John 12:27; 18:37)

I must witness.

To tell – and to show – to all men that there is something other than the darkness, something other than the screams of fear, something other than the meaningless fighting, the ravings of demagogues, and the invasions.

Something other than the tons of scrap iron which are used to kill and the blown-up bridges which then have to be rebuilt. Something other than the immeasurable stupidity of the hordes of people pushing forward – using all the instruments of technological warfare.

Something other than economic control and ideology.

Witness, O my God, to your presence in the midst of this world and reveal to man, in spite of everything and no matter what the cost, the *other* meaning to life."

SAFETY MEASURES

Because of recent "active shooter" incidents around the country, churches have taken steps to try to prevent such things from happening on their properties. Our church council decided that it would be in the best interest of the safety of the congregation to **lock the main entrance doors to the church** <u>10 minutes after the start of worship starting June 2nd</u>. There will be somebody "manning" the doors at all times during worship so that if someone comes later than 10:40 am, that person will be able to enter the church for worship. The door at the end of the hallway has always been locked at about 10:30 am and that procedure will remain the same.

While I'm sure you will agree that it is unfortunate that we have come to this point in our society where we must take these steps, the council felt that this was necessary for our safety.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING ANNOUNCEMENT

In early November, it will be two years since Pastor Miller joined us in ministry at St. Paul's Lutheran Church. Shortly before he came here, he accepted the two-year term call extended by the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod Council and agreed upon by our church council. Two-year term calls, while lesser known, have become more common in recent years.

During the transition period between pastors, as the council was preparing for the call process, the council was offered the opportunity of pursuing a term call by the Bishop and his staff. The council embraced the chance of meeting with Pastor Miller. After that meeting and Pastor Miller's discussion with the personnel committee, the council voted unanimously to accept Pastor Miller for a two-year term call.

That term call is now nearing its end. The council at its regular June meeting recommended to the congregation that Pastor Miller be extended a regular full-time call to St. Paul's. We will vote on this recommendation on September 15, 2019 immediately following worship. It is important that as many of the congregation's members as possible attend the worship service on September 15th. This is a very important decision in the long life of our congregation, now over 130 years.

When your council announced the term call of Pastor Miller, we spelled out in a parish newsletter what would happen at the end of the two-year term call. As we near that time, we will now take those steps outlined in the article almost two years ago. Please make every effort to attend worship and the meeting on September 15^{th} .

INFORMATION SESSION FOR UPCOMING CONGREGATIONAL VOTE

In preparation for the upcoming congregational vote on September 15th, the church council will be hosting an information session for all members who can attend on **Wednesday, September 11th at 6:30pm** before our regular council meeting. Pastor Kurt Garbe, associate of the bishop of the synod will be there along with our council to answer any questions you might have about the process.

You may also make your own arrangements to switch with someone. If it is done far enough ahead of time, please notify Cindy at the office.

MIRACULOUS MISSION VBS 2019 RECAP

Our 2019 Vacation Bible School was out of this world. We had 26 children attend and 16 volunteers. The children started the evening in an opening where we reviewed songs and learned the take home point. The take home points for the week were God made me, God keeps His Word. Jesus came for me, Jesus saves me and Jesus is coming for me. Then all the children went to storytelling where they learned the bible story for the night. The children enjoyed acting out some of the stories. Then the children broke off into 3 groups and traveled to the rest of the stations. We had games, crafts, music and snacks. We ended our night back together where we reviewed the song, take home point and the story of the night. At the end of the week we had a closing program where the children invited their loved ones to hear about everything they learned that week. After a great program the children and adults enjoyed ice cream sundaes.

Our service project for the week was collecting loose change for Water for Tanzania. Kids in rural Tanzania typically get their water from hand-dug wells in river beds. This water source is shared with animals and used for bathing, cleaning and drinking. It's full of mud, bacteria and parasites, causing severe illnesses and possible death. Drilling new wells cost \$8,000 and serves an average of 800 people. So for every \$10 we collect it gives clean water to one person. We are happy to announce that we collected over \$200 and that means 20 people can have clean water!!! A big Thank You to Pastor Miller for counting all the change!

PRAYER SHAWL NEWS

Just a reminder that if you are making hats for the #HatNotHate project, please bring them to church by **September 8**, and we will deliver them to Knitter's Edge. I was recently at the Knitter's Edge store and saw that they had 400 hats so far, toward their goal of 600 hats.

Regarding prayer shawls – we are in need of longer length shawls, i.e. 60 inches or more, so that the shawl can be wrapped around the shoulders. Also, we have a prayer shawl blessing scheduled for Sunday, **September 29.** If you have shawls in progress, you might want to finish them before the 29th to include them in the blessing.

I'd like to introduce our next project – something that you may have never heard of – "Twiddle Sleeves." Below is a link to an article about how Twiddle Sleeves are being used to help dementia patients keep their hands busy, and thus become more settled. Also included are links to both knit and crochet patterns for sleeves.

In addition to making the sleeves, each one will be decorated with items with which to fidget, such as ribbon, lace, pom-poms, flowers, beads, buttons, etc. With Sandi Wagaman's help we have applied for, and got approval on, a Thrivent Action Team grant. The grant money will go toward purchasing supplies for making and embellishing sleeves. The completed sleeves will go to Luther Crest Alzeimer's Units.

We are planning to have a kick-off meeting for this project on **Sunday**, **October 13**, at 11:30AM in Fellowship Hall. Even if you are not interested in making sleeves – we could use help on making crocheted or knitted flowers, and on decorating sleeves.



"Just as a body, though one, has many parts ... so it is with Christ," writes Paul. "For we were all baptized by one Spirit so as to form one body. ... Even so the body is not made up of one part but of many" (1 Corinthians 12:12-14, NIV). Numerous members, diverse functions, unique gifts one God.



In Labor Day, may we find inspiration to make all our labors loving and faithful!



St. Mark, Appenzell - Imagining Our Future



Last year St. Mark's Appenzell decided to work on its mission and ministry goals and to do it during sermon time over four sessions dispersed throughout the summer months. We constructed a timeline of what we remembered about church history by "talking amongst ourselves." We then wrote a memory or two on "sticky notes," which were placed by everyone on the timeline. Even children were excited to stick something on the wall.

It was noted that most of our memories occurred in the past 20-40 years, implying that the more distant past was not as important as where we are going now. So, the next week we talked about the challenges and the opportunities we experienced in just the past 20 years. Then, in the third session, we moved into asking "What is our church known for in the community?" followed by "What are some things we would like it to be known for?"

As a result of our reflections, three categories of ministry seemed to develop:

- learning/spiritual growth
- caring for membership/visitors
- fellowship/social ministry

During the final sessions, we listed on our sticky notes (see the picture above) some activities under each category that we would like to see started or improved. From those we chose two or three activities that we thought we might begin in the fall months.

The posters now hang in the church office to remind us about the other activities that we might try in the future. This process created a new energy that still continues in the congregation, as we look for ways God is calling us to be active in the community and the world.

Holy Trinity, Dingmans Ferry Summer Youth Program: "Make Love Your Aim"



As soon as the public school year ends, youth ministry at Holy Trinity cranks up. The summer is full of faith formation and fun activities including group building, camping, lock-ins, and Vacation Bible Camp. The summer starts with a High Adventure Trip to the Adirondack Mountains. Seventeen high school youth and eight advisors spend a week camping, developing leadership skills, white water kayaking, and water skiing.



The second week includes three days of a Counselor In Training event for 30 middle school and high school youth. These young people are trained to work as teachers, helpers, and recreation staff for the Vacation Bible Camp. Some of the training is done by High Adventure Youth, as well as the pastor and staff.

The third week is filled with Vacation Bible Camp; and it includes an evening mid-week event with a giant BBQ, sing-a-long, and campfire for youth and families. The remainder of the summer has weekly youth activities for Grades 3-12. This year the theme was "Make Love Your Aim."
