Dear members and friends,

An old monk prayed many years for a vision from God to strengthen his faith, but it never came. He had almost given up hope when, one day, a vision appeared. The old monk was overjoyed. But then, right in the middle of the vision, the monastery bell rang. The ringing of the bell meant it was time to feed the poor who gathered daily at the monastery

gate. And it was the old monk's turn to feed them. If he failed to show up with food, the poor people would leave quietly, thinking the monastery had nothing to give them that day.

The old monk was torn between his earthly duty and his heavenly vision. However, before the bell stopped tolling, the monk had made his decision. With a heavy heart, he turned his back on the vision and went off to feed the poor. Nearly an hour later, the old monk returned to his room. When he opened the door, he could hardly believe his eyes. There in the room was the vision, waiting for him. As the monk dropped to his knees in thanksgiving, the vision said to him, "My son, had you not gone off to feed the poor, I would not have stayed."

The best way to serve God is to reach out in service to our brothers and sisters, especially those less gifted than ourselves. (More Sower's Seeds: Second Planting, Brian Cavanaugh, T.O.R.)

On Saturday, October 12th, twenty three members from St. Paul's went to feed those "less gifted than ourselves." We went to Neffs Union UCC Church to an event sponsored by Feed My Starving Children. Feed My Starving Children is a Christian non-profit organization that coordinates the packaging and distribution of food to people in developing nations. No, we did not actually hand food to people, but we packaged meals to be sent overseas to feed starving children.

It was done in an amazing assembly line fashion. Four people, one with a cup of rice, one with a cup of soy, one with a small scoop of dried vegetables, one with a small scoop of powdered vitamins, each poured their contents into a funnel. The ingredients went into a plastic bag which was weighed and sealed and set on a table. They were then put into cardboard boxes and put on a pallet to be shipped. There were five stations that did that process. We packed 15,000 meals which will feed 41 children for one year. Not only were we able to feed that many children, but I believe all who participated really felt good about what they did. We could see that we made a difference. We are all called to serve our

neighbor whether near or far. God calls us to respond and in faith we reach out to those who are in need. Jesus said "when you did it to the least of these, you did it to me."

Many of us who were there said we would do it again. I hope we can increase our numbers next year. Look for the announcement next year when we do it again. May the Holy Spirit continue to inspire you to serve your neighbor.

PARISH NURSING NEWS

I am pleased to announce that our congregation's response to the recent Health Ministry Survey indicated an overwhelming desire to establish a Parish Nurse program. Over the next few weeks, I will continue to contact registered nurses in our congregation to develop a team as well as ask individuals to serve on our Health Ministry committee. If anyone is interested in being on this committee, please let me know. You do not need to be a health care professional to be on this committee so anyone is welcome. The committee will only need to meet about two times a year to focus on the work of the Parish Nurse program.

I hope to have the program in full swing by November and will keep everyone updated via the newsletter and Sunday bulletin.

In the meantime please be sure to get your flu vaccine. Here are some interesting facts from the Immunization Action Coalition (IAC) and the Center for Disease Control (CDC) about influenza, commonly known as "the flu"

- 1. Influenza is transmitted through the air from the respiratory tract of an infected person or by direct contact with respiratory secretions.
- 2. If you are exposed to the virus, symptoms usually appear in two days but can vary from one to four days.
- 3. Although a lot of people think of the flu as a common cold, the flu can result in hospitalization and death (usually from the complications.) Symptoms can be a sudden onset of fever, aching muscles, sore throat and a cough. Additional symptoms can include a runny nose, headache, burning sensation in the chest, eye pain and sensitivity to light. If you have been exposed to a similar strain of the virus through infection or vaccination, you are less likely to develop a serious illness (so be sure to get your vaccination!)
- 4. Besides getting a flu shot, other methods to prevent spreading the virus are to practice good hygiene by covering your nose and mouth when you sneeze or cough preferably with your sleeve or a tissue and then dispose of the tissue.

 Always wash your hands with soap and water. Stay away from

- people who are sick. If you do get the flu, stay at home for at least 24 hours after the fever has ended.
- 5. The vaccination is recommended for all individuals ages 6 months and older including pregnant women unless contraindicated (discuss with your health care provider with specific concerns.)
- 6. The vaccine is very safe. The most common side effects of the injection include soreness, redness or swelling where you got the injection.
- 7. Health experts recommended that you receive your vaccination by the end of October. If you have specific concerns or questions regarding the flu vaccination contact your health care provider.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

"A LITTLE CHILD WILL LEAD THEM"

Isaiah 11 prophesies hope for the world: wisdom, understanding, righteousness, justice, faithfulness, peace. In the words "a little child will lead them" (v. 6), Christians hear a foretelling of God's coming to earth as the child Jesus. Today, children — Jesus' examples of fitness for God's kingdom (Mark 10:14) — often lead in showing love.

At age 11, avid baker Michael Platt opened a pastry shop in Maryland to benefit homeless people; for desserts sold, he gives an equal number to shelter residents. Eric Schubert, 18, of New Jersey, uses his genealogy research skills to help strangers — more than 1,000 so far — find long-lost family. In Pennsylvania, Neijae Graham-Henries became a certified barber at age 7 to give free haircuts to kids who couldn't afford them. (Stories shared on GoodNewsNetwork.org.)

May these children inspire us to use our passions and skills for good, in the name of the Christ-child, who grew up and taught us to serve others in love.

LEARNING TO GIVE THANKS

Last December I had my second knee replacement. Expecting this recovery to mimic the first, I went home to heal quickly. Instead, 10 days later one normal step led to the vertical splitting of my femur, an ambulance ride and surgery to insert screws and a long metal plate. I spent Christmas in the hospital and New Year's in a rehab unit, feeling anything but thankful. Nearly a year later, the slow recovery continues.

Yet I see much to be thankful for: my caregiver cousin, who lengthened her stay considerably; my family; church friends who provided meals, prayers and love; and doctors and therapists, who put me back together and continue to encourage me.

As Thanksgiving approaches, I continue to work on patience but am learning — with God's help — to "give thanks in all circumstances" (1 Thessalonians 5:18).

The campaign focused on areas that include growing this church's communities of faith, forming new leaders, welcoming neighbors, overcoming malaria, confronting hunger and poverty, and accompanying our global churches.

Renew Your Required Background Checks for Employees and Volunteers



At the end of 2014 new laws took effect that require all employees and volunteers working with children to receive background checks. Laws were amended in 2015 that changed the requirement from every three years to every five years and made some of the background checks free for volunteers.

If you completed this process in 2015 it is time to think about renewal of these checks. Our synod website has links and other information you can use to renew these clearances (http://nepasynod.org/child-safety).

The laws that came about in 2014 also put into place the new reality that our church volunteers now are mandated reporters if they become aware of or even suspect abuse or neglect toward a child. If your employees and/or volunteers have not been informed or trained in what this requires, now is as good a time as any to make that happen.

Finally, if your congregation does not already have a policy that outlines how children and youth will be kept safe in your church, you should be working on one. If your insurance carrier has not yet required you to do so, they probably will in the near future. Many insurance websites have resources, or you can browse the internet for "Safe Church Policies."
