Dear members and friends,

The Advent season has a long tradition in the history of the Christian Church, beginning somewhere near the end of the fourth century. While it was originally celebrated for a period of forty days and included fasting, by the beginning of the seventh century it was confined to the four-week period preceding Christmas. In the calendar of the

Christian Church today, the seasons begins on the Sunday nearest to St. Andrew's Day (Nov. 30th) and includes the four Sundays preceding Christmas as well as the intervening weekdays. It is the first of the six seasons of the church year.

While Advent, in the past, has been observed in many churches as a time of penitence in preparation for the joyous celebration of Christmas, the emphasis has changed recently to one of anticipation. It calls to mind the four-thousand years of waiting for the coming of the Messiah on the part of the Hebrew people. In many churches today, there is also an emphasis upon the second coming of our Lord. For the Christian, Advent not only becomes a time of preparation for the celebration of the coming of Christ into world but also a time for the rebirth of his spirit in our lives.

With this changing emphasis of Advent there has also come a change in the color of the season. While purple has been the traditional color for many years, this symbolizes penitence and that is not the emphasis in many churches. The color has changed to royal blue, symbolizing the sense of expectation. It is designed to call forth anticipation in our hearts - hopeful waiting for the celebration of Christmas once again and for the second coming of our Lord. This color of Advent also serves to distinguish the season from Lent in our church year.

Allow me to conclude with an acrostic poem I found.

Announcing his coming, the angel from heaven

Descended to bring his good tidings to earth.

Victorious, triumphant, the message is given:

Each penitent sinner, come view Jesus' birth.

Now come we! Now sing we! Our King draweth near!

To Bethlehem hasten! He casts out our fear! (Paul M. Lindberg)

As we look forward to the coming of Christ in our hearts at Christmas, may your Advent be filled with hope.

PARISH NURSING NEWS

Christmas is a wonderful holiday but sometimes the holiday season can lead to stress and depression. A newsletter published in 2017 from the Mayo Clinic featured some tips for preventing and coping with holiday stress and depression.

Acknowledge your feelings. If you are away from loved ones or are dealing with the death of a loved one, realize that it is perfectly normal to feel sadness and grief. It is okay to cry or express those feelings even though holidays are supposed to be festive events.

- Reach out. Seek out social events at church or in the community as they offer companionship and support.
 Volunteering to help others can lift your spirits and provide the opportunity to develop new friendships.
- **Be realistic**. The holidays do not have to be perfect or have the same traditions every year.
- Set aside differences. Accept family members and friends as they are. Chances are that they are dealing with the same stresses that you are. Set aside any grievances for a more appropriate time to discuss.
- Stick to a budget. Predetermine how much you can afford to spend on gift giving prior to beginning your shopping. If funds are low - try alternative gifts such as homemade gifts or the gift of your time with that person.
- Learn to say no. If you are overwhelmed with responsibilities, let your family and friends know that you can't participate in every activity. They will understand.
- Don't abandon healthy habits. Remember to get plenty
 of sleep and try to incorporate regular physical activity into
 each day. If you find that it is difficult to not overindulge
 in sweets and other high calorie foods at parties have a
 healthy snack before going to the event.

- o **Take a breather**. Try to make time to yourself each day even if for only a few minutes. Listen to soothing music, take a walk or read a book. Another idea would be to use the standing "star" that was provided at church published by the United Lutheran Seminary. Read the Bible verses listed and then conclude with the prayer listed.
- Seek professional help if needed. If despite your best efforts, you find that you are persistently sad or anxious, talk to your health care provider or a mental health provider.

Christmas is the celebration of the birth of our Lord. While it is easy to become caught up in the commercialization of the holidays and the demands that are sometimes placed on us remember the "reason of the season!

LIGHT SHINES IN THE DARKNESS

In Nepal, where blindness is prevalent due to under-funded medical care and a lack of eye doctors, ophthalmologist Sanduk Ruit has made it his mission to treat poor people. He's performed more than 130,000 cataract surgeries to restore sight, sometimes walking for a week with surgical equipment in tow to reach patients. Dr. Ruit also found a way for replacement lenses to be made locally for less than \$3 each, rather than buying them internationally for 100 times as much. The physician brings healing to remote villages and celebrates "big eye-opening festivals" with people who "were blind yesterday, and ... are seeing today."

At Christmas we celebrate the Word of God who came to live among us as Jesus, the light of the world. In countless ways since, God has brought light to those living in literal or figurative darkness.

We celebrate people, such as Dr. Ruit and the 650 doctors he has trained, whom God uses to cause "light [to shine] in the darkness" (John 1:5).

LULLABY FOR THE CHRIST-CHILD

First published in 1539 in Germany, the Christmas hymn "From Heaven Above" recounts the angels' message to the shepherds and then the spiritual journey of the baptized Christian to Jesus' manger-bed.

Try singing verses 8, 9 and 13 (translated by Catherine Winkworth) as a tender lullaby of praise, a song of love and a prayer to the newborn Savior. If the original tune is unfamiliar, use "Praise God from Whom All Blessings Flow" or "Just As I Am."

Welcome to earth, thou noble Guest, Through whom the sinful world is blest! Thou com'st to share my misery; What thanks shall I return to thee?

Ah, Lord, who hast created all, How weak art thou, how poor and small, That thou dost choose thine infant bed Where humble cattle lately fed!

Ah, dearest Jesus, holy Child, Make thee a bed, soft, undefiled, Within my heart, that it may be A quiet chamber kept for thee.

"BE BORN IN US TODAY"

In 1865, Phillips Brooks, an Episcopal preacher from Boston, went on a Holy Land pilgrimage. Riding horseback from Jerusalem to Bethlehem for Christmas Eve worship at the Church of the Nativity was so moving that he wrote "O Little Town of Bethlehem." The hymn's final stanza addresses the town's most famous newborn:

O holy child of Bethlehem, descend to us, we pray; Cast out our sin and enter in; be born in us today. We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell; O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel!



We Love... 2019 A Day of Learning



We Love...because God first loves us. We Love...others because each person is a child of God. We Love...by expanding our understanding of others and allowing people to be truly who God made them to be. We Love...because God is love.

These were just a few of the takeaways from We Love... 2019, a day of learning to help congregations be more opening and welcoming to LGBTQIA+ individuals and their families. For many participants this was uncharted territory, as they are learning what all those letters actually do mean (Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender, Queer/Questioning, Intersex, Asexual/Aromantic plus many more).



For others, there was still plenty to learn as we explored the intersection between sexuality/gender identity and faith and discussed how the church can be a place where people do not feel they have to hide their sexuality or gender identity in order to feel the love of God and others.



The keynote speaker was Jamie Bruesehoff, a writer and advocate in New Jersey. She is married to an ELCA pastor and is the mother of three children, the oldest of whom is transgender.
