Dear members and friends,

Many of you have nativity scenes set up in your homes or in your front yards. They usually include the three wise men or kings or Magi. And we usually include the three men when we set up the Nativity ahead of the day of Christmas. But, really, the Magi did not arrive at Jesus birth. They came later. The church celebrates that time as the

Epiphany, the revealing of Jesus to the world. Epiphany Day is January 6. Although Epiphany is a holiday abandoned by popular culture, it has a very modern message for us today.

The Magi "foreigners" opened the door to a surprise. In their visit, the early Jewish church saw that the baby Jesus was King for all people from every country of the world.

Today the Magi's visit shows us, too, who Jesus is and who we are. As Jesus is our hope of the resurrection, so Jesus welcomes from every race and nation the lost.

We learn more of Jesus' mission in events which followed, to be retold in the Gospel lessons for the season. The Gospel for the first Sunday after Epiphany retells Jesus' baptism. His Father calls out for all to hear: "This is my beloved Son, with who I am well pleased."

Again, the Gospel of the last Sunday in Epiphany (Transfiguration Sunday) retells the Father's confirmation that Jesus is "my beloved Son with whom I am well pleased. Listen to him."

Epiphany is about us. The Season of Epiphany is about you and me becoming enlightened – knowledgeable and sensitive to God's presence in us, and aware of the difference He makes in our lives and the lives of others. Jesus is the Light that chases away the gloom and darkness form human life. In that Light we and all humankind can see clearly who we are intended to be – redeemed people of God.

EPIPHANY

The **Day of Epiphany** (once known as the "Christmas of the Gentiles") and the Epiphany Season (between January 6 and Transfiguration Sunday) follow on the heels of the 12 days of Christmas. The Epiphany Season extends the spirit of Christmas for another four to six weeks. The Gospel readings we hear on the Sundays of those weeks expand our understanding of just what is being revealed in the appearance of Jesus Christ on earth. At Christmas we celebrate the day that God came to us in His Son. During Epiphany we celebrate the significance of God's coming among us in the flesh.

We have made it through the Christmas season. Thank you to our choir members for all their hard work during this time. Thank you also to our extra voices and readers that helped with the cantata on December 15. A big thanks to our bell choirs for their diligence in practicing to bring us their music.

WORSHIP ASSISTANT SCHEDULES

The worship assistant schedules are prepared three months at a time – for the purpose of getting the information out to you as early as possible. Cindy sends out the schedules via regular mail to everyone included on the schedules. That is a good time for you to review the three-month batch of schedules and address any known conflicts.

If you have a conflict - the process for changing your scheduled date is either contacting the office or contacting the Council Person of the Month – whose name and telephone number are included on the schedule. Or, if you are comfortable with swapping your date with somebody else, go ahead and do that – but remember to let Cindy know of the change. If something comes up after Thursday at 5PM, please contact the Council Person directly, since messages left on church voice mail may not be received until Monday morning.

As changes come in, the schedule is revised and published with each month's newsletter. Hence, the schedule published with the newsletter is the most current. Schedule changes that come in after the newsletter is published will appear in the bulletin. And if there is a change after the bulletins are printed, Cindy will contact the Council Person to let them know.

In December alone -91 people were scheduled for 7 worship services. With this number of people – obviously there will be some conflicts and need for changing dates. But please know we are making every effort to accommodate schedules and preferences, while ensuring that all worship assistant positions are filled.

PARISH NURSING NEWS JANUARY 2020 PEGGY SAYLOR, RN

As we begin a new year, I am pleased to announce that our Parish Nursing team is ready to begin serving our congregation. The following members have agreed to be part of the team: Cathy Waltemyer, June Kellogg, Ali Thompson, Monica Parker and Nicole Wiswesser. If anyone knows of any additional registered nurses who might be interested, please let me know.

We will be having a blood pressure screening in mid-January with the date to be announced in the bulletin. We hope to offer these screenings on a regular basis throughout the year so watch for further information.

In preparation for the screening, I would like to offer some information on high blood pressure or hypertension that has been published by the American Heart Association. Hypertension is when the force of the blood against the walls of our arteries is too high which can lead to serious complications such as heart attacks or strokes. The desired range for blood pressure is 120/80 or below. While there is a tendency to develop high blood pressure if it runs in your family, there are also steps that can be taken to try to minimize the chance of developing hypertension.

- Try to watch the amount of your salt intake. This not only includes putting down the salt shaker at mealtime but also being aware of the amount of salt or sodium in prepared processed foods such as soups, canned foods and prepackaged foods.
- Try to maintain a desirable weight and do daily exercising even if just walking a few extra steps each day.
- If medication is needed to help control your blood pressure, please follow your healthcare professional's recommendations carefully.

Look for announcements in the bulletin regarding our blood pressure screening in January!

Open Arms Senior Connection - Arndt's, Easton



For over 17 years, grants totaling more than a half million dollars have been made possible through mission support giving. Grant applications are received by the Witness and Service Ministry Team and are awarded based on the outreach the grant will accomplish.

The story that follows is written by the founders and the current program director of Open Arms Senior Connection. It tells of an inspiring ministry that got its beginning because of a vision, the need to help others, and the available grant funds that allowed it to thrive.

Over ten years ago a small Welcome and Outreach committee at Arndt's Lutheran Church in Forks Township was looking for another ministry that could use their resources. The congregation came together to modify their existing spaces using funds predominantly from a Transforming Congregations grant and a Witness and Service



grant, both of which are mission support grant programs available through the Synod.

Today "Open Arms Senior Connection" continues as a two-day a week program for older adults in the greater Easton community. Realizing that the time some of the participants spend at Open Arms might be the only times during the week that they enjoy a meal with someone, or have any human contact at all, inspires the congregation to make the program as effective and impactful as possible.

The success of this program is due in great part to two paid codirectors and all the volunteers. The program runs on a budget of about \$1000 per month, which goes toward daily beverages and snacks, basic supplies, and salaries.

Donations, fundraisers, and Witness and Service grants from the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA has allowed this program to reach and provide long term benefits to hundreds of older adults in the region.

Sharing Life - St. Mark, Allentown



Sharing Life is the brain child of Sue Krasley, a parishioner of St. Mark's, who worked at Allentown State Hospital and who had concerns about individuals losing peer relationships due to the closure of the hospital in 2010. At the time, Pastor Brindjar graciously and enthusiastically afforded the opportunity to begin our mission by opening the doors of St. Mark's for a monthly gathering.

What originated as a modest idea of serving a monthly luncheon nine years ago has expanded into a much sought-after experience by our community; it now includes monthly Craft days led by St. Mark's talented artists Brenda Mann and Charlie Orbin.

As our events grew, our attendees have become diverse; and today, monthly events not only include individuals formerly served at Allentown State Hospital, but also embrace individuals with Intellectual Developmental Disabilities as well as the community at large.

Throughout the years the echo and sentiment of Pastor Brindjar's mantra can still be heard: "Stay Calm and Carry On". Due to the success of our mission, and because we often find ourselves serving upwards of 120 individuals each month, we have adopted another mantra: "fishes and loaves."

Because of St. Mark's willingness to take a risk and open their doors and hearts, our mission isn't just about serving individuals lunch. More important is offering to individuals our acceptance, an opportunity to form new friendships, and a welcome to a faithbased community. All activities and luncheons are free to participants and are funded lovingly by our mighty Committee members, St. Mark parishioners, and community donors.

The memberships of both families of faith were certainly privileged to experience the *GIFT OF GRACE* as they came together during the 2nd decade of this 21st century.

Further, the reality of this *GIFT OF GRACE* is constantly affirmed for us as we reach out to share it with those with special needs. Throughout the history of the tradition which we now know as the Evangelical Lutheran Church in America we have been committed to responding positively to the many needs of people around the world.
