Dear members and friends,

He heard a reassuring voice say, "I'm here: the Lord your God."

The man said, "I am so glad you came along. I can't hold on much longer." The Lord said, "Before I help you, I want to know if you believe in me." The man answered, "Lord, I certainly believe in you. ASH WEDNESDAY

The Season of Lent begins with ashes and ends with alleluias. It is a season of spiritual growth, beginning on February 26th and concluding six weeks later with the brilliant white colors of Easter. The first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday named for the practice of imposing ashes, a practice that many Lutheran congregations have found quite meaningful.

Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human experience. First, ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." Second, ashes suggest cleansing and renewal. Ashes were used anciently in the absence of soap, and on Ash Wednesday ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our Baptism. Third, ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for one day the words "We commit his/her body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" will be said over our bodies. Fourth, ashes are a symbol of repentance, as expressed in Luke 10:13 and the hymn "Savior, When in Dust to Thee." Services will be held at 10:30 am and 7:00 pm. Please join us for either of these services to begin the season of Lent.

PARISH NURSING NOTES PEGGY SAYLOR RN

Parents and grandparents often struggle with determining the amount of time that children should spend on digital devices. The American Academy of Pediatrics offers tips for parents to help them promote healthy concepts for digital use and citizenship for their children.

Set limits and encourage playtime: Toddlers younger than 18-24 months should avoid digital media except for video chatting. Preschool 2-5 years of age – limit to one hour per day of high-quality programming. Older children should be limited to a maximum of two hours per day.

Monitor the apps that they are using. Look to organizations like Common Sense Media (www.commonsensemedia.org) for reviews of apps to guide you in making the best choices for your children.

Screen time should not always be alone time. Playing video games together promotes good sportsmanship and gaming etiquette. Co-viewing and co-engaging encourages social interactions, bonding and learning.

Make unplugged playtime a daily priority especially with younger children. Also create tech-free zones such as mealtime, and family gatherings.

Be a role model. Children will mimic your actions so limit your screen time and be sure to fully engage with your children when they have the need for your full attention.

Warn your children about the importance of privacy and the fact that what they post on-line becomes part of their digital footprint indefinitely.

Finally remember that kids will be kids and will make mistakes using media. Try to handle these errors with empathy and turn them into a teachable moment. Digital devices are part of our world today and the benefits, if used appropriately and moderately, can be great. Just remember to stay involved and don't get lost in the digital moments!

IN OTHER WORDS

We're so accustomed to hearing the Bible's "love chapter," 1 Corinthians 13, at weddings and other occasions that we may not really hear its meaning anymore. It can help to listen to something familiar said in different words. What new understandings of love does this paraphrase from *The Message* Bible reveal to you?



"Love never gives up. Love cares more for others than for self. Love doesn't want what it doesn't have. Love doesn't strut, doesn't have a swelled head, doesn't force itself on others, isn't always 'me first,' doesn't fly off the handle, doesn't keep score of the sins of others, doesn't revel when others grovel, takes pleasure in the flowering of truth, puts up with anything, trusts God always, always looks for the best, never looks back, but keeps going to the end. Love never dies" (1 Corinthians 13:4-8a, MSG).

BETTER TOGETHER

Racial reconciliation is a hot topic among Christians these days. In Sikeston, Missouri, which has a history of segregation, two church bodies recently decided to live out the gospel's message of unity by merging.

Kenny King, pastor of the mostly black Smith Chapel, and William Marshall, pastor of the mostly white Trinity Baptist, had become friends. They realized both churches, while healthy, were undergoing transitions, so they joined forces. The new congregation's name, Grace Bible Fellowship, represents God's grace and the grace we extend to others — no matter their skin color.







Mission Trip to Puerto Rico



Imagine riding in one of two fifteen-passenger vans, both navigating a narrow two-lane road that twisted and turned up into the tropical mountains of central Puerto Rico. The views were spectacular. Palms, giant philodendron, and the fiery flowers of the Flamboyant Royal Poinciana tree grace the roadsides and green mountain walls. Small, compact, and humble homes supported by what looks like toothpick legs hug the steep slopes. A morning journey brought the volunteers to the town of Comerío, where the streets have yielded to the mountain's natural topography, reminiscent of the hilly streets of San Francisco.

On June 30, 2019, under the guiding eye of Lutheran Disaster Response working through Lutheran Social Services of Puerto Rico, 25 Lutheran volunteers from 5 Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod churches traveled to Puerto Rico to repair homes damaged by Hurricane Maria.

The volunteers divided into four teams. One team repaired a house needing to have the roof power washed and sealed, as well as its interior ceiling and walls scraped and painted. This house had stood empty for the past two years and was unlivable in its current state. The family who had lived there pre-Maria were hoping to return to their home as soon as possible.

Thanks to God and the excellent guidance and organization of Lutheran Social Services of Puerto Rico, the team was able to power wash their roof and seal it. They scraped ceilings and painted the interior of their home. Much

of their nearly new furniture, now moldy and warped, still awaited removal. All their kitchen appliances had been destroyed.

And yet, because of the hard work of the team, and a generous grant from The Witness and Service Ministry Team supported through Mission Support giving to the Synod, the work was accomplished. Donations of various gift cards from a number of congregations enabled the team to purchase a new refrigerator for the family. What a joy to see faces of hope as these homeowners came so much closer to reclaiming their home. Truly the team used its hands to do God's work!

Two were phony Gmail addresses (bishopnepsynod@gmail.com and rzeiserbishopr@gmail.com). Neither the bishop nor any of the synod staff will ever email you directly asking for "help." This is a scam. Please don't reply; even better, just delete the email without even opening it.

Parish Secretaries' Christmas Luncheon



On December 10 the fourth annual Parish Secretaries' Christmas Luncheon was hosted by the Synod's Support Staff at The Lutheran Center in Schoenersville. This year the luncheon was opened to all lay workers in the congregations of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. There were 45 people in attendance. After greetings from Bishop Zeiser, a hot, catered lunch was served, introductions were made, and there was time for some get-to-know-you games and plenty of fellowship.

was in her sixth week of church work, and one who has been serving in the church for 50 years. Pastor Laura Csellak went above and beyond by driving two secretaries from Ashland in Schuylkill County to The Lutheran Center so they could be a part of the festivities. The cost of the luncheon was subsidized with Thrivent Action Team grants.

About 45% of the staff members who attended were treated by their congregations and/or pastors. Let's try to increase that percentage next year and encourage congregation workers to take advantage of a fun, relaxing afternoon in the middle of the Advent season. DISCERNMENT

When we try to define the word discernment, what comes to mind is making a decision. Simple. Right? Well, in our Christian faith discernment becomes moments of reflection and moments of prayer until we come to a moment of understanding and make a decision.

Discernment is really, "Faith Seeking Understanding" to use Christian theologian Daniel L. Migliore's book title. In this moment of faith seeking understanding we look to God as a community of faith before making our decision.

In the October LMD Newsletter, I mentioned how Rostered Leaders (local Lutheran pastors) will be meeting with Bishop Samuel Zeiser "as we seek discernment in preparation for the Synod Assembly in June and the election of a new bishop."

Lutheran congregations throughout the region are invited to participate in the discernment process towards the election of our next synod bishop.

To support the election of the next Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod Bishop of the ELCA, a team will be soliciting input from any interested member of a Synod congregation. The input will be concerning (1) priorities for the next Bishop to address current and future issues, and (2) what spiritual gifts and skills we are looking for in that next candidate for the role.

Three regional meetings are set in February to gather input, each from 9-12 on a Saturday morning. Each meeting will include light refreshments. (There will be a single makeup session on February 29 if inclement weather occurs.)
