Dear Members and Friends,

The season of Epiphany begins on January 6th (the day of Epiphany) and ends on Ash Wednesday. Although Epiphany is a holiday abandoned by popular culture, it has a very modern message for us today.

The Magi or "foreigners" opened the door to a surprise. In the Magi's visit, the early Jewish church saw that the baby Jesus was King for all people from every country of the world!

Today the Magi's visit shows us, too, who Jesus is and who we are. As Jesus is Lord of our daily life and our hope of the resurrection, so Jesus welcomes from every race and nation the lost and those searching for meaning.

The season of Epiphany is about you and me becoming enlightened, knowledgeable, and sensitive to God's presence in us. It is also about being aware of the difference He makes in our lives and how He can make a difference in the lives of others.

Jesus is the Light, the Illumination, the Daylight that chases away the gloom and darkness from human life. In that Light we and all humankind can see clearly who we are intended to be – redeemed people of God.

But the season of Epiphany is also about the revelation of something else: God's glory seen in Jesus.

In spite of the dazzling Transfiguration moment, God's glory is not about a spectacular makeover. In the life and death of His Son, we see that God's glory is about doing the right thing, getting His hands dirty keeping faith with His people.

God's Son was born into relative poverty and died like a criminal. Hardly a glamorous career. But Jesus' death for our sake revealed His Father's glory – as the Savior of His people. In this time of pandemic, we can all look forward to God revealing His Light in the presence of His Son.

CHRISTMAS EVE WORSHIP

The Worship and Music Committee and the Back to Worship Committee have jointly decided to have three outdoor worship services at 3:00 p.m., 5:00 p.m., and 7:00 p.m. on Christmas Eve. There will **not be any inside worship on Christmas Eve.**

The service will be approximately one-half hour. There will be the celebration of Holy Communion similar to our outside worship. Your singing will be led by recorded vocal and organ accompaniment. **Silent Night**

When you drive in and park that evening, in addition to the bulletin, communion packet, and an opportunity to give your offering; you will be given a "glow stick" to light (for the 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. service) for the singing of Silent Night. However, if you wish to bring your own candle (and your own source of light to light it) for the singing of Silent Night, you may do so. If you remain in your car with the lighted candle, you do so at your own risk.

Sermon

Because of the shortened service there will be no sermon, but a Christmas sermon and children's sermon will be posted on our website. **Exiting the parking lot**

For the singing of Silent Night (at the 5:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. service) the parking lot lights will be turned off. They will be turned on immediately after Silent Night but they will take about 10 minutes to be fully lit, so, if the lights are not fully on when you leave, please be careful exiting the parking lot. Ushers will direct you as you leave.

THE DAY OF EPIPHANY

The Day of Epiphany, once known as the "Christmas of the Gentiles," and the Epiphany Season (between January 6 and Transfiguration Sunday) follow on the heels of the 12 days of Christmas. The Epiphany Season extends the spirit of Christmas for another four to six weeks. The Gospel readings we hear on the Sundays of those weeks expand our understanding of just what is being revealed in the appearance of Jesus Christ on earth. At Christmas we celebrate the day that God came to us in His Son. During Epiphany we celebrate the significance of God's coming among us in the flesh.

PARISH NURSE NOTES Parish Nursing Notes Peggy Saylor, RN

As you are reading this, we will hopefully be on the long road to ending the COVID-19 pandemic. On Dec. 11, 2020, the FDA approved a vaccine from Pfizer to be given to patients ages 16 and above. The vote passed and was approved by 17 members and rejected by four members. News reports seemed to believe that the four members who voted against approving the vaccine were worried about the lack of studies done on the 16 and 17 year olds. At the present time, there were not enough clinical trials done on children and pregnant women to approve the vaccine on those individuals.

This is truly a step in the right direction but the process could be long and involved until the vaccine is available to the general public and herd immunity is achieved. Those at high-risk such as front line health care workers, first responders and patients in nursing homes will be among the first to receive the vaccine. That being said, we will still likely need to continue with safe health measures such as wearing masks, washing our hands and maintaining social distancing for a while.

Another promising development is in the area of treatment for those patients who have contracted COVID-19 and are experiencing mild to moderate symptoms. It is aimed at keeping patients from needing to be on a ventilator or other advanced treatments. At the present time this drug, bamlanivimab, is in limited supply and is only used on those patients who are considered to be a higher risk than the general public. Both major hospitals in the Lehigh Valley are administering this medication on an outpatient basis as it is not presently authorized for patients who are already hospitalized. It is given intravenously and mimics the immune system's ability to fight the disease.

These are encouraging steps to ending the pandemic but patience and prayers will be required. Here's to a new and healthy New Year!

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

The Rev. Richard H. Stough Honored for Navy Chaplaincy



The Rev. Richard H. Stough was recently recognized for 30 years of service as a U.S. Navy Chaplain with a \$1,000 contribution to the ELCA Federal Chaplaincy Ministry Fund for Leaders Scholarship Endowment Fund in honor of his service. The Endowment supports word and sacrament ministry candidates who will minister to military service members, and those who will serve as Veteran's Administration Chaplains or as Federal Prison Chaplains.

Because of its role in lifting up the Endowment Fund, this synod is designated an "ELCA Medallion Synod." Congregations can become "ELCA Medallion Congregations" by similarly supporting the Endowment Fund. Contact the synod office for more information.

Hope, Reading Receives NAACP Community Impact Award




Food distribution staff at Hope

On Saturday, November 14, the Reading Chapter of the NAACP met for its 33rd annual Freedom Fund Gala virtually, of course. Meals from "Grill Then Chill" were delivered to the homes of attendees. Following the meal, awards were presented to local organizations for their racial justice efforts. The Gala theme was, "We Are Done Dying."

Among the recipients of the 2020 Community Impact Award is a congregation of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod - Hope Lutheran Church in the Northwest section of the City of Reading. The award citation reads, in part, "We are thrilled to honor the church's dedication and commitment to making a difference with programs supporting the fullness of life for the residents living in our community."

Hope hosts the largest food pantry in the Helping Harvest Food Bank service area. Additionally, Hope's Table community outreach ministry provides a weekly meal for area residents; and Hope sponsors Café Esperanza, a One World Everybody Eat affiliate. The congregation has also offered summer and after-school programs for the multicultural children and youth who live in the neighborhood.



Pastor Mary Wolfe, who accepted the award on behalf of the congregation, commented, "We are so honored to be considered for this award. Hope has been enriched in many ways through the relationships we have been privileged to form with all of our neighbors."

WELCOME TO 2021 CREATIVE REFLECTIONS

These are indeed very difficult times in which we are living. Obviously, there are a number among us who can remember our parents and grandparents sharing their memories of the Influenza Epidemic of the early part of the last century but, contrary to initial expectations, concerns surrounding COVID-19 have superseded those experiences. Indeed, as we move into a new year, the number of people from all over the world who are involved with this pandemic is staggering. Hospitals are overwhelmed and the world's medical staff is exhausted. Hopefully, even as this piece is being released, the vaccines designed to offset this dilemma are being released. Unfortunately, however, it is known that it will be as late as midyear before they will have had a significant impact. Furthermore, we are all well aware that there are significant financial issues associated with this concern. Obviously, our thoughts and prayers are concentrated on facilitating a positive response to this dilemma

And, even as we have been dealing with this overwhelming concern, we have necessarily had to work our way through a change of leadership in our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. Following two terms as our Bishop, The Rev. Dr. Samuel Zeiser has reached the point where he needs to respond positively to the retirement invitation. There is no question that we are very grateful for the genuine and dedicated service which he has provided, and we wish him release and satisfaction in the foreseeable future. Now, obviously, the process of selecting a new Bishop was much more complicated than had ever previously been experienced. It would normally have involved a series of elections in the context of a Svnod Assembly, but obviously no such event could happen while the COVID issue is overwhelming us. So, our very skilled synod leadership took the

steps to develop a very appropriate Virtual Assembly which included, of course, a virtual election process. During the course of two weekends in mid-October a virtual assembly transacted the normal synod business. And through that process The Rev. Christopher deForest was elected our new Bishop. He will begin serving at the turn of the year but, due to the continuing issues with the virus, his official installation has been postponed to the future.

Obviously, we are all involved in bringing these two worlds together in our congregations. We give thanks for the leadership of our dedicated Dean, The Rev. Nelson Quinones, and for the pastoral and lay leadership which have partnered to maintain some semblance of life in our congregations since almost a year ago. At this point there are those congregations which are involved in some level of indoor worship which involves very restricted seating and the absence of such things as singing and responsive readings which, unfortunately, facilitate the spread of the virus. In other cases, at least up until now, there have been various forms of outdoor worship. This will certainly need to be re-evaluated as we move into the heart of winter. Welcome to 2021! Obviously, we are hoping, indeed expecting, that our worlds will improve dramatically as we move on into the new year. Meanwhile, we grateful to all those who have dedicated themselves to helping us get through this crisis. We thank God for all of your loving efforts.
