Dear Members and Friends,

We are now into our Lenten season. In just a few short weeks we will be entering Holy Week, my favorite week of the liturgical year. As we head into Holy Week, we picture in our minds what Christ went through during His last days on this earth. God's entire plan of salvation would come to completion during this short span of time,

as His Son would take our punishment upon Himself, die the death that we deserved, and make us right with God again. Let the images below fill your minds as you pray and meditate on the events of this most holy of weeks.

Palm Sunday: The people of Jerusalem waved palm branches and welcomed Jesus with the words, "*Hosanna to the Son of David!*" Wave your palm branches this day to remember this parade of praise before Christ's Passion.

Maundy Thursday: On the night He was betrayed, Jesus shared His Last Supper with His disciples in an upper room. In the simple forms of bread and wine, which are His body and blood, Christ would share the forgiveness of sins. By partaking of the bread and wine of Holy Communion with fellow believers in Christ on this day, we remember our Lord's sacrifice and receive His redemption.

Good Friday: Wearing a crown of thorns, Jesus was mocked by soldiers as He went to the cross to die for our sins. "Hail, King of the Jews!" they said with a laugh. "Hail, King of all!" we say with great awe this day as we recall what Christ has done! PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Quick Facts and Update on the COVID-19 Vaccines" Peggy Saylor, RN

Updates on the COVID-19 vaccines occur frequently but I thought I would take the opportunity this month to do a "quick facts and update" based on a bulletin issued by the Center for Disease Control (CDC) as of February 10, 2021. It will probably be outdated by the time you are reading this but at least we will be "in the know" within a few weeks time span!

- 1. As of 2/15/21 the two vaccines currently approved are Pfizer-BioNTech (16 years of age and older) and Moderna (18 years of age and older.)
- 2. The second dose of Pfizer is recommended for 21 days after the first, Moderna at 28 days. If a delay is unavoidable or it is not feasible to adhere to the recommended interval, the CDC states that the second dose may be administered up to 6 weeks after the first dose.
- 3. Doses of a mixed product series (one dose of Pfizer and one of Moderna) have not been evaluated for efficacy and safety so both doses should be of the same product.
- 4. Unless the benefits are outweighed by the risks, there should be a minimum of 14 days between the COVID-19 vaccine and any other vaccine.
- 5. Most local reactions (sore arm) and systemic post-vaccination symptoms (fever, fatigue, chills, etc.) are mild to moderate in severity, usually occurring within the first three days of vaccination and resolve within 1 3 days. It appears that the symptoms are more frequent and severe following the second dose and among younger persons compared to older persons (ages over 55 years of age.)

- Non-steroidal anti-inflammatory drugs such as Tylenol can be taken for side effects <u>after</u> the vaccination. However, routine taking of medication prior to vaccination to prevent symptoms afterwards is NOT recommended at this time.
- 7. There is no contraindication for persons having a latex allergy to not have the vaccine. The vial containing the vaccine does not have a latex stopper.
- 8. Fully vaccinated persons with exposure to someone having COVID or suspected of having COVID are not required to quarantine if they meet <u>ALL</u> of the following criteria: are 2 weeks past their 2 dose series or 2 weeks past a 1 dose series, are within 3 months of the last dose in the series and have remained without symptoms following exposure. This being said, these are CDC guidelines so if you are in this situation please check with your employer prior to return to work. The exception to this is if you are presently an inpatient or resident in a healthcare setting where quarantining is still recommended.

We will need to continue to wear masks, social distance, and perform good hand washing for the unforeseeable future. However, hang in there; we will get through this with the help of God!

All we need is a name of someone in need of prayer; a reason does not have to be given as to why you want the extra prayers.

If you would like to become a member of this committee, just let me know. I am contacting the Prayer Chain Committee electronically using text messages and email from my cell phone. If you do not have a cell phone or computer, we can still contact you by phone. So if you want to be of service to those who need extra prayers, just contact me using the numbers above or see me at Church. This only takes a brief amount of time and there are no meetings to attend! We all need extra prayers and they do not take a lot of time but are of great comfort.

HOSPITALIZED?

Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

A BREATH OF FRESH PRAYER



Norwegian theologian Ole Hallesby described prayer as simply letting God into our lives. God "knocks," he said, "not only in the solemn hours of secret prayer" but "in the midst of your daily work, your daily struggles, your daily grind ... when you need him most."

Prayer, added Hallesby, is as essential to life as air. "As impossible as it is for us to take a breath in the morning large enough to last us until noon, so impossible is it to pray in the morning in such a way as to last us until noon," he said. "Let your prayers ascend to [God] constantly, audibly or silently, as circumstances throughout the day permit."

LAUD & HONOR ON PALM SUNDAY

The Palm Sunday anthem "All Glory Laud and Honor" is one of Christendom's oldest hymns. St. Theodulf of Orleans, who helped reform the church under Charlemagne, wrote the lyrics in the year 820 while imprisoned in France.

The lyrics recount Jesus' triumphal entry into Jerusalem, an event the medieval church reenacted every Palm Sunday. Clergy and townspeople processed from fields through the city gates, behind a Jesus figure riding a donkey. At the gates, children began singing the hymn in Latin — *Gloria*, *laus et honor* — and onlookers soon chimed in.

City gates may be a thing of the past, as the website Hymnary.org notes, yet we still praise our blessed Redeemer "because we know just what kind of King he was and is — an everlasting King who reigns not just in Jerusalem but over the entire earth. What more could we do but praise him with glory, laud and honor."

All glory, laud and honor to you, Redeemer, King, to whom the lips of children made sweet hosannas ring. You are the King of Israel and David's royal Son, now in the Lord's name coming, the King and Blessed One.

SETTING CAPTIVES FREE

Though St. Patrick's Day has become a secular "holiday," March 17 commemorates the life of a Christian missionary. St. Patrick grew up in a Christian home in Britain but wasn't very devout until he experienced crisis. As a teen, he was captured and sold into slavery in Ireland, escaping after six years. "The Lord opened my unbelieving eyes" in Ireland, Patrick later said. God led him back there, and he converted tribe after tribe to Christianity.

In *Confessio 61*, St. Patrick writes, "I testify in truth and in great joy of heart before God and his holy angels that I never had any other reason for returning to that nation ... except the Gospel and God's promises."

PAYING IT BACK — AND FORWARD

During the pandemic, acts of kindness seemed especially meaningful. Last spring, as Covid-19 hit Native American communities particularly hard, an interesting transatlantic outreach occurred. Donations from Ireland began appearing in a relief fund for Navajo and Hopi families, leading administrators to suspect the account had been hacked. Then they realized a cross-generational payback was underway.

In 1847, Choctaw Tribe members sent \$170 overseas to Ireland to help with Potato Famine relief. That generosity was never forgotten, and by May 2020, people in Ireland had contributed more than \$4 million toward pandemic assistance for relatives of people who'd helped their ancestors. Many donors included an Irish proverb meaning "In each other's shadows the people live."

The concept of paying it forward dates back to a 1784 letter by Benjamin Franklin. It also echoes Jesus' Golden Rule: "Do to others as you would have them do to you" (Luke 6:31). How might you live out this practice today?

GOD IN MY HANDS

When I was ready to give up on the Church, it was the sacraments that pulled me back.

When my faith had become little more than an abstraction, a set of propositions to be affirmed or denied, the tangible, tactile nature of the sacraments invited me to touch, smell, taste, hear, and see God in the stuff of everyday life again. They got God out of my head and into my hands. They reminded me that Christianity isn't meant to simply be believed; it's meant to be lived, shared, eaten, spoken, and enacted in the presence of other people. They reminded me that, try as I may, I can't be a Christian on my own.

THE COMFORT CONNECTION

Amid suffering, we might feel alone and wonder what good can come of it. But later we may discover ourselves equipped to serve precisely because of what we experienced.

Writer and civil rights activist James Baldwin stated: "You think your pain and heartbreak are unprecedented ... but then you read. [Books] taught me that the things that tormented me the most were the very things that connected me with all the people who were alive or who had ever been alive." Whether through books or direct human interaction, we often learn that our suffering connects us to other people and that our pain gains meaning by moving us to support someone else who's hurting.

Paul writes of such connection: "Praise be to ... the Father of compassion and the God of all comfort, who comforts us in all our troubles, so that we can comfort those in any trouble with the comfort we ourselves receive from God" (2 Corinthians 1:3-4, NIV). May you share the comfort you have received from God with others in pain. As a bonus, along the way you'll realize you're not — and never have been — alone.


Online Synod Assembly

Meet Deacon Travis Woodfield, Director of Congregational Legacy


