Dear Members and Friends,

"Jesus Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed!" This refers to Christ's resurrection. But we are going through another kind of life transition. I don't know if we are risen from the pandemic, but maybe I can say we're rising(?). It is still with us, we are obviously not back to "normal," but things are getting better. Some restrictions are

loosening. More people are getting vaccinated. Iron Pigs and Phantoms are allowing fans in the stadium and arena! Yes! Baseball and hockey are back. There is hope!

This message, "Christ is risen. He is risen indeed.", is like Ezekiel's image of dry bones. God is breathing life into us. The bones are shaking and signs of the resurrection are occurring, but it is not without growing pains.

Gerald Hughes in his book, "The God of Surprises" mentions three features in the resurrection accounts. One is that many people were in a negative mood: the women came to embalm Jesus, the disciples on the road to Emmaus were sad and disillusioned, the disciples in the upper room were afraid and living behind closed doors; and Thomas was in doubt. But in each case our Lord's love met them in their despair and that led to a transformed life.

The second feature is that those who were transformed by the resurrection message, it often happened slowly. It took a while for the two disciples on the road to Emmaus. So, if your spiritual progress is slow, don't worry, you're in good company.

The third feature of the resurrection accounts is that those to whom Christ appeared are to go and tell others. We are to witness to the grace of giving and serving others in our daily lives. As Christ lives in us may we be empowered to carry out his mission. May the miracle of the resurrection continue in each and every one of us. "Christ is risen!" "He is risen indeed!"

RESUMPTION OF INSIDE WORSHIP

Upon recommendation of the Back to Worship Committee and the approval of the Congregation Council we **are resuming worship inside the church** beginning *Easter Sunday, April 4th, at 10:30 a.m.* (We will continue to have **parking lot services at 9:45 a.m.**) However, there will be the same protocols and guidelines in effect as there were before when we were back in the church in the fall: 1) Masks will be worn. 2) Your temperature will be checked. 3) We will be physically distanced. 4) We will celebrate communion the same way we do at the parking lot services. 5) You will be guided to your pew; the first arriving will be seated toward the front. 6) The back pews will be dismissed first. 7) We ask that if you want to have a conversation with someone that you have it outside, not in the narthex.

On April 4th, Easter Sunday, our first Sunday inside; the last hymn, "Jesus Christ Is Risen Today" will be sung by the congregation outside. We will gather in the parking lot, physically distanced, and sing the hymn with organ and voice accompaniment.

Of course, the magic question was "When do you think we will be back to singing?". Although we have no definite answer at this point, we were all encouraged by the fact that most of the choir has gotten at least one dose of the Covid vaccine.

PARISH NURSING NOTES April 2021 Peggy Saylor, RN

Spring is finally here and if you are like me, you are looking forward to spending more time outside. Usually this is the time when most individuals start to think about exercising more and getting back into shape after the long winter (not to mention a pandemic!) It is proven that active people tend to feel and look better. Over a long period of time, regular physical exercise can help prevent diseases like cancer, heart disease and diabetes as well as improve mental well-being.

As with any subject, there are facts and myths about exercise. Test your knowledge with the true and false questions below:

- 1. _____ Recommended levels of activity decrease for individuals as they age.
- 2. _____ A long brisk walk every day is enough to stay healthy.
- 3. _____ If you have back pain or arthritis, it is best to relax and avoid moving painful body parts.
- 1. **False.** Recommendations do not vary by age. It is recommended that everyone who can should aim for an hour total of moderate activity per day and one hour of vigorous activity per week. To clarify the difference: moderate activity, like a brisk walk, causes light sweating or a moderate increase in breathing and heart rate while vigorous activity like tennis, causes heavier sweating and rapid breathing and heart rate.
- 2. **False.** Walking is good aerobic exercise, which can improve the strength in your legs and endurance. However, research indicates you also need strength training and stretching to stay fit. Strength training can counteract and even reverse muscle and bone loss, while stretching can keep you limber.

3. **False.** Lower back pain and arthritis are common reasons for not exercising, but inactivity may worsen these problems. With an appropriate training program, people who suffer from these afflictions can become stronger, more flexible and suffer less. Swimming and water aerobics are good low-impact choices for people with these conditions. It is a good idea to check with your physician before starting any exercise program.

Please enjoy the warmer weather that Spring will give us. God exercises our spiritual body – it is up to us to exercise our physical body!

BELIEVING IN

Sometimes we get caught up in thinking we need to understand God in order to have faith. But faith is more about trust than knowledge; it's more about believing in someone than believing information. A child, for instance, doesn't have to know the precise roads to Grandma's house; he only needs to believe *in* his parents and their ability and desire to get him there safely. Similarly, we need not understand all the intricacies of how God works; we can take a cue from the disciples and let belief *in* the risen Christ transform and empower us. In the words of Madeleine L'Engle (*The Rock That Is Higher*): "The disciples did not bother to try to understand the resurrection body. They doubted, and then they believed. They believed something so wonderful that it changed this broken, fragmented, beaten-down little group of men and women in a moment from depression to enthusiasm, from despair to new life, vibrant and unafraid."



Our theme for this year is "Growing Young and Vital," which engages three different lanes: loving the land, healing the hurt, and engaging the stranger. We are a church in three expressions, Churchwide, synods, and congregations. In each expression of the church we seek to find joy and vitality in ministry with people of all ages.

This year we'll welcome Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton to participate in the installation of our Bishop, Christopher deForest! We'll also elect members of our synod to attend the Churchwide Assembly (CWA) as voting members in 2022.

Along with electing voting members to the CWA, we will be engaging important issues
