Dear Members and Friends,

Babe Ruth had hit 714 home runs during his baseball career and was playing one of his last full major league games. It was the Braves vs. the Reds in Cincinnati. But the great Bambino was no longer as agile as he had been. He fumbled the ball and threw badly, and in one inning alone his errors were responsible for most of the five runs

scored by Cincinnati.

As the Babe walked off the field and headed toward the dugout after the third out, a crescendo of yelling and booing reached his ears. Just then a boy jumped over the railing onto the playing field. With tears streaming down his face, he threw his arms around the legs of his hero.

Ruth didn't hesitate for a second. He picked up the boy, hugged him and set him down on his feet, patting his head gently. The noise from the stands came to an abrupt halt. Suddenly there was no more booing. In fact, a hush fell over the entire park. In those brief moments, the fans saw two heroes: Ruth, who, in spite of his dismal day on the field, could still care about a little boy; and the small lad, who cared about the feelings of another human being. I was rummaging through my books for an idea for this article. I was struck by this story as I reflected on the present situation in our society today. Jesus said (paraphrasing) "When you do it to the least of these my brothers and sisters, you do it to me." So, Christ is in each of us. How would we treat each other if we saw Christ in each other? Yes, there a few "yeah, buts," *but* it might be a starting point. Just a thought to ponder . . .

St. Paul's is once again participating in the Monthly Maddness fundraiser in conjunction with Dan Schantz Greenhouse. A purchase of a gift card for \$20 will give the gift card recipient a specific flower (or pumpkin) gift each month during 2022 – a \$75 value. St. Paul's will receive \$10 on every card sold – proceeds will go toward the cost of snow removal. Redeeming your monthly gift is easy - simply present the gift card at Dan Schantz Greenhouse on Lehigh Street in Allentown any time during the month and pick up your gift. Note that you do not need to make a purchase when picking up your gift. And if you cannot get there during a particular month, the card can be used during that month in 2023. Here is what is offered for each month in 2022.



We are taking orders for Monthly Maddness cards beginning September 12, and will continue through November 21. This time, we will have two delivery dates. If you purchase your card(s) by **October 10**, you can pick them up at church on **October 17**. If you purchase your card(s) between **October 11 and November 21**, you can pick them up at church on **November 28**.

If you are attending indoor worship, look for the display – pick up an envelope and fill out your contact info along with number of cards requested. Price is \$20/card. PASTIMES CONCERT

Add to the Halloween excitement by joining us for a concert on Sunday, October 31st at 2:00 PM. Pastimes is the next addition to our continuing concert series. There will be light refreshments following the concert, which will finish in plenty of time for you to distribute candy to all the trick-or-treaters. PARISH NURSE NOTES Peggy Saylor, RN

I hesitate as I write this article during the week of August 16, 2021, as I know that by the time most of you are reading this – in all probability – some items will have changed. The good news about the changing recommendations is that it demonstrates that the CDC is carefully monitoring the disease and is making up to date changes that need to be made in "real time." As a nurse I realize that a large part of the nursing process is the need to constantly evaluate and make changes based on science. In the nursing field this is called "evidence-based practice." In simple terms it means that you need to change practices based on the most recent facts!

Since the B.1.617.2 (Delta) variant has reared its ugly head, recommendations have been changing. According to the CDC and Pennsylvania Department of Health tracking system current for the week of August 11, 2021, Northampton and Lehigh counties are at a high risk for transmission and Monroe country is at a substantial level. In the entire United States, 71.1% of the population has received at least one dose of the vaccine. Pennsylvania is at a much higher vaccination rate than some other states like Florida and Louisiana where there is a hesitancy to receive the vaccine. Current changes as of the time of writing include the CDC recommending universal indoor masking for all teachers, staff, students, and visitors to K-12 schools regardless of vaccination status. Three of the largest area hospitals – Good Shephard, Lehigh Valley and St. Luke's have mandated employees receive the vaccine to maintain current employment unless there is a proven exemption. I am sure that our church as well as others will continue to evaluate procedures for indoor worship services based on the most current rates of transmission.

These are troubling times, but we need to continue to encourage vaccinations, mask wearing, good hand hygiene, social distancing and pray to God to help us through these times.

MICHAEL AND ALL ANGELS

Many Christian denominations celebrate the festival of Michael and All Angels on September 29. While Gabriel is probably the best-known angel for announcing to Mary that she would bear the Son of God, "the archangel Michael" is named in Jude 9; in Daniel 12:1 he is called "Michael, the great prince, the protector of [the] people"; and in Revelation 12:7 we read of "Michael and his angels." In each case, Michael is involved in a cosmic battle revealed to someone in a vision as a message from God.

In fact, whenever angels appear in Scripture, the Hebrew word is "messenger," which in Greek is *angelos* — thus, the English "angel." The Bible doesn't say much about what angels looked like, but surely they weren't the cute cherubs of modern pop art. Given their most common greeting, "Do not be afraid," it must have been startling to see one.

Why celebrate Michael and All Angels? First, it reminds us there is more to God's realm than we humans can see or comprehend. No matter the exact structure or appearance of angels, God sometimes uses them to communicate with us. Second, by broadening our understanding we can serve as angels ourselves: *messengers* of God's love and grace to the world.

A CHEERFUL WHAT?

Guideposts editor Mary Ann O'Roark recalls hearing the phrase "cheerful liver" so often in church as a girl that she asked her grandmother what a liver is. "It's a part inside you, like your stomach or your heart," Grandma replied.

Rather confused, O'Roark tried to figure out how to be cheerful from the inside out. Then during Sunday school one week, a classmate explained that God loves a cheerful *giver*, not liver. Years later, however, O'Roark realized that her younger self wasn't too far off the mark. After all, God does indeed love someone who *lives* cheerfully, spreading the hope and joy that he longs for all people to know!

After all, it was Jesus who said, "I came that [all] may have life, and have it abundantly" (John 10:10, NRSV).

GOD LANGUISHES WITH US

A headline from last spring teased, "There's a Name for the Blah You're Feeling." The writer decided what he and others felt as the pandemic wore on wasn't burnout or depression but *languishing* decreasing vitality; feeling dispirited. People of ancient times experienced this too: "The land of Egypt and the land of Canaan languished because of the famine" (Genesis 47:13). "The wine dries up, the vine languishes, all the merry-hearted sigh" (Isaiah 24:7). But there's more.

If you used to be "merry-hearted" but now sigh a lot, hear this: "The heavens languish together with the earth" (Isaiah 24:4). Isaiah uses "the heavens" to refer to God, who languishes with us. Like an empathizing friend, God sits *with* us in our struggle. Sure, we pray for rescue *now*: "I am languishing; O Lord, heal me" (Psalm 6:2). But when our timing isn't God's, we trust his promise of restoration: "[God] will wipe every tear from their eyes … mourning and crying and pain will be no more" (Revelation 21:4).

With the psalmist we hold two truths at once: "My soul languishes for your salvation; I hope in your word" (119:81).

OUR HELP — PAST, PRESENT AND FUTURE

This month, America marks the 20th anniversary of the 9/11 terrorist attacks, which ended almost 3,000 lives and changed life forever for millions more. The nation was shaken to its very roots, with violence jolting out of us any assumption that "it can't happen here." September 11 banished any lingering notion that being on the side of "liberty and justice for all" served as insulation against mass tragedy. We now had more to fear than fear itself.

Psalm 46 reminds us that "though the earth should change" (v. 2) — as it did on 9/11 —God remains "our refuge and strength, a very present help in trouble" (v. 1). We are never alone or without hope, even on life-altering days.

How have God's presence and power sustained you through life's changes? How might sharing your story help someone else when their world or faith gets shaken?

The Parable of the Rich Man and Lazarus found in the Gospel of Luke gives an illustration of what's happening in our nation today in regard to the deaths related to the COVID-19 pandemic.

The rich man and Lazarus both died in the parable. But it is the conversation that the rich man has with father Abraham that can give us a reflection to our modern pandemic situation. The rich man asked Abraham, "*'father, I beg you to send him to my father's house—for I have five brothers—that he may warn them, so that they will not also come into this place of torment.' Abraham replied, "They have Moses and the prophets; they should listen to them.' He said, 'No father Abraham; but if someone goes to them from the dead, they will repent.' He said to him, 'If they do not listen to Moses and the prophets, neither will they be convinced even if someone rises from the dead.' "Luke 16.27-31.*

Segments of the population have not been moved to get vaccinated with the recent rise of the more contagious Delta Variant in the COVID-19 pandemic.

As of August 16, 2021, the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported a total of 619,564 deaths in the United States from the COVID-19 pandemic.

Read any of the national newspapers and you will find stories from the Washington Post to the Wall Street Journal of the testimonies from patients who have regretted not getting the COVID-19 vaccine. Patients on their deathbed call on family and friends to get vaccinated. They lay dying with regrets. This sounds like torment. The patients that have survived the ordeal have become evangelists spreading the news to get vaccinated before being tormented by the disease.

Still, some people insist that the pandemic is a hoax. Others, believe that being vaccinated infringes on their freedom. Yet others claim that if you are strong enough you will survive it. If not, it was your time to go.

Some don't believe science. Some don't believe the numbers of deaths. Worse, some don't believe the very family member dying from the pandemic on their deathbed. Do we see a reflection from the parable in our modern society way of thinking?

The parable hopes, however, that there is a reversal from the possible misfortune like the one received by the rich man. The parable serves as a reminder of the action we can take today before we find ourselves on our deathbed.

My prayer is that you stay safe and follow the proper guidelines and procedures.
