Dear Members and Friends,

In thinking about the upcoming Thanksgiving holiday, I'm reminded of Paul's letter and the number of times he gives thanks to God in prayer. "I do not cease to give thanks for you, remembering you in my prayers." (Eph. 1:16) Paul was forgiven much so he was thankful for all the blessings he received. The Psalms often have

words of thankfulness like "Give thanks to the Lord . . ." then lists many things for which the Psalmist was thankful. Do we do the same in our prayers?

Isn't that oftentimes the case with us, that we neglect to give thanks for our blessings? I'm quick to list my needs in prayer but forget to thank God for my blessings. Maybe we don't take a brief inventory of our blessings each time we pray. When I get ill and recover, I give thanks for my restored health. But it takes an illness to remind me of the blessing of a healthy state that I normally enjoy. When I narrowly miss having a car accident, I give thanks for God's protection. But why does it take a near miss to wake me up to recognize God's constant care?

Any time we pray, our hearts should overflow with thanksgiving for the many blessings we've received. Any time we pray we should take inventory of the many blessings God provides like: health, jobs, family, friends, homes, clothing, food, etc. There's always something in our lives for which we can be thankful. If we have trouble, think of the Psalmist, he knew how to thank God for many things in times of joy and sorrow. The Psalmist knew of travail and tragedy, but could perceive God's mercy piercing the darkness and regularly gave thanks. Therefore, whenever you pray, "Give thanks to the Lord, for he is good, for his steadfast love endures forever."

# MONTHLY MADDNESS FUNDRAISER – GIVE THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING!

St. Paul's is once again participating in the Monthly Maddness fundraiser in conjunction with Dan Schantz Greenhouse. A purchase of a gift card for \$20 will give the gift card recipient a specific flower (or pumpkin) gift each month during 2022 – a \$75 value. St. Paul's will receive \$10 on every card sold – proceeds will go toward the cost of snow removal. Redeeming your monthly gift is easy - simply present the gift card at Dan Schantz Greenhouse on Lehigh Street in Allentown any time during the month and pick up your gift. Note that you do not need to make a purchase when picking up your gift. And if you cannot get there during a particular month, the card can be used during that month in 2023. Here is what is offered for each month in 2022.



We are taking orders for Monthly Maddness cards beginning September 12, and will continue through November 21. This time, we will have two delivery dates. If you purchase your card(s) by **October 10**, you can pick them up at church on **October 17**. If you purchase your card(s) between **October 11 and November 21**, you can pick them up at church on **November 28**.

You can purchase cards before/after Sunday worship. If you are attending indoor worship, look for the display – pick up an envelope and fill out your contact info along with number of cards requested. Price is \$20/card. Place your cash or check in the envelope and drop the envelope in the box labeled Monthly Maddness. If you are attending the parking lot service, ask an usher for an envelope, fill out your contact info along with number of cards requested. Place your cash or check in the envelope and return to an usher. Please make your checks payable to St. Paul's Lutheran Church, and write **gift card** on the memo line.

If you are unable to pick up your gift cards on October 17 or November 28, call Judy (610) 914-7782 to set up a time to pick up.

#### HONORING OUR VETERANS

Veterans Day has its roots in what was called Armistice Day, when a peace agreement ended World War I on November 11, 1918. President



Wilson proclaimed that Armistice Day was to be marked with solemn pride in heroism and with gratitude for victory as well as the "opportunity it has given America to show her sympathy with peace and justice." In 1954, the remembrance was renamed Veterans Day to honor all U.S. military personnel. It's a reminder to pray for and honor all who serve and sacrifice, to support and assist their families, and to pray that God will bring peace on earth.

#### THE JOURNEY BEGINS AT ADVENT

When Advent begins on November 28 this year, so does a new church year for liturgical congregations. The church seasons, which correspond to key events in Jesus' life, begin with the four-week Advent period of preparation for our coming Savior at Christmas. After the 12-day season of Christmas is Epiphany, which begins January 6 and continues through Ash Wednesday, the beginning of Lent. That period of preparation culminates in Holy Week, and then Easter marks the pinnacle of every church year. Forty days after the Resurrection we celebrate Ascension, and 10 days after that, the Pentecost season begins; it lasts until Advent, when the cycle begins again.

"Like a great waterwheel," writes Joan Chittister, "the liturgical year goes on relentlessly irrigating our souls, softening the ground of our hearts, nourishing the soil of our lives until the seed of the Word of God itself begins to grow in us, comes to fruit in us, ripens in us the spiritual journey of a lifetime."

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.



# A NEW THANKSGIVING TRADITION

At Thanksgiving, we give thanks for things (food, home, clothing, work) and loved ones (family, friends, pets). But if the people we name aren't present, they may never know how precious they are to us. This November, start a new tradition by writing notes of thanks to people you appreciate.

Follow Paul's model of starting letters with thanksgiving: "First, I thank my God through Jesus Christ for all of you, because your faith is being reported all over the world" (Romans 1:8, NIV). Notice how he thanks his addressees by thanking God for them. Paul is specific too, not writing, "Thanks for everything!"

Expressing genuine thanksgiving to God and another person, you might write something like this:

Dear Judy, This Thanksgiving I'm thinking about special people in my life. You are one! I thank God for our friendship, for your strong witness for Jesus and for your willingness to lend a hand as a substitute teacher. (Your chocolate cookies are icing on the cake!) I praise God for you! Sincerely, Joan

#### THE SUBVERSIVE TABLE

"The Lord's Supper [is] a profoundly subversive political event in the lives of the participants," writes Richard Beck in *Unclean*. "The sacrament brings real people — divided in the larger world — into a sweaty, intimate, flesh-and-blood embrace where 'there shall be no difference between them and the rest." Beck is quoting Walt Whitman, for whom "them" refers to "the wicked and the righteous."

In our day, I think of political conservatives and liberals who receive equally the grace of God through Christ's body and blood. I think of the man in a church I pastored, who took pride in stirring up controversy. I didn't like him. But at the Lord's table, though "divided in the larger world," we shared a sacrament with no difference between us.

I think of my former parish near an Air Force base. Many members were military personnel and surely knew one another's rank. But in church — at the conference table, the dinner table and especially the communion table — no difference existed between a colonel and a captain, a commissioned officer and an NCO. It was a beautiful example of God's kingdom subverting the world's tendency to divide.


#### **A BLESSING OR A CURSE?**

Holocaust survivor and devout Christian Corrie ten Boom recounts how her sister Betsie thanked God for the fleas infesting their packed barracks. When Corrie resisted the idea, Betsie pointed out that 1 Thessalonians 5:18 says to "give thanks in all circumstances."

Still, Corrie wasn't convinced — until the sisters realized the infestation kept the guards away, giving prisoners in those quarters freedom to worship and pray. The biting pests, which seemed like added misery, became a blessing.

Anger and bitterness sometimes cloud our vision, causing us to forget to thank God *in* all situations, though not necessarily *for* them. Other times we don't wait long enough for blessings to be revealed. But faith is like waiting through a storm, knowing a rainbow is coming eventually. Meanwhile, the Lord holds an umbrella for us, and the closer with him we walk, the less wet we'll get.

# **Being the Church in a Time of Pandemic**

As this article is being written, social distancing and "stay at home" orders in response to the spread of the Coronavirus are preventing our congregations from gathering for face-to-face worship. But in the midst of circumstances that keep people from "going to church," it is heartening to see the ways in which the congregations of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod are focusing on God's call to "be the church," bringing a message of hope to their members and their surrounding communities. Leaders are discovering a number of creative ways in which God's people can still "gather" for worship and conversation - via Zoom, Facebook Live, YouTube, email, telephone chains, cars parked at a drive-in movie theater, and other means.

In addition to worship, prayers, and pastoral care for members, congregations are also turning their focus outward to bring tangible expressions of God's presence and love in the midst of extraordinary circumstances to their most vulnerable neighbors. This brief article highlights just two of these outreach ministries, as examples of the kinds of things that are happening in numerous sites across the territory of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod.



In addition, there are concerns for the safety of both the volunteers who staff the pantry and those who come for food. Barbara reports, "Due to this crisis we have begun a drive-up pantry pick up for our families. Each family receives three bags of non-perishable foods along with a bag of frozen meats, vegetables, butter, fresh fruits and cheese. This has helped us to maintain social distancing as well as keep our volunteers safe."

# The Food Pantry at Holy Trinity, Dingmans Ferry

Every weekday morning, volunteers gather at Holy Trinity Lutheran Church in rural Pike County to prepare bags of food for community members who are food insecure. In the past, typically 85 - 95 families would turn to Holy Trinity each month to supplement their nutritional needs. Food Pantry Director, Barbara Hupner, reports that the number of those turning to the pantry has increased due to the Coronavirus pandemic. And the members of Holy Trinity are responding, even as some of the traditional sources of food - such as donations from individuals or local stores have decreased.



# The Food Pantry at Hope Lutheran Church and Hope's Table, Reading

Hope Lutheran Church in the northwest section of the City of Reading, and its partner ministry, Hope's Table, together host the largest pantry in the Helping Harvest (Berks and Schuylkill Counties) system. Typically, 200+ families are served in the biweekly distribution. Due to neighbors losing their work - and their income - during the pandemic, at the last pantry more than 350 families came for food.

To counter the empty shelves at local groceries stores, the volunteers at Hope's Pantry are committed to providing more items for those who turn to the pantry, rather than less. In addition to the food they receive from Helping Harvest, the congregation has developed partnerships with other congregations, local restaurants, bakeries, and farmers to provide healthy nutritional options for their





guests. They are also

collecting other items, such as toilet paper, cleaning products, and soap that that they distribute to families on each Thursday.

Meanwhile, the staff members of Café Esperanza, another ministry birthed by Hope, are offering drive-by or walk-by cooked meals to neighborhood residents

two evenings a week - to supplement the prepared food assistance that is available to families through the Reading School system.



Delivery is available for those who can't come to the congregation's parking lot. Advertised only through word of mouth and a sign at the church, the response of the community has been notable - both in terms of the growing numbers of those coming for assistance and the growing numbers of those who want to support the ministry!

These two congregations - in different corners of the synod and in two very different contexts - are endeavoring to "be the church" by seeing the face of Jesus in their most vulnerable neighbors in this unprecedented time and responding in love. We know there are many other congregations conducting similar ministries that are also bringing to life Jesus' parable from Matthew 25:31-46, "Lord, when did we see you hungry and feed you...." #### Dear Lehigh Mission District The Bible, Jesus, and Critical Race Theory

Jesus said to his disciples, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and the Holy Spirit and teaching them to obey everything that I have commanded you. And remember I am with you always to the end of the age." Matthew 28:19

The current topic of conversation in our nation and around our local school districts is the claim that teachers are teaching critical race theory to elementary and high school students.

This has led activists to ban children's picture and story books from classrooms that have been written by Black, Latino, Jewish, Asian, and Native American writers. It should be noted that CRT is not taught in any school districts, nor does it form part of the school's curriculum. Many state departments of education set the academic standards for school districts and teachers to follow. Furthermore, any donated books to a school or its library does not imply an endorsement of said books, the person donating the book, or of the organization. Many school boards have this disclaimer in their policies and bylaws.

So, why are some angry Christians disrupting school board meetings to ban children's picture and story books? Is it because these books are written by people of color?

If so, what are we to do with the Bible written by people of color? What do these angry Christians do with a Jewish Savior? Jesus didn't speak English. He spoke Hebrew and Aramaic. Jesus dressed in his ethnic clothing. He ate his ethnic food. He worked as a carpenter; a profession mostly exercised by many immigrants today. He was an immigrant child whose father and mother sought safety for the family in Egypt. Jesus is not a white Lutheran man. Have these angry activists read the Bible? This Jewish Savior called Jesus would have had black hair and a cinnamon completion.

The opening verse above from Matthew is known as the Great Commission. The word nations is the Greek word ethnos from which we get the word ethnic. Ethnos can be translated as nations, peoples, gentiles, or tribes.

In Jesus' time the disciples would have understood ethnos as nations. They would have recalled their history either in captivity or in exile in Egypt, Babylon, Assyria, Syria, and Lebanon. They would have also understood ethnos to mean gentiles since they lived within the gentile government of the Roman Empire. They would have also understood ethnos in relationship to their own Twelve Tribes of Israel.

Since the Greek word ethnos is in the Bible text, let's translate ethnos as ethnicities. "Go therefore and make disciples of all ethnicities." I believe using the word ethnicities is clear for our time. What comes to mind is walking through the grocery store with a shopping cart and encountering the aisle sign above that reads - ethnic foods. What do we do? God calls us not to turn our shopping cart around but to go right in and as one community in Christ be fed.

Today ethnicities are highlighted by some in society only to be regarded with discontent, biases, prejudices, and racism. In contrast, Jesus's Great Commission to the disciples is a call to embrace all ethnicities, tribes, gentiles, peoples, and nations. Jesus commands his disciples to welcome all ethnicities.

I think that's what makes Jesus's Commission to the Christian Church GREAT.

Jesus' disciples were commissioned to come out of their ethnic circle to proclaim to other ethnicities, nations, peoples, gentiles, and tribes the teachings of Christ.

Jesus's Great Commission is the teaching of acceptance of God's ethnic diversity in this world. The Great Commission is God's call of acceptance of one another and in the process being transformed into the beautiful community God intended. Christ tells his disciples that all ethnicities are welcomed to the waters of baptism. God accepts all ethnicities.

We need to step out of our ethnic circles and into another ethnic circle. In this approach, Jesus gave us His own example when Emmanuel became one of us. Jesus's Great Commission is a transformation. It is divine acceptance. It is a shower of love for all ethnicities to come together and celebrate.
