Dear Members and Friends,

The season of Christmas . . .

During Christmas, God's people celebrate Jesus' birth and regard the season as a time of gladness and joy. We revel in God's wonderful ways and rejoice in God's flesh-and-blood presence with us. The season of Epiphany . . .

Some years ago, a reporter asked the mother of a girl killed in the Columbine High School shootings how she managed. Struggling to put her faith into words, the mother, a Christian, stammered about hope – "I have to have hope in my life in order to go on."

Two millenia ago, a middle-eastern ruler named Herod asked foreign scholars how they managed their journey to the war-torn land of the Jews. Struggling to put their astrology into lay language, they described a hope stirred in them by a rising star – "We had to come and worship the new king."

That American mother and the oriental magi share our deep human hope for someone to make sense of our lives and bring light to the darkness in our world.

The season of Epiphany in the Christian church year is a celebration by us who are not descendants of Abraham, Isaac and Jacob, a celebration that hope – light in the darkness – is ours, too, in Jesus Christ, the Lord!

In this way, Epiphany is a season of light – the Lord's light – that has entered our lives and helps us see beyond the darkness. We see that the Lord keeps his promise to reach out and reclaim us through his Son and to energize our lives with his work in the world.

May you have a joyous Christmas season and a happy New Year!

TURNING BACK

In 1569 Holland, Dirk Willems, a member of the Anabaptist (now known as Mennonite) church, was imprisoned for refusing to belong to the state church. He escaped and was running across a pond's thin ice when the guard in pursuit fell through. Hearing the drowning man's cries, Willems turned back to rescue him, even though it meant his capture and subsequent execution.

Four centuries later, civil rights icon Martin Luther King Jr. urged us to love our enemies by not defeating them "when the opportunity presents itself." Eventually we'll have chances to get back at people who misuse or gossip about us, he said. But "the meaning of love" is in not doing so. "In the final analysis, love is not this sentimental something that we talk about," said King. "It's not merely an emotional something. Love is creative, understanding goodwill for all [people]. It is the refusal to defeat any individual."

WHAT'S IN A NAME?

As the U.S. evacuated thousands from Afghanistan in August 2021, an Afghan woman gave birth on a plane. She named her daughter Reach — the name of the aircraft that brought her family to safety.

Many people name their children after loved ones or special events; a child born on Christmas might be called Noel or Holly. In Bible times, too, names often had meanings: Eve likely means "mother of all living"; Abraham, "father of many"; Isaac, "laughter." Moses is a play on words with the Hebrew for "draw out" because Pharaoh's daughter drew him from the Nile.

Of course, the most important biblical name is Jesus, which means "The Lord saves." As the angel told Joseph, "[Mary] will bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins" (Matthew 1:21, ESV). The Christian church traditionally celebrates Name of Jesus on January 1. But every day, as we pray in Jesus' name, we remember that what's in *this* name is the salvation God offers to all.

When Ida Nelson, head tribal clerk of a remote Alaskan village, heard an airplane flying low after dark, she knew something was wrong. Igiugig (Igggy-yaw-gigg), population 70, isn't normally a nighttime destination. Indeed, the medevac flight was coming to pick up a sick child.

Because the local airstrip's lights had been vandalized, the plane was having trouble landing. Nelson began alerting neighbors, and within minutes, villagers lined the runway with their vehicles, headlights blazing. The pilot was able to land and then safely deliver the sick child to an Anchorage hospital. The airlift service praised the residents' determination, but Nelson describes their effort as "normal" and "ordinary."

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

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Covid-19 Update & Guidelines

The Latest Situation: The Covid-19 pandemic continues to generate fear, concern, confusion and division across the country and within our own Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod. The most recent developments – some troubling, some hopeful – include:

• The rise of new variants, especially "omicron";

- The ongoing and in many cases, increasing numbers of new cases;
- The continued reluctance and refusal of some to get vaccinated, or to wear masks;
- On the good side: the increased opportunities for testing, for boosters, and for vaccines for all ages.

Here in our Synod, I now encourage us to use another trustworthy source of information to help guide our decisions concerning the pandemic: the "Covid Act Now Coalition." This non-profit, web-based resource brings together non-partisan experts in medicine, law, and public policy, to provide objective data and analysis. Their website is being consulted as a reliable source by synods and congregations across the ELCA. From their site, we can see clearly that things are still very threatening here in NE Penn: all 14 of our counties have threat levels of "VERY HIGH" or "SEVERE" – Berks, Carbon, Lehigh, Northampton, and Schuylkill all are in that worst category. Additionally, the vaccination rate is at or below 60% for 7 of those 14 counties. Most of these numbers are worse than the data for many of our neighboring synods, including the Southeastern Penn Synod, whose leaders have nonetheless chosen to put in place stricter guidelines than we have. I believe we can become safer and return to "normal" sooner if we follow their lead.

Dr. Luther Shows The Way:

Almost exactly 500 years ago – in November 1520 – Martin Luther published one of his most ground-breaking treatises: "On the Freedom of a Christian." He begins the document with this famous declaration: "A Christian is the most free lord of all, subject to none. And a Christian is the most dutiful servant of all, and subject to everyone."

He goes on to describe how God, through Christ's sacrificial love for us on the cross, has granted us the grace and the freedom to make our own decisions; but this freedom does not release us to disregard the truth, or our call to care and concern for our neighbor. Luther writes: "Therefore [Christians] should be guided in all [their] works by this thought and contemplate this one thing alone, that [they] may serve and benefit others in all that [they do], considering nothing except the need and the advantage of [the] neighbor."

So "what does this mean?" The inconvenience of mask wearing; and even the threat of temporary cold-and-flu reactions to vaccinations – these are simply the sacrifices we are called to make, as "the dutiful servants of all, subject to everyone." It is within this traditionally and theologically Lutheran framing that we maintain our vigilance; and update our guidelines here.

Covid-19 Continued...

Latest Synod Recommendations:

As we prepare for the larger crowds of Christmas Eve – and with Lent, Holy Week and Easter not far away – I am recommending the starting, the continuation, or the resumption, of any and all common-sense and good-neighbor precautions, including:

- Proof of vaccination or a negative test for all indoor events
 - Indoor masking
 - Good air circulation, including open windows where feasible
- Social distancing, frequent washing and other effective protocols

Furthermore – at their January 15 meeting, I am encouraging our Synod Council to discuss and decide upon further appropriate actions, which may include mandates that all Synodsponsored indoor events require masking, proof of vaccination, and/or proof of a negative test. As the duly elected governing body of this Synod, your Synod Council has the right and responsibility to make these decisions for Synod gatherings. When it comes to our individual worshipping communities, our authority is more limited; Synod Council (and myself) can only make clear and strong recommendations - based on the best science, on good conscience and on our common love for our neighbors, especially those who are most vulnerable. In other words, all congregations have the "freedom of a Christian" to decide for themselves how they will choose to act or refuse to act. I invite us all to follow our baptismal call and Lutheran heritage, to follow God's will and God's love for all.
