Dear Members and Friends,

Can you believe it's Lent already! Ash Wednesday is March 2. Lent is a season of 40 days not including Sundays. Lent is a journey to the cross of Jesus Christ. I'm reminded of the two famous journeys in our bible. "The Lord God has led you these forty years in the wilderness, that he might humble you, testing you to know what was

in your heart" (Deut. 8:2). God set the Israelites free from slavery in Egypt and brought them through the parted waters of the Red Sea. He led them through the desert for 40 years, testing them and shaping them as his people. At the end of their journey, they stood ready to enter the Promised Land.

The second journey is Jesus' journey. "Jesus, full of the Holy Spirit, returned from the Jordan and was led by the Spirit in the wilderness for forty days, being tempted by the devil" (Luke 4:1-2). As he began his earthly ministry Jesus was baptized by John. Stepping from the waters of the Jordan River, Jesus was led by the Spirit into the desert for 40 days, there to be tested by the devil. At the end of his journey, Jesus emerged triumphant over Satan's temptations, prepared to take up his road to the cross.

As Jesus takes this journey, we will follow him as he enters Jerusalem, celebrates the Passover with his disciples, prays in Gethsemane and suffers betrayal and arrest. We will see him condemned to death – for us. Lent is a season of repentance, as we acknowledge that it was our sins Jesus carried in his own body to the cross.

Lent is a 40-day journey of worship, prayer and study, a time to grow in faith as we consider the cost of our salvation. We meet together to praise our Savior, confess our sins and receive his forgiveness. We pray and study God's Word, encouraging and building up one another in faith.

At the end of 40 years in the desert, the people of Israel stood at the border of the Promised Land. At the end of 40 days in the wilderness, Jesus stood triumphant over Satan's temptations. At the end of these 40 days of Lent, after following Jesus' path to the cross, we will stand with joy before his empty tomb.

Come join us on this Lenten journey in worship and prayer.

ASH WEDNESDAY

Parking lot service: 9:45 a.m., Inside service: 7:00 p.m.

The season of Lent begins with ashes and ends with alleluias. It is a season of spiritual growth, beginning March 2 and ending six weeks later with the brilliant white of Easter. The first day of Lent, Ash Wednesday is named for the practice of imposing ashes. This year worshipers will have an opportunity to receive ashes. Because of COVID-19, ashes will be imposed through the use of a Q-tip rather than the pastor using his thumb. The use of Q-tips will apply to both the outside service and the inside service.

Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human experience. First, ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." Second, ashes suggest clearing and renewal. Ashes were used anciently in the absence of soap, and on Ash Wednesday ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our Baptism. Third, ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for one day the words "We commit his/her body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" will be said over our bodies. Fourth, ashes are a symbol of repentance, as expressed in Luke 10:13 and the hymn "Savior, When in Dust to Thee," (#601 in our hymnals).

PRAYER SHAWL NEWS SEAFARER'S PROJECT IN 2022?

As most of you know, the Prayer Shawl Group contributed 36 hat and cowl sets, plus 5 additional cowls to the Seafarer's Project. These handmade items were greatly appreciated. We are thinking of making hats and cowls for them again this year, but want to check with our knitters and crocheters to gauge your interest. Please let us know your thoughts on this. Some people preferred to make cowls only, so if that's the case, Judy and I can team up with you to make matching hats. (Note that we always need prayer shawls and lap robes, so if you are not interested in making hats and cowls – shawls are always appreciated!)

If we move forward with this project, we are also considering putting together a set number of gift satchels for the seafarers. A complete gift satchel includes the following items:

- One Sweatshirt hooded or unhooded (size M-L-XL)
- Three Pairs of Socks thermal or gym
- One T- Shirt (size M-L-XL)
- One Knitted Winter Cap (coordinating scarf/cowl optional)
- One Can of Nuts, Large Bar of Chocolate, or Health Snack Bar
- A Holiday or Christmas card from YOU!

We would ask the congregation for donation of smaller items, and possibly use Thrivent Action Team funding for the pricier item(s) – like the hooded sweatshirts. To start out, we would set a goal of **12 satchels**. We would plan to collect these items in September, before Ingathering donations begin.

ST. PAUL'S FIRST ANNUAL BASKET SOCIAL

The Worship and Music and Fellowship/Evangelism Committees have decided to hold a Basket Social on September 17, 2022 from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. For those who may not know, a basket social is a kind of silent auction. Numbered tickets are purchased and people drop their ticket in a can near their choice of a basket. A winning ticket is then drawn from each can at the end of the day of the event.

The committee established a **goal of 50 baskets**. The committee is seeking donations of gift baskets, and/or individual empty baskets, and items for the baskets from members of the congregation. New or nearly new items are preferred. For example, you can donate empty baskets, made up baskets, or items to put in a basket.

We are planning to have "special" baskets which will be bigger and more valuable than the regular baskets. We will also have a big-ticket item which will be a laptop computer. Another feature will be gift cards from local businesses and individuals. Another draw will be a large "basket" of paper products (paper towels, toilet paper, wipes, etc.). Everyone who brings a donated food item will receive a ticket towards winning the paper products.

Each month there will be suggestions of possible themed baskets you may want to donate. For the month of February, we are suggesting donations of baskets (empty), hot beverage baskets, paper products and possible donation of Christmas gifts that people wish to "re-gift." While these are suggestions, all gift baskets, and donations will be accepted any time.

We are also planning to have food and beverages available and plan to have a bake sale for which we will need donations.

Anyone wishing to help with this major project is welcome. We need help.

Please spread the word, talk to your neighbors and friends. They're welcome to donate baskets or items, too. Let's make this a real success.

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Beloved Members of our Synod,

At its January meeting, the Synod Council made the difficult decision to once again hold the Synod Assembly online instead of gathering in person. We know this decision may come as a disappointment to you, and I'd like to explain how the Council came to its decision.

First, please know the decision wasn't easy, nor was it unanimous; however, the decision to move online did pass with an overwhelming majority voting in favor. Initially, many council members, like you, very much wanted to hold the assembly in person and gather as planned in Reading. But in discussion, a few realities just could not be overcome: vaccines were still not available for our youngest children (ages 0-4), a new variant was ushering in extremely high transmission numbers, and our local hospitals were struggling to keep abreast of testing and available beds. Given the swift onset and spread of the Omicron variant, the council wondered at the possibility of a new variant emerging at the time of the Synod Assembly. Like you, we just simply can't see into the future.

The gravity of these unknowns increased when coupled with the fact that there was a significant down payment cost for the facility – a cost we could not recoup even if, for whatever reason, we needed to cancel or downsize the Assembly. Use it, or lose it. As long as I have been chairing Synod Council meetings, I have never witnessed the Council making spendthrift decisions. Each financial decision is taken on deliberately and with care, the council focusing on being good stewards always and in every way. It was, in the end, a financial risk too great to take.

So, once again, we will see you online on June 10th and 11th. But we hope you will find a way to see each other in person, gathering safely in smaller numbers as the situation allows, and enjoying each other's company as we get the business done and see what's happening around our Synod and throughout the ELCA.
