Dear Members and Friends,

There once was a wise and beloved king who cared greatly for his people. Periodically, he would disguise himself and wander through the streets, trying to see life from their perspective.

One day he disguised himself as a poor villager and went to visit the public baths. Many people were enjoying the baths. The water for the baths

was heated by a furnace in the cellar, where one man was responsible for maintaining the comfort level of the water. The king made his way to the basement to visit with the man who tirelessly tended the fire.

The two men shared a meal together, and the king befriended this lonely man. Day after day, week in and week out, the king went to visit the fire tender. The man in the cellar soon became close to his strange visitor because he came down to the basement where he was. No one else ever had showed that much caring or concern.

One day the king revealed his true identity to his friend. It was a risky move, for he feared that the man might ask him for special favors or a gift. Instead, the king's friend looked into is eyes and said, "You left your comfortable palace to sit with me in this hot and dingy cellar. Is that not the message of Easter? God, the one who rules in our lives, gave himself to us in the person Jesus as a gift, the gift of forgiveness, life, and salvation. He comes to us in the Word of the gospel and in the sacrament of Holy Communion. He is the resurrected Jesus given to us in love that has no bounds.

LUTHERAN DISASTER RESPONSE – UKRAINE

To date (April 19th) you have contributed \$1,453.00 to this effort. Two churches in Wisconsin put up \$422,000 to be matched for Ukraine. It was matched within weeks from contributions from Lutheran churches around the country, totaling \$844,000, plus whatever was contributed over that amount through Easter. Thank you for your generous help. Your continued love will get cash directly into the hands of refugees and support the incredible partners, **including other Lutheran congregations near Ukraine** that are welcoming neighbors with loving arms.

There are 3.6+ million people from Ukraine fleeing to other countries (2.1 million to Poland, 317,000 to Moldova, 324,000 to Hungary, 555,000 to Romania, 257,000 to Slovakia). Lutheran World Relief is committing \$4 million to respond to this crisis and are on the ground working with partners in and around Ukraine to rapidly develop programming plans based on short- and long-term goals. They are providing emergency funds to Ukrainian families in Poland. Cash is distributed through Lutheran churches in South Poland. Personal Care kits and quilts were air-lifted from a warehouse in Dubai. With help from other similar partners, they are supporting critical health needs through the provision of medical supplies or support for emergency medical services such as:

- Providing food, shelter, and other critically needed items
- Distributing emergency funds to refugees

By 1882, Decoration Day became known as Memorial Day, and soldiers who died in other wars were honored too. Over time, it became a day to remember all loved ones who have died — in war and otherwise. In 1971, Congress declared Memorial Day a national holiday to

On behalf of the Food Bank, I would like to thank you for your food donation of 194 pounds of canned and other much needed items given on 4/12/22. Your donation allows us to keep our shelves stocked with items that we know our clients appreciate. It also allows our budget for purchasing food to be stretched a little further.

Your support enables us to provide food assistance to 800+ low-income households in the Allentown area every month. Your donation helps us provide vital food resources throughout the year and especially during these critical months of the COVID-19 crisis. Last year alone the Food Bank served over 28,000 people. A recent Penn State University study reports 'over 12% of PA households were experiencing hunger at the end of 2020'.

Our Food Bank serves over 24,000 people each year. Each visit provides our clients with enough groceries, including fresh fruits and vegetables, for a short period. It is with the generous donations, such as yours, that allow us to continue to serve those who are food insecure in our community.

What's it like to be a Pastoral Intern in NEPA? By Melissa Hrdlicka

It is hard to believe I have been on internship with Common Ground Recovery Community for nine months already! My time with Common Ground has been a deep blessing to me and to my education. I have witnessed the presence of God in the open vulnerable sharing during our Wednesday worship, in the heartfelt reverent "thank you's" when serving communion and meals in downtown Reading and in our study of the scriptures and 12-steps. Common Ground truly is a place of radical love and where God's grace embraces our brokenness.

As part of my internship project, I invited our worshiping communities and ministry partners to reflect on these three questions: What does Common Ground mean to you? What does community mean to you? And where do you see God here and in the world? They then drew on white cotton squares that will be sewn together to make an altar cloth to fit all of our communion tables. The responses were profound and beautiful!

There are drawings of stick figures holding hands around the globe, animals peacefully living together, a place of refuge in the storm and in the desert, flowers, hearts, and crosses. There are phrases like, "Freedom, break the chains", "God is love", "We are better together", "Never give up hope because there is hope in everything", and so much more on these 33 squares!

As these squares are knit together to make one, we are reminded that God weaves all of us together in a tapestry of love to bring warmth, comfort, grace, and peace to a weary world! May we live out this good news and may it spill over into thanksgiving! (Colossians 2:2-7)

Lehigh Mission District Spring Assembly -Online Sunday, May 1, starting at 4:00 P.M.

Fethullah Gülen and Martin Luther: Reformers across Contexts and Traditions, but a Shared Spirit. Fethullah Gülen, the Turkish Muslim preacher who has inspired the global Hizmet (service) movement, is clearly a reformer of Islam. How does he compare to the greatest (and most notorious) reformer in the history of Christianity, the sixteenthcentury German Martin Luther? In this talk, Jon Pahl will draw from his long-familiarity with Luther's life and work, and from his recent biography of Fethullah Gülen, to draw some perhaps surprising parallels between the two theologians, across contexts and traditions. Gülen and Luther share emphases on education, vernacular languages, women's equality before God, and advocacy for the oppressed. Both have reputations for passionate and powerful preaching, a penchant for paradox, and were oppressed by state-religious power. In their own lifetimes, Fethullah Gülen and Martin Luther were vilified, but they leave behind remarkable legacies as creative, faithful, and transformative interpreters of deep tradition, and unmistakable contributions to a more just and free world.
