On June 5th we will celebrate Pentecost. On the day of Pentecost, a rushing wind blew into the place where the followers of Christ were in Jerusalem. Divided tongues as of fire rested on each of them, and people were talking to one another in many different languages about the Gospel of the Lord in the person of the crucified,

risen and ascended Jesus. While we may not experience the entry of the Holy Spirit as dramatically in our lives today, we do get glimpses of Pentecost in many ways.

Even using a different translation of the Bible in English can take us to a deeper place spiritually. May the Spirit continue to speak to you and inspire you to serve Christ in the months ahead.

CONFIRMED IN THE FAITH



Confirmation, a rite many churches celebrate each spring, has biblical roots. In Acts 8, Peter and John are sent to lay their hands on new believers and pray for them to receive the Holy Spirit. In the early church, new Christians — usually adult converts — received baptism and confirmation as one ceremony. As more children were brought for baptism, pastors and priests would baptize, but only bishops would "confirm" a baptism, or make it official. Thus, the baptized

were granted full membership in the church through confirmation.

Now confirmation allows young people, often after intensive Christian education, to profess for themselves the faith into which they were baptized. Confirmation serves as an important faith milestone, as young adults purposefully embrace a life of discipleship.

PARISH NURSING NOTES "JUNE IS MEN'S HEALTH MONTH"

June is Men's Health Month making it a great time to raise awareness of preventable health problems and encourage early detection and treatment of diseases. Research has revealed a significant difference between the health of men and women. While the differences are often associated with certain behaviors, it is important to pinpoint major issues so they can be addressed.

Here are some of the facts:

- 1. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), the average life expectancy for a man is five years less than for a woman and over the years, the gap has increased.
- 2. The top three causes of death for a man continue to be heart disease, cancer and unintentional injuries.
- 3. Men are twice as likely to die from a heart attack than a woman and significantly more likely to die of cancers than women.
- 4. Men are less likely to be willing to be treated for mental health issues. The American Psychological Association reports that 30.6% of all men have suffered from depression in their life resulting in a four times likelihood of committing suicide.

While there does not seem to be one reason for the lifespan and health disparity, there are some contributing factors. The Cleveland Clinic reported that in a survey they conducted, only 3 out of 5 men get annual physicals and 40% of men only go to the doctor when they think they have a serious medical condition. An additional factor is that men tend to be employed in higher risk occupations such as firefighting, construction and mining.

This month, I encourage the men and boys in our congregation to follow some recommendations to help you stay healthy.

1. Stay updated on your vaccinations! This is particularly important during the COVID-19 pandemic. Your primary care physician (PCP) can help to keep you on track of all vaccinations recommended for your age. If you do not have a PCP – please get one as soon as possible!!

- Do recommended screenings! Your PCP can keep you on track with these. Screenings for diabetes, liver issues, cholesterol, prostate cancer are age related and your PCP will help you to arrange for these. Routine blood pressure checks and height/weight are part of annual exams.
- 3. Lower your stress! Statistics show that men have more difficulty handling stress than women. One of the reasons for this may be that women tend to have better social networks with a circle of friends in which they can confide. More than half of men say that their health is not something that they talk about. Take the time to identify sources of stress and focus on activities to relieve stress.
- 4. **Be aware of risky behaviors!** Limiting alcohol intake and not smoking lower the risk of liver disease, heart disease and a wide range of cancers. Be sure to always wear your seatbelts and wear a helmet if riding a motorcycle or bike.
- 5. Watch what you eat! The National Institute of Health (NIH) reports that more than 60% of adult American men are overweight or obese leading to heart disease, type 2 diabetes and breathing disorders. Try to limit your intake of salt and processed foods. Focus on lean meats, vegetables and fruit. Foods with high fat and carbohydrate content should be limited. Types of these foods are white bread, pasta, pizza, fried foods, processed meats, fast foods and sweets. To balance a healthy lifestyle, try to exercise for about 30 minutes three to four times a week.

The men in our lives are very important to us. Please consider the recommendations above for yourself and for the loved ones in your life!

CELEBRATING THE CHURCH'S BIRTHDAY



On Pentecost, we remember when the Holy Spirit descended on Jesus' disciples. As they gathered in Jerusalem 10 days after Jesus' ascension, they saw tongues of fire, heard rushing wind and began speaking in many languages. Because the disciples could then share the good news with all the pilgrims assembled for the Pentecost festival, the occasion marks the birthday of the Christian church. That day alone, about 3,000 people devoted their lives to Christ.

Like the Holy Spirit, Pentecost is important and relevant today. As theologian Henri Nouwen writes, "Without Pentecost the Christ-event — the life, death and resurrection of Jesus — remains imprisoned in history as something to remember, think about and reflect on. The Spirit of Jesus comes to dwell within us, so that we can become living Christs here and now."

GRATEFUL PEOPLE ARE JOYFUL PEOPLE

In a 2013 TED Talk, David Steindl-Rast says many people think happiness leads to gratefulness. "Think again," he says. "Is it really the happy people that are grateful? We all know ... people who have everything it [takes] to be happy, and they are not happy, because they want something else or they want more of the same. And we all know people who have lots of misfortune [yet] are deeply happy. ... Why? Because they are grateful. So it is not happiness that makes us grateful. It's gratefulness that makes us happy."

We must be cautious: Depression is a real illness, and therapy or medicine may be necessary to help us feel "happy" and enjoy life again. Also, "joy" is perhaps a more fitting word than "happiness"; happiness can be fleeting and superficial, while joy is heart-deep and abiding. In Jesus, even when we're sad or struggling or fearful, we can have joy — the confidence that God holds us in his arms. And for that, we can be grateful. Indeed, Steindl-Rast concludes, "Grateful people are joyful people."



SYNOD NEWS

NORTHEASTERN PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD, ELCA



"When you pass through the waters, I will be with you; and through the rivers, they shall not overwhelm you..." [Isaiah 43:2] This is the promise God made to the people of Israel, in a time when the whole nation was suffering the consequences of their turning away from their primary mission: to love God and love neighbor – especially, neighbors with the least advantages, status and resources. For our time, our church, and our synod, one of our most troubling issues is the sin of racism. Isaiah goes on to say: "Bring forth the people who are blind, yet have eyes, who are deaf, yet have ears!" [Is. 43:8] This speaks to the first step to take into those troubled waters: opening our eyes and ears to see and listen – with minds and hearts willing to go beneath the smooth surface and stir up the stories and truths that, though troubling, will clear the way for God "to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? I will make a way in the wilderness and rivers in the desert." [Is. 43:19]


On May 22, 2021, the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod hosted a virtual conference called "Trouble the Water," an inaugural day of racial justice worship and workshops. The goal of this event was to help our congregations to be more welcoming to Black, indigenous, and people of color; and to focus on racial justice and reconciliation within our churches, communities, and synod.

Participants were welcomed with a brief introduction to what we hoped to accomplish, and a request for participants to join us in that troubled water – to be willing to experience the discomfort caused by the ripples, and to plan to ride the waves of change and progress that we hoped to create. The organizers started with a land acknowledgment, acknowledged our shared national history of racism and discrimination, and explained that such historical acknowledgment was not about blaming us as individuals today, but about understanding how we came to be where we are in order to understand how to move forward together.

Next, we all worshiped together with song, prayer, and a sermon by Rev. Dr. James Thomas on "The Sins of Racism." Following worship, The Reverend CeCee Mills delivered an incredibly powerful keynote address, and after that two sets of concurrent workshops were offered. The first set of workshop options included Understanding Microaggressions, Trauma-Informed Neighborhood Engagement, Understanding Implicit Bias, and a presentation on the community organizing group POWER Northeast. The second set of workshops included Seeing and Disrupting Racism; Understanding White Privilege; and Church Together (led by ELCA Director of Racial Justice Jennifer De Leon).

The "Trouble the Water" event provided important space for honest, difficult conversation: wrestling with systemic racism and naming our complicity in a broken, inequitable system. Your gifts cultivate a Synod culture that listens to the stories of all people and actively works towards reflecting the Kingdom of God. Our ELCA has a mission of encountering 1 million new, young, and diverse people with the Good News in Jesus Christ. Thank you for your faithful, generous, and consistent giving to Mission Support.
