PARISH NURSING NOTES "Swimming Safety Tips" July/August 2022 Peggy Saylor, RN

Now that the summer season is here, it is a suitable time to review some swimming safety tips. Latest news reports expressed concern regarding the COVID-19 pandemic and its effects on swimming safety. With the recent shutdowns, lifeguard training and recertifications were put on hold. Swimming lessons for children were cancelled. These two facts contribute to concerns over swimming safety over the summer. According to the Center for Disease Control (CDC), the leading cause of accidental death in children ages 1 - 4 is drowning. It is also the second leading cause of accidental death in children ages 5 - 9 years of age.

Listed are some tips regarding swimming safety:

- First, teach children how to swim. Lessons are available privately or at many community pools. Another important lesson is to teach kids on how to get out of the water. One drill that can be done is to have the child jump, turn, swim back to the wall and get out. This simulates the incident of falling into the water, identifying the closet wall which is usually behind the child and then how to climb out properly.
- 2. Always have a designated water watcher. This should be someone who is not distracted by conversations, reading materials or their phone. Do not assume in a large group that there is someone watching, always designate someone. It is suggested that after 15 minutes a different adult is designated to prevent "watcher burn-out."
- 3. Never let your child swim alone regardless of their ability. As my grandmother used to say, "you can drown in a teacup full of water."
- 4. Drowning does not always look like the preconceived vision of drowning. Drowning is often silent and can occur in less than five minutes. It is suggested that children not play games that involve holding their breath underwater for extended periods.
- 5. If someone is struggling in water, do not jump in the water to save them. Instead throw a life jacket or use something to reach them.
- 6. Instruct your children not to swim or play around pool drains or suction outlets.

- 7. Wear a U.S. Coast Guard approved life jacket when participating in water activities or boating. Simply having the life jacket on board is not enough protection.
- 8. Always swim in designated areas where there is a lifeguard, especially at the ocean due to various depths of water and rip currents.

DUAL CITIZENSHIP

For Christianity and democracy to work, both need responsible citizens. Consider what happens to a republic when its citizens won't run for public office, won't vote, won't work for the common good, duck paying taxes and mistreat others. Now consider what happens when Christians won't volunteer at the church, won't give, won't practice their faith, won't love their neighbors. Both our country and our faith need sincere practitioners. Nationally, we need a citizenry committed to making the ideals of liberty the practices of life in America. Christianity needs followers of Jesus committed to making the ideals of God's kingdom the practices of daily life.

This is not an either-or situation. Christians everywhere are citizens of two countries, one on earth and one in eternity. The kingdom of God is not yet fully come, but it's already in effect. Our two citizenships can neither be fully united nor fully separated. We cannot withdraw from the world and pretend we are somehow dwelling only in the kingdom of God now; nor can we simply embrace the world and assume earthly governments fulfill God's will. Those are extremes, and they are unbiblical.

Supremely, Jesus gives to all the meal of Holy Communion, the bread and wine that are his very body and blood.
