PARISH NURSING NOTES

"COVID-19, Monkeypox and Polio - Oh My!" September 2022 Peggy Saylor, RN

Just when we thought the "virus scene" was starting to cool down, several new threats have emerged. Let's start with the good news:

On August 11th, the Center for Disease Control (CDC) revised several recommendations in dealing with COVID-19.

- 1. The policy for quarantining after close contact (within 6 feet for more than 15 minutes) if you were not vaccinated or vaccinated but not boostered was loosened to just wearing a high-quality mask for 10 days and testing after 5 days regardless of your vaccination status. If symptoms would begin, the testing should be done as soon as possible, and you should quarantine until the results are known. The exception to this recommendation would be for individuals in a hospital setting or high-risk group-living situations.
- 2. Less emphasis on social distancing while continuing careful risk assessment of settings with higher community levels of COVID-19 and the importance of good ventilation.

The CDC continues to emphasize the importance of being up to date with vaccinations to protect against serious illness, hospitalization and death. Please stay updated when new vaccines are being offered.

Now the bad news. Monkeypox has reared its ugly head. It is a rare disease that was discovered in 1958 but is now being detected in some areas. Monkeypox is in the same family as the virus that causes smallpox but is not related to chickenpox. It is spread through close physical contact, usually skin-to-skin but can also be spread through touching objects that have been used by someone with Monkeypox. Symptoms include a rash that may be located on or near the genital area, anus or other areas like the hands, feet, chest, face or mouth. Other symptoms can include fever, chills, swollen lymph nodes, fatigue, muscle aches or respiratory symptoms such as sore throat, nasal congestion, or cough. Symptoms usually start within 3 weeks of exposure and can last 2-4 weeks. The disease can be transmitted from the time that the symptoms start until the rash has healed, all the scabs have fallen off and a fresh layer of skin has formed.

Finally, polio cases have been identified in several states including New York. Public health officials are concerned that the recent delays in children getting vaccinated during the pandemic as well as antivaccination sentiments will lead to more cases. Polio is totally preventable with administration of the polio vaccine but there is no cure once the disease has occurred. Officials are stressing the importance of getting vaccinated to prevent this crippling disease.

These were the current updates as of mid-August. Time will tell what the future holds!

PURSUING PEACE

The 2021 book *Love, Loss and Endurance: A 9/11 Story of Resilience and Hope in an Age of Anxiety* explores the dangers of extremism, both religious and political. Author Bill Tammeus, whose nephew died on 9/11, suggests three ways to be peacemakers. First, we can become more religiously literate, because "our human tendency is to fear what we don't know or understand." Second, we can deepen our knowledge of history, because "shock waves" from past events often spark modern-day unrest.

Finally, we can spend time with people who are facing profound grief. "This is the emotional equivalent of walking a mile in someone else's shoes," Tammeus writes. "It can open our eyes to the countless ways that death — particularly unexpected, violent death — can affect almost every aspect of the lives of survivors. ... At the very least, go to funerals of people whose families you know, even of people who died of old age or of some illness late in life. Be present. Hear their stories."



Have you ever felt overwhelmed and unable to cope with a situation? There have been times during covid that many have felt that way—worry about those who were sick—concerned for families who had lost someone. It was hard enough for adults—but what about children? Camp Noah is a Lutheran camping organization run out of Minnesota that provides weeklong camp experiences for children who have experienced traumatizing natural disasters like tornados, floods, hurricanes—and covid. This past summer, just such a camp was held in Oley, PA. Dear Lehigh Mission District,

We Now Return to Our Regularly Scheduled Programs.

As our congregations return to our regularly scheduled programs with Rally Day, the start of Sunday school, and Catechetical Classes in September, the Synod Council of the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod has been busy during the summer addressing resolutions to memorials.

On Saturday, July 23, 2022, the Synod Council held its regular meeting at the Lutheran Center in Allentown. The in-person meeting was to vote on resolutions taken up from the 2-day Online Synod Assembly that was held on June 10-11, 2022.

Deliberated at that ZOOM Synod Assembly were the resolutions: Roe v. Wade and the Environment Memorials. These memorials were forwarded for further deliberation and action to the 2022 Churchwide Assembly for a vote.

Consideration of the Reference and Counsel Resolutions for action by the Synod Council were as follows:

-Whole Body - Motion carried

The concern was to encourage all congregations to participate within their mission districts, ELCA, and NEPA Synod as the body of Christ.

-Anti-Racism - Motion adopted

Addressed the need to provide an annual Racial Justice/Anti-Racism for clergy.

-COVID - Motion adopted

COVID mitigation procedures within the synod and encourage congregations to have proper protocols.

-Gun Control - Motion referred to the Committee of Deans for action.

<u>Resolved</u>: Each mission district Dean write a letter on behalf of his/her mission district membership to the senator representing them requesting senators cooperate on bipartisan talks on gun control regulation.

(The CWA was held in Columbus Ohio in August. As of the writing of this newsletter I had just returned as a voting delegate from the Churchwide Assembly. Highlights of the CWA will be published on our October LMD Newsletter.)
