PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Influenza Vaccine" November 2022 Peggy Saylor, RN

If you are anything like me, you are experiencing a little bit of "vaccination overload." However, please do not let this prevent you from getting your influenza vaccine this year!

Influenza is a disease that spreads around the United States every year usually between October and May. It can affect anyone but is more dangerous for some people. Infants and young children, anyone over 65 years of age, pregnant women and anyone with certain health issues or a weakened immune system are more prone to the complications that can occur with the flu.

In an average year, thousands of people die from the flu and many more are hospitalized. The good news is that the influenza vaccine can prevent millions of illnesses and the flu-related visits to the doctor each year.

The vaccine is recommended for anyone over the age of 6 months. Pregnant? Not a problem! The influenza vaccine can be administered any time during pregnancy. It does take about two weeks for protection to develop after vaccination and it does NOT cause the flu (a common misconception.) If you are experiencing minor illnesses like a cold – not a problem! Anyone who is moderately or severely ill should wait until they recover to receive the vaccine. Please talk to your healthcare provider with any concerns.

The side effects that can occur after administration include soreness, redness and swelling at the injection site, fever, muscle aches and headache. However, compared with the symptoms of influenza – these side effects are minimal and very manageable! Remember to keep moving the arm which you received the vaccine afterwards and drink plenty of water to minimize soreness and side effects.

Bottom line – get vaccinated against influenza!!

St. Paul's is once again participating in the Monthly Madness fundraiser in conjunction with Dan Schantz Greenhouse. The purchase of a card for \$25 will give the card holder a specific flower (or pumpkin) each month. St. Paul's will receive \$10 for each card sold. FROM SCARCITY TO ABUNDANCE

Author Parker Palmer recounted being stuck on a storm-grounded airplane for hours. Though it was lunchtime, meals weren't available, and passengers grew irritable. One flight attendant apologized for the delay, expressing empathy for people's stress, and then passed around two breadbaskets, asking everyone to contribute something.

"Some of you brought snacks to tide you over, and some of you have a few LifeSavers or chewing gum," she said. "And if you don't have anything edible, you have a picture of your children or spouse ... or a bookmark or a business card." Then, she said, "we'll pass the baskets around again, and everyone can take out what they need."

Complaints soon ceased, Palmer recalled, as passengers searched for items and stopped focusing on themselves. The plane became a community of sharing as scarcity and deprivation transformed into abundance and joy.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

A VETERAN'S SERVICE

American hero Eddie Rickenbacker (1890-1973) led a life of daring and risk, from racing cars as a teen to piloting warplanes. Throughout his experiences, Rickenbacker grew in faith while discovering that "life had no meaning except in terms of helping others."

In the first issue of *Guideposts* magazine, Rickenbacker described spending four agonizing months of 1941 in the hospital after an accident. While recovering, he pondered life and death, concluding that he couldn't give up because he still "had work to do, others to serve."

Less than two years later, that ordeal came in handy. After crashing in the South Pacific, Rickenbacker and "seven other starving men" were adrift on a raft for 21 days. Most were "so young they needed the strength and understanding of a man who had been down in the valley of the shadow, who had suffered and made sense out of his suffering," he said. "It was clear to me that God had a purpose in keeping me alive. … I had been saved to serve."

A GOOD CONTAGION

Thanksgiving is key in Christian prayer, but often our requests outweigh our thanks. By contrast, 85% of prayers in the Jewish prayerbook are blessings of thanks, according to Rabbi Evan Moffic. Noting that the Hebrew word for a Jewish person — *Yehudah* — means "one who is grateful," he states, "Gratitude is at the core of how Jews pray."

Someone once asked Moffic if he might know about a blessing he'd overheard at a restaurant. After a man proposed to his girlfriend and she said yes, he walked quietly to a corner, put on a yarmulke (a sacred Jewish head covering worn in prayer) and spoke a blessing. His fiancé teared up. The rabbi said the prayer was surely this: "Blessed are you, O God, sovereign of the universe, for giving us life, for sustaining us and for enabling us to reach this joy-filled moment."

Why was this person so interested? "I am planning to propose to my girlfriend," he shared with Moffic, "and I want to say this prayer with her."

Unbeknown to the newly engaged pair, their gratitude transformed another couple's life. When we give thanks to God, not only is our faith strengthened but our thanksgiving may inspire others. Gratitude is contagious!





RACISM IS A PROBLEM

The United States is not a racist country but our nation certainly has a racism problem, and so does our Evangelical Lutheran Church in America.

On October 27, 2018, in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, 11 Jewish Americans were killed at the synagogue Tree of Life Congregation during a Shabbat service. On June 17, 2018, in Charleston, South Carolina, 9 African Americans were killed at Emanuel African Methodist Episcopal Church during a Bible Study. On March 16, 2021 in Atlanta, Georgia, 8 Asians Americans, the majority women, were killed at a spa.

These racist attacks on people of color were committed in the United States. If I included the killings of African Americans in the hands of police officers, I would need a page in the LMD Newsletter to write all of the victim's names.

These hate crime attacks on people of color and women were laced with Anti-semitic, white supremacy, and misogynistic sentiments by their perpetrators. The racist sentiments that are espoused by some people around us and in our congregations begs the question: Do these Christians know Jesus was a person of color? He was not born in Europe. The Gospels refer to him as Jesus of Nazareth or Jesus of Galilee. Rabbi Jesus was a Jewish Middle-Easterner.

One of the resolutions carried over to the Synod Council to vote on from the 2-day Online Synod Assembly that was held on June 10-11, 2022 was the Anti-Racism Education Emphasis resolution. On Saturday, July 23, 2022, the Synod Council met at the Lutheran Center in Allentown and adopted the Anti-Racism motion.

The resolution reads in part, "that the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod of the ELCA establish a requirement for Racial Justice/Anti-Racism training for Rostered Ministers and Synod Authorized Lay Ministers at least every three years..."

To this end, in seeking further understanding on the problem of systemic and institutionalized racism, the Synod's Racial Justice Team set up interviews with clergy of color and training with prospective speakers. As we continue to reflect on our life with Jesus The Son of All Humanity, it is my hope that we can come to see each other as a race of human beings and stop seeing each other in ethnic and gender construct terms.
