Dear Members and Friends,

Having three children of my own and becoming a grandfather for the 7<sup>th</sup> time I can identify somewhat with parents waiting for a child to be born. There are all kinds of questions running through your mind. "What name will we choose? What path will this child follow through life? Will our baby grow up to be successful?" Perhaps

Mary and Joseph had many questions about the holy Child to be born. We don't know all that they might have asked, but the most important questions were answered for them.

"What name will we choose?" Mary and Joseph did not have to decide on a name for Mary's firstborn son. The name was given to them. Mary was told, "You will conceive in your womb and bear a son, and you shall call his name Jesus." The name was revealed to Joseph, and with the name, the reason for it: "You shall call his name Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

"What path will this child follow through life?" Jesus' path through life, his purpose, is revealed in the meaning of his name: "God saves." Jesus was born – and lived and died and rose again – to "save his people from their sins." The holy Child of Bethlehem would grow up to follow the way of the cross. Through this Advent season and beyond, we follow him: "If anyone would come after me, let him deny himself and take up his cross and follow me." It's a path that leads all the way from the manger to the cross to the empty tomb!

"Will our baby grow up to be successful?" Successful, yes — but before the glory came the cross: "And being found in human form, he humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Therefore, God has highly exalted him and bestowed on him the name that is above every name, so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father."

His holy name, the path of the cross, the triumph of the empty tomb – all that this holy Child, our Savior Jesus, has done – he did for us. Through faith in his name, we have forgiveness for our sins and eternal life. Jesus has promised that he will return to take us to himself forever. So now, through Advent and Christmas and beyond, we are waiting for the Son!

#### **BLUE CHRISTMAS SERVICE (or Longest Night service)**

Christmas can be a painful time for some. It may be the first Christmas without a loved family member who has recently died; it may be a time that has always been difficult.



The constant refrain on the radio and television, in shopping malls and churches, about the happiness of the season, about getting together with family and friends, reminds many people of what they have lost or have never had. The anguish of broken relationships, the insecurity of unemployment, the weariness of ill health, the pain of isolation - all these can make us feel very alone in the midst of the celebrating and spending. We need the space and time to acknowledge our sadness and concern; we need to know that we are not alone.

Our spirits sink, as the days grow shorter. We feel the darkness growing deeper around us. We need encouragement to live the days ahead of us.

For these reasons, St. Paul's offers a special "Longest Night" or "Blue Christmas" service on December 18<sup>th</sup> at 2:00 p.m.

Come out, and join with us in sharing and hearing prayers, scripture, and music that acknowledge that God's presence is for those who mourn, for those who struggle - and that God's Word comes to shine light into our darkness. Everyone, regardless of church background (or lack of it) is welcome.

# SEAFARER'S CHRISTMAS AT SEA PROJECT COMPLETE!



Thanks to our dedicated knitters and crocheters, we were able to send a total of 47 hat and cowl sets, plus an additional 3 hats, to Seafarers International House (SIH). And, thanks to the generous contribution of socks and snack items by our congregation, and with the help of a Thrivent Action Team grant, we were able to

send 12 Christmas satchels. Each satchel contained a sweatshirt, t-shirt, 3-pack of socks, hat and cowl set, snack items and a Christmas card. With some financial aid from St. Paul's endowment fund to help offset shipping costs, all items were delivered to SIH on November 14.

SIH is a Lutheran-run hospitality house that serves seafarers and sojourners. The program is called Christmas at Sea – where they collect hats, cowls, scarves – and make care packages for the seafarers. Seafarers are the "unseen essential workers" and are often overworked and away from their families for extended periods of time. The SIH port chaplains deliver the packages to the ships for the holiday.

#### A COLLABORATION ACROSS TIME AND PLACE

For Christmas Day worship, many churches use Psalm 98. It is fitting, then, that Isaac Watts, who interpreted 132 psalms as hymn texts, based a now-beloved carol on it.

Watts (1674-1748) was a student of language, religion and philosophy. He wanted to make Scripture more relevant to lay people and thought hymns could help. Watts composed more than 600 hymn texts, many still in use. But Psalm 98:4-9, "Joy to the World," needed music to fit its words.

Enter Lowell Mason (1792-1872), an American choir director. He came across Watts' Psalm 98 hymn text and sought inspiration for a melody from the famous oratorio *Messiah* by George F. Handel (1685-1759). Mason pulled musical phrases from sections of Handel's work, resulting in the tune we now recognize as "Joy to the World."

So it is that three men who lived across three centuries and never met—along with the composer of the original psalm more than two millennia earlier—together produced a hymn to the Christ-child, which millions have sung and continue to love.



Inspiring CROP Hunger Walk photos and report from St. John's Lutheran Church-Emmaus!

Faith Drescher, CROP Hunger Walk recruiter for St. John's Lutheran Church-Emmaus, submitted the inspiring report below, along with 2 great photos (attached) that Pastor Jeff Carstens took of their congregation's CROP Hunger Walk

crew that walked on Sunday, Oct. 2, 2022, during the Sunday School hour:

The rains from Hurricane Ian held off; and Pastor Jeff Ied our CROP Hunger Walk up and down Main Street, Emmaus, from St. John's to 2nd St., around the Triangle to 6th Street, and back to church with our signs made the week before after a combined Sunday School/confirmation hunger awareness activity. We hope our presence raised awareness of food insecurity and the need to help end hunger. Parents, kids, confirmands, and congregants joined together – 40 in all. (The photos captured almost everyone, but I guess we did not squeeze together enough because some were missed.)

Following the CROP Hunger Walk, Pastor Jeff and I spent a few minutes with the confirmands debriefing the experience. And that afternoon I dropped off at St. Timothy Lutheran Church the food that we collected for Allentown Area Ecumenical Food Bank.

A few weeks prior to Oct. 2, I had the opportunity to promote the walk from the lectern. We also had 2 fellowship opportunities to approach congregants, and any students attending worship were recognized as walkers. In addition, there were 3 donation containers in strategic spots throughout the church, as well as posters advertising the event.

Thank you, St. John's Lutheran Church-Emmaus, for your lifegiving ministry and for sharing some great ideas about how to increase awareness and enthusiasm for the CROP Hunger Walk and the AAE Food Bank to help our food insecure neighbors near and far!

# "And the Word became flesh and lived among us..." John 1.14

Ding! "I have a question for you in regards to my linguistic class. What do you think of the Bible verse in Genesis 11.9?"

That text came from my son in college.

The Genesis text in question reads, "Therefore it was called Babel, because there the LORD confused the language of all the earth; and from there the LORD scattered them abroad over the face of all the earth."

The Babel story can be picked up from Genesis 11.1-9. Basically, the people on all the earth spoke one language. They wanted to make a name for themselves. So, they decided to build a tower to reach the heavens. God did not like their plan and confused their language.

Ding! "I am talking about the implications this statement has with language being a divine source rather than a physically learned trait of the human race."

He is a preacher's kid. You gotta love him.

Certainly, the Babel story can be viewed from both an origin of multiple languages and an evolutionary process of language by the human race.

My son's points of view enlightened me to take a look at how we Christians use language in worship. (In another article we can discuss the social, political, and theological ramifications of language.)

Take, for example, after each biblical reading, we conclude with the phrase The word of the Lord. Then again, after the reading of the Gospel, we conclude The Gospel of the Lord. Another liturgical church respond during worship is Holy Wisdom, Holy Word.

In Scripture from John's Gospel we read, "And the word became flesh and lived among us." Jn. 1.14. Here is an evolutionarily human process that echoes a divine source in the language.

God's language found in God's Word, Jesus. The Word that became flesh. This divine source forms part of the written language and embodies the essence of God's presences in the world.

Through Advent to Christmas Seasons, we seek Love. Joy. Hope. Peace. These words echo the divine. In these words, are the embodiment of The Word that became flesh.

Jesus as the embodiment of God is the divine source of the word of God. The Emmanuel, God is with us. Matthew 1.23
