Dear Members and Friends,

Epiphany: a time to take a *look*. As we look at the church calendar, we see that we will soon be in the season of Epiphany beginning January 6th. And the season of Epiphany is a time when we take a cue from the wise men and take a look at what God is revealing to us in the sky above, in the words of ancient Scripture, in the Baby Jesus,

and in the recesses of our very heart and soul.

It's time to *look up*! It was the wise men from the East who looked up and saw the star that told them that a King had been born. And the wise men kept looking up as they followed the star that led them to Jesus. It's time this Epiphany season to look up at the stars at night, marvel at God's creation, and commit your way to the Lord, who has sent Jesus to be with us.

It's time to *look back*! When the wise men got to Jerusalem, they asked King Herod, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews?" Herod called the chief priests and scribes to look back in Scripture. They found the answer in the words of the prophet Micah: "You, O Bethlehem of Ephrathah, who are one of the little clans of Judah, from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people, Israel." It's time this Epiphany to look back at the words of Scripture that declare to us that Jesus is indeed the Messiah, the fulfillment of all the prophecies of old, the revelation of all the promises of God.

It's time to *look down*! When the wise men found the Baby Jesus, they looked down, as they knelt before the Son of God and worshiped him. Only then did the wise men open their treasures of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the Lord. It's time this Epiphany season to bow your heads in prayer to the Savior, to come to church for worship, and to humbly offer your gifts to the One who has given us so much – forgiveness, renewal, peace, hope, and love.

As you look, may the Christ Child be revealed to you in your daily life.

For our next outreach project, we are returning to making Twiddle Sleeves. This is something we worked on in 2019, and learned that there is a need for additional sleeves at Luther Crest. Below is a link to an article about how Twiddle Sleeves are being used to help dementia patients keep their hands busy, and thus become more settled.

We purchased some brightly-colored variegated yarn for this project and created kits containing skeins of other colors and textures that go with the variegated skein. This project is great for using up partial skeins in your stash. But if you don't feel comfortable putting colors together, or you don't have a yarn stash (gasp!), pick up a Twiddle Sleeve Yarn Kit in the storage closet. Feel free to open bags to peruse colors, and pick a kit with colors you like. Even if you are not interested in making sleeves – we could use help with making crocheted or knitted flowers and other doodads.

Once completed, the sleeves will be embellished with items to fidget, such as ribbon, lace, pom-poms, flowers, beads, buttons, etc. In 2019, we purchased supplies for embellishments using a Thrivent Action Team grant. We have plenty of those supplies left, and will plan an "Embellish-A-Sleeve Party" in the fall.

PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Re-introduction to Parish Nursing" January 2023 Peggy Saylor, RN

I thought that for this month's article, I would write a few lines reintroducing Parish Nursing.

Parish Nursing is a unique, specialized practice of professional nursing that holds the spiritual dimension as central to its practice. We are registered nurses who promote wellness in the physical, social, emotional and spiritual realms. Parish nurses do not provide hands-on care or skilled nursing care but rather focus on providing the congregation with methods to promote health within the context of the values, beliefs and practices of a faith community.

I became certified as a Parish Nurse in 2000 and have started programs in various congregations that we were at. It can be customized to each congregation, and I have tried to do so based on the surveys that you filled out when the program was initially introduced.

We had a hiatus due to COVID-19, as did all other programs. However, I would like to re-start the blood pressure checks beginning this month. It seems like the third Sunday of the month does not fall on any holidays so we will start with that. Exceptions would be due to snow and ice as Bruce's wheelchair does not function well in the elements!!

The checks will most likely be held in the last room on the right at the end of the hall. Watch for signs giving the location and promoting this service.

Please let me know if there are any other services you would like to see in the congregation within the scope of nursing covered in Parish Nursing.

PROOF OF LIGHT

On January 6 Christians celebrate Epiphany, when the Magi came to worship baby Jesus. Epiphany, which means an appearance or manifestation, symbolizes the first recognition of the Savior by non-Jews. Because Epiphany also is a reminder that Jesus came as the light of the whole world, its symbols include light, candles and a star.

How did the wise men know — and how do we know — that Jesus is the light of the world? As preacher George Buttrick said, "It would little avail to ask how we know. That would be like asking how we know that Beethoven's 'Hymn to Joy' is joyous. If a man were to say, 'It is not joyous to me,' he would not condemn the music; he would tell only his morbidness. There is no logic to establish an axiom, for an axiom is the basis of all logic; and the soul of Jesus has axiomatic truth. Jesus is light, and there is no proof for light except light itself."



Greater Allentown CROP Hunger Walk News

Hubert Huang, Director of Children and Families, shared First Presbyterian-Allentown's 2022 Faith Formation CROP Hunger Walk experience and photos:

On World Communion Sunday, 10/2/22, the children of First Presbyterian Church of Allentown (FPCA) read and discussed scripture from Micah 6:8 that tells us to "do justice and to love kindness and to walk humbly with your God." The scripture connected to FPCA's fall sermon series focusing on the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)'s marks of membership, specifically "working in the world for peace, justice, and human

fulfilment." In their faith formation lesson, the children explored what justice meant, what injustice may look like in the world, and the ways in which they, as disciples of Jesus, can work toward helping others, particularly in relation to food insecurity and water scarcity in their communities and in the broader world.

The children then participated in a mini-CROP Hunger Walk through the church to visit several different stations. Each station had a series of pictures, infographics, and charts as well as activities that demonstrated elements of food insecurity that invited the children to discuss and better understand how food insecurity and water scarcity impact people, especially those in the Lehigh Valley. The lesson served as a springboard to FPCA's 11/6/22 All Church Fellowship and Faith Formation Event that centered on food insecurity in our local community.

FIFA banned Pride Armbands from being worn on the soccer field at the 2022 World Cup held in Qatar. The Pride Armband is of rainbow colors with a heart shape and the number 1 inside the rainbow heart. The significance of the Pride Armband was to show support to the LGBTQ community.

Scroll the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod website and you'll find a similar rainbow heart shape with a cross inside center.

The soccer teams who planned on wearing the One Love Pride Armband reconsidered wearing them because of threats of being sanctioned with the possibility of not playing in the World Cup. (Nov. 22, 2022. wsj.com)

One could argue that social statements in solidarity with people who are being oppressed need not to be part of any sport. But such a statement only avoids the issue and encourages perpetrators to continue to inflict injustices to communities.

In the United States in Colorado Springs an LGBTQ nightclub shooting leaves 5 dead and several injured. (Nov. 21, 2022. wsj.com). The hate crime charge is one of hundreds of criminal charges filed against the shooter.

The 5 victims in the Club Q shooting were Daniel Aston, Kelly Loving, Ashley Paugh, Derrick Wayne Rump, and Raymond Green Vance.

One of the victims, Derrick Wayne Rump, was from the Kutztown, Pennsylvania area in the East Berks Mission District of our Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod.

Sounds close to home, doesn't it? Sí, yes, because Rump and all the other victims belong to a family. We know of LGBTQ friends and relatives who form part of our life and the church who are being discriminated for wanting to live their life.

There's an ancient rainbow in the book of Genesis where God said to Noah, "I will remember my covenant that is between me and you and every living creature of all flesh, and the waters shall never again become a flood to destroy all flesh. When the bow is in the clouds, I will see it and remember the everlasting covenant between God and every living creature of all flesh." Genesis 9.15-16.

God's ancient rainbow that today we see in the sky after a brief rain shower is God's reminder not to destroy humanity, living creatures, and the earth. It appears like God owns up to the idea that it was not good to destroy humanity and all living creatures.
