

ASH WEDNESDAY

Ash Wednesday is February 22nd this year. We will have Ash Wednesday services at 10:30 a.m. and 7:00 p.m.

The first day of Lent is Ash Wednesday named for the practice of imposing ashes. Ashes symbolize several aspects of our human experience. First, ashes remind us of God's condemnation of sin, as God said to Adam, "Dust you are and to dust you shall return." Second ashes suggest cleaning and renewal. Ashes were used anciently in the absence of soap, and on Ash Wednesday ashes are a penitential substitute for water as a reminder of our Baptism. Third, ashes remind us of the shortness of human life, for one day the words "We commit his/her body to the ground; earth to earth, ashes to ashes, dust to dust" will be said over our bodies. Fourth, ashes are a symbol of repentance, as expressed in Luke 10:13 and the hymn "Savior, When in Dust to Thee."

ST. PAUL'S 2023 BASKET SOCIAL

The Basket Social Committee is planning a second Basket Social on September 23, 2023 from 10:00AM to 4:00PM. A basket social is a silent auction, where numbered tickets are purchased and dropped into a container aside of their basket (or gift card) of choice. A winning ticket is then drawn from each container at the end of the day of the event.

Look for our display in March, when we will start our basket drive - seeking donations of gift baskets from members of the congregation. You can donate empty baskets, made up baskets, or items to put in a basket. New or nearly new items are preferred.

Like last year, we are planning to have several "special" baskets (of higher value than regular baskets), gift cards for local restaurants/businesses, and a big-ticket grand prize. We also will have a paper products tower — where people bring food items to donate in exchange for tickets to win the paper products. The beneficiary is the Allentown Area Ecumenical Food Bank.

This year we will include a 50/50 drawing to benefit a selected charity. We are looking at donating these proceeds to Caring Hearts - a Slatington-based organization dedicated to giving help and hope to the homeless, veterans, and less fortunate throughout the Lehigh Valley. In a 50/50 drawing – half of the proceeds go to the winning ticket holder and half goes to the charitable organization. And, as was done in 2022, we will tithe ten percent of event proceeds.

PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Risks of Shoveling Snow" February 2023 Peggy Saylor, RN

Even though we have been blessed by above average temperatures so far this year, sooner or later, we will probably have some snow fall. As February is America's Heart Month, a time when individuals can focus on their cardiovascular health, I thought I would address how shoveling snow is a regular trigger of heart attacks.

It is common for us to underestimate how strenuous shoveling a heavy snowfall can be. Research has shown that shoveling snow can be equivalent to being at "peak exercise" level during a stress test. Combine the factors of cold temperatures which cause the blood vessels to constrict making it harder for the heart to pump blood through the body raising your blood pressure to the sheer physical effort of shoveling snow and you may have the "perfect storm" for a heart attack.

A professor of internal medicine at Michigan's Oakland University William Beaumont School of Medicine found that after only two minutes of snow shoveling, participants in a research study had their heart rates exceed 85% of maximal heart rate which is equivalent to the heart rate of someone doing intense aerobic exercise. Add this to someone who may have existing cardiovascular risks such as a sedentary lifestyle, obesity, smoking, diabetes, existing cardiac disease or high blood pressure and the risk intensifies. Some studies even show that using a snow blower can also increase the risk of a heart attack due to the fact that pushing the blower raises your blood pressure.

If you find yourself falling into one of the above categories, try to find someone to shovel your snow for you. If you cannot avoid shoveling or using a snow blower, take the following precautions:

- Dress in warm layers
- Stretch before beginning
- Only shovel powdery snow
- o Stay hydrated
- o Lift with your legs and not your back
- $\circ\quad$ Take frequent breaks and do not overexert yourself

O Do not have a heavy meal, smoke or drink alcohol prior to shoveling

In addition, be aware of the common symptoms of a heart attack:

- Mild to severe pain in the chest, neck shoulders, left arm or back
- Shortness of breath
- Nausea
- o Breaking out in a sweat
- o Rapid heartbeat
- o Lightheadedness

Also keep in mind that symptoms can differ in women. While chest pain is the most common symptom in both genders, women are more likely to also experience the other symptoms such as shortness of breath, nausea and back or jaw pain.

On a personal note, my older brother just passed away suddenly and unexpectedly in October. He was "only" 75 years old but lived in Alaska where the temperatures are very cold and had just finished discarding a whole pick-up truck full of heavy lumber. I can only surmise that the strenuous activity in cold temperatures caused his fatal heart attack. So....please be careful when faced with the first measurable snowfall of this winter!

FROM DEATH TO NEW LIFE

After the inventor of the Frisbee died in 2002, family members honored his final wish: to have some of his ashes molded into a flying disk! The point, according to toy legend "Steady Ed" Headrick, was for his loved ones to have fun playing with him even after he had passed. "He lived for Frisbee," said his widow, and now he lives on in one.

Thankfully, the ashes used on Ash Wednesday aren't cremains. But they do have special significance. They're often made by burning branches from the previous year's Palm Sunday celebration. By tying together seasons, the practice of receiving ashes reminds us of cycles: sin, repentance and forgiveness, plus life, death and resurrection — Jesus' as well as our own.

ARE YOU BEING CALLED TO SERVE???

If you are called to serve, embrace the opportunities and the responsibility that come with that calling, because it will make a profound difference in your own life and in the lives of others. LEAD FROM WITHIN: The call to serve can come anytime, anywhere.

LET'S GO BANANAS!

When the baseball team in Savannah, Georgia, got new owners in 2016, it also received a new name and identity — the Bananas! Adding pep to what often seemed a long, boring game, Jesse and Emily Cole offered a creative new experience, full of entertainment and spectacle. Players wear all-yellow uniforms (sometimes kilts), and the mascot is a banana named Split. Cheering on the team are the Banana Nanas seniorcitizen dancers and the Man-Nanas Dad Bod Cheering Squad. The entire organization sets out to bring hospitality and joy, sending people home thinking, "This was the best experience of my life!"

What if Christians, individually and as a community, fully embraced *our* new name and identity, sharing radical hospitality and profound joy with everyone? Jesus has bought us from our former owner, sin, and given us a new name: Beloved of God. This identity may seem silly to some, just as the Savannah Bananas raised eyebrows initially. But before long, the delighted fans were *going* bananas for them!

With the same wild abandon and big-hearted outreach, the church — with its much-greater message — can spread love and goodwill, and have fun doing it!

LENTEN SIGNALS

Why should we observe Lent? This 40-day season of repentance and reflection that begins on Ash Wednesday has three important purposes. Lent helps us STOP, LOOK and LISTEN.

We observe Lent because it tells us to STOP and rest awhile
— and to stop sinning. Lent tells us to LOOK inward for an honest self-examination, to look upward to see the cross of

Jesus with healing and love, and to look forward to the hope of the Resurrection. And we observe Lent because it tells us to LISTEN — to the voice of God, the words of Christ and the movement of the Holy Spirit.

LOOK

STOP, LOOK and LISTEN! These commands that are so crucial for travel safety are also important for our journey through Lent.

GOING OUT OF OUR WAY

In mid-2022, Mediterranean Shipping Company, a world leader in container transport, voluntarily changed its routes, on the advice of scientists, to protect large populations of blue whales off the Sri Lankan coast. Going out of its way 15 nautical miles has led to a whopping 95% drop in whale strikes.

Jesus counseled people to go out of their way for one another, especially for the vulnerable: "If anyone would sue you and take your tunic, let him have your cloak as well. And if anyone forces you to go one mile, go with him two miles." Further, "whoever gives one of these little ones even a cup of cold water ... will by no means lose his reward" (Matthew 5:40-41; 10:42, ESV).

Paul likewise urged his listeners to voluntarily give up eating meat, even if they didn't believe in and weren't challenged by the idols to which it had been sacrificed, for the sake of new believers with weaker faith (Romans 14).

Faith calls us to go out of our way for the sake of others; sometimes a wealthy corporation opts to do the same. God's hand is at work in both, protecting vulnerable humans and nonhumans alike.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

It is that time of year again when two National Football teams will






We will set up a container for each team that competes in the Super Bowl and you will vote by your contribution for the team you want to win. So, come, vote, and be generous!

FriEDENS: An Amazing Garden Story

A few weeks after the lockdown in the spring of 2020, I called a neighbor in town who had a garden in her front yard. It's Shartlesville, and the PA Dutch are used to their yards looking *just so,* so I knew this was a brave woman who loved gardening vegetables more than public opinion. I also knew she didn't have room for pumpkins in her small yard, so I called and proposed we plant some viney crops up on our church property. She agreed and even had the seeds, gardening skills, and ideas, so after consultation with council, the garden was born. We sent our crop to the neighboring UCC congregation's food pantry, and with the excess had physically- distant free produce giveaways.

In 2021, we expanded the garden by half, to about 50 by 75 feet. We watered each plant via a recycled gallon milk jug with a pinprick in the bottom. The plants were happy, but our backs were not. It took 45 minutes to an hour to water all the jugs, which we did nearly every day because the garden is in full sun. The black plastic we used for weed suppression became a slip-and-slide while we irrigated.

In 2022, we were able to install a drip irrigation system that did not require filling milk jugs and weed suppression fabric that was not slippery. The fabric required using a blow torch to make holes for planting but will be able to be used for multiple years. The irrigation only required turning on the spigot and letting it run for several hours, which was a true God-send because we had some unexpected health issues on the garden team that limited our volunteer force! It was an extraordinarily dry summer, so the grant came just in time.

This past summer we had 21 people volunteer in the garden, took produce to 5 food pantries or senior centers, including Cafe Esperanza in Reading, and welcomed 29 people into the garden at a joint VBS. Not only are we feeding our neighbors with free, fresh, pesticide-free produce, but we are also getting to know our neighbors, developing new connections in the congregation among volunteers, teaching children about food insecurity and the joy of gardening, and passing on agricultural wisdom.

Asbury Church is very mission minded. The United Methodist Women and a group called Asbury In Missions (AIM) are constant supporters

of the CROP Hunger Walk. **AIM has a monthly Mission brunch** with a donation request. They also collect **spare change** at the end of each church service to donate to mission groups all year long.

My biggest tip is to keep an **ongoing list** of names and contact information year to year: family, friends, church family, bank, and employers. (I graciously ask for more every year.)

Start promoting early, requesting donations, and recruiting walkers. Keep walkers informed and engaged leading up to the day of the walk.

Set up your **CWS online page. Email** all contacts in your address book. Post to **Facebook** if you have an account. Give yourself time so you can **follow up** a few times with your request to people you haven't heard back from yet.

CWS gives so much **educational information** on their website. Share tidbits with your requests.

I send a "thank you" as soon as I receive a donation with info about what that donation means, no matter what the amount, e.g., \$50 provides one month's food for a family of five through a refugee program or provides a first-aid kit for an entire village.

Fundraisers can be held **anytime** of the year for the CROP Hunger Walk.

Since COVID, the day before the walk, my husband and I plan a day for a **drive-by food bank collection** at church for the Allentown Ecumenical Food Bank. We have collected hundreds of pounds of food each time. Even my husband's coworkers contribute each year. It's contagious once you get started. **Just ask!**

Dear Lehigh Mission District Antisemitism on our Doorsteps

The ripple of antisemitism against the Jewish community has reached the Lehigh Valley area. However, before we can address this topic, we need to confess that Dr. Martin Luther was antisemitic.

What does this mean? Dr. Martin Luther perpetuated lies, biases, and prejudices about the Jewish community that led to the persecution of Jews in Germany through his writings.

One of Luther's books was titled, "On the Jews and their Lies" -- ironic since it was Luther perpetuating lies about the Jewish community in Germany. The Protestant reformer wrote other books, pamphlets, and preached sermons that expressed his hate against the Jewish community.

Historian and Martin Luther biographer, Dr. Lyndal Roper, writes, "Luther's vicious anti-Semitism has been one of the most fraught subjects in the history of Lutheranism, because it has been difficult for scholars after the Holocaust to recognize and accept its nature and extent." (Martin Luther: Renegade and Prophet, 2016. Pg 413.)

What does this mean? Luther was antisemitic towards God's Chosen People. Many Lutherans seem to have an entitled ignorance when it comes to addressing Luther's antisemitism and its history in Lutheranism.

Lutherans should not give carte blanche to Luther's antisemitism. Our Lutheran confession needs to continue to denounce Luther's antisemitic writings as wrong and evil both then and today.

I took the Joint Catechetical Classes from St. John's UCC and St. John's Lutheran Church to a Jewish temple. We met our host of the evening, Martina Obenski, for a discussion on similarities and differences between Christians and Jews, followed by a Shabbat service. There we were worshiping the same God, acknowledging the same Jesus, and hearing the same Scriptures.

However, antisemitic threats from a man in New Jersey sent a ripple through our host synagogue, Congregation Keneseth Israel in Allentown, and forced them to take safety measures. A plain clothed police officer monitored the entrance to the synagogue during our visit.

There we were wearing a kippah, looking like tourists, and being unaware of the Jewish community being threatened. Our Christian entitled ignorance overlooked this palpable difference that traumatizes the Jewish community.

Por qué? Why do Christians overlook the effects of antisemitism? Because we don't know what it means to feel threatened. We don't know what it means to have an undercover officer at the doors of our churches for protection. We don't worry what others may say about our Christian faith because we are the dominant religion.

At the end of the Shabbat service, we left behind the kippah and returned to the safety of our home. Our Jewish siblings don't have that privilege when they go to worship, when they go home or to work or to school. There is a clear difference between Christians and Jews.

An important similarity in the Torah and the New Testament is a teaching of Moses and Jesus who taught, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the greatest and first commandment." The second commandment is like it: "You shall love your neighbor as yourself. On these two commandments hang all the Law and the Prophets."

What does this mean? The passion found in our heart calls us to deepen our affection with God. The soul's call is to awaken our consciousness to see God around us. The mind calls us to reflect our thoughts on the ultimate concern. That is God.

Jesus wraps the heart, soul, and mind together with the highest form of love called agape. We are to take the intensity of our heart, soul, and mind and show our neighbor unconditional love.

Moses and Jesus taught us to love the Lord your God and love your neighbor as yourself.
