Dear Members and Friends,

On May 28th we celebrated the Day of Pentecost. In the month of June through much of November we will be observing the long season of Pentecost. Pentecost is often considered the birthday of the Church. As with most other birthdays, the Church receives presents on this day – presents from God to his children. The first

present the Church receives at Pentecost is the Holy Spirit – the third person of the Trinity and a constant Presence with us in this often lonely and fearful place. But the Bible also talks about the "gifts of the Spirit" that arrive along with the Holy Spirit on this day.

These may not be gifts that we can see or touch. But they are gifts that we can certainly use and gifts that surely will last. We can find a list of these "gifts of the Spirit" in Isaiah 11:2-3. The following is a brief description of those gifts:

Wisdom – The Spirit's gift of wisdom is a gift that puts us in tune with the will of God and helps us to make decisions that are pleasing to God and in the best interests of our spiritual wellbeing.

Understanding – The Bible says the disciples "did not yet understand" that Jesus would suffer and die, and then rise again on the third day for the redemption of all. But on Pentecost, the disciples were given a newfound grasp of what the mission of Christ was all about. Through the Spirit's gift of understanding we, too, now have a solid grip on what the Good News is.

Counsel – The Holy Spirit gives us words of guidance and advice to share with those who are hurting or in need of the love of God.

Might – The Holy Spirit provides us with the power to stand up against the attacks of evil in the world. With the Holy Spirit's strength within us, we can withstand any force that would seek to draw us away from Christ. **Knowledge** – With the gift of knowledge, we are able to express to others the truth of God's grace and favor.

Fear of the Lord – Through the Holy Spirit, we are filled with reverence and awe as we approach our God in prayer and worship.

Joy – We experience gladness in God, a gladness both of the Spirit and grounded in hope. This is a joy that brings us peace.

Let us discern these gifts within us and use them to serve our Lord in the coming days. Pastor Miller

MISSION INTERPRETER TALK APRIL 30, 2023 RON MORDOSKY OUR BENEVOLENCE AT WORK

Highlights from Ron Mordosky's presentation on April 30, who has been a Mission Interpreter for over 10 years and loves to tell stories about ministries that our benevolence supports.

Frieden's Lutheran started a small garden in 2020 which has grown since its inception. They overcame watering challenges, applied for funds to install a drip irrigation system using hoses and automatic timers.

*Good Shepherd Rehabilitation Hospita*l had a need for technology to help children to walk. Through a grant from our Synod they were able to be the first rehab hospital to purchase 3 sizes of a walking assist device to help children walk who were diagnosed with cerebral palsy, strokes, spinal cord injury and many other illnesses which affect mobility.

Churches in the Kutztown area received a grant from the Synod's Witness & Service team a few years ago which allows them to harvest thousands of pounds of potatoes, corn, carrots and other vegetables for Food Pantries in Berks, Lehigh, & Schuylkill Counties.

These are a few of the local programs that our benevolence is funding. Ron also talked about worldwide benevolence programs.

PARISH NURSING NOTES "Loneliness Epidemic" June 2023 Peggy Saylor, RN

On a recent PBS NewsHour video, the United States Surgeon General, Dr. Vivek Murtly, reported that loneliness is a new epidemic that can have profound effects on one's health. A study revealed that poor social relationships, isolation, and loneliness can increase the risk of heart disease by 29% and the risk of stroke by 32% as well as increasing the risk of dementia. Social isolation can increase the risk of premature death by 30% which is an alarming statistic.

One in two adults report experiencing measurable levels of loneliness with young people reporting even higher amounts. This results in a more than "bad feeling" and increases one's risk of health issues on par with smoking and even higher than obesity.

This public health crisis was accelerated by the COVID pandemic which Dr. Murtly described as "pouring fuel on a fire that was already burning." The study reported that in 2003, the average daily amount of time spent engaging with friends was 60 minutes but in 2020 that amount was decreased to an average of only 20 minutes per day. Factors contributing to this were a decrease in community and recreational leagues (such as faith communities), technology leading us away from personal connections and an increase in life situations changes such as jobs and living locations. While working at home has some positive aspects, isolation can be detrimental.

Experts stress that quality of time and relationships matter more than quantity. While having 900 friends on Facebook sounds impressive, only having 20 close contacts may be preferable.

Suggestion on combating loneliness include:

- 1. Spending at least 15 minutes a day with people we genuinely care about.
- 2. Being fully engaged in the moment without being distracted by technology.

Social media would benefit by having adequate safety standards to make it safe for our children with less emphasis on "normal body images" that can lead to low self-esteem. Older individuals can contact agencies such as AARP, Area Agency on Aging and Eldercare Locator but housing and transportation issues often complicate these connections. As a faith community, we should ask ourselves if there is anything else that we can do to help combat this epidemic. It is the "right thing" to do and what God would want us to do.

COME GLORIFY GOD TOGETHER

Don't use summer as an excuse to skip church! By gathering in corporate worship, we obey God's command, become equipped for Christian living, and minister to our fellow pilgrims. Consider these tips for engaging in corporate worship.

First, show up — in person if you can. Examine your heart and your motivation for attending church. Lift up your eyes from earthly matters to focus on God.

Come prepared. Do you need to confess anything or remove any hindrance? As you worship, consider how each part of the service displays the gospel: greeting, singing, confessing, reading Scripture, hearing Biblebased teaching, praying, giving and communing.

Be careful not to compartmentalize corporate worship as separate from the rest of life. Instead, consider how you'll carry the experience into the coming week. Come ready to receive; then let that overflow fuel you for the days ahead. Come prepared to participate, knowing that worshiping together is a rehearsal for heaven. But most importantly? Just come. —Monica L. Wilkinson

DIVINE DANCE

Using the fancy word *perichoresis* (from Greek for "around" and "contain") may win you admiring — or strange! — looks. But since the 7th century, people have used it as a beautiful image of the Persons of the Holy Trinity containing and permeating one another. A more familiar word, *choreography*, has led to recent understandings of perichoresis as the divine and eternal dance of love.

Picture three dancers' synchronized yet independent movements. Weaving gracefully in and out, each seems to know what the others will do next. They may touch lightly but don't constrain or impede one another. Though distinct individuals, they move so fluidly together that they are, in a sense, one entity.

Even more profound: Jesus invites us into the dance! "If you love me," he says, "you will keep my commandments. And I will ask the Father, and he will give you another Helper, to be with you forever, even the Spirit of truth. ... I will come to you. ... I am in my Father, and you in me, and I in you" (John 14:15-20, ESV). As the actions of Jesus, the Father and the Spirit interweave in Scripture and in the world, may our lives too be drawn into the loving dance.

WE MATTER TO THE WHOLE CHURCH: A STORY FROM OUR SOUTHWESTERN PENNSYLVANIA SYNOD

Being a member of a congregation council is significant in the life of a disciple. Serving as a leader in a congregation is rewarding, terrifying, awe-inspiring and messy. You are among friends, family and your community of believers, and are chosen to lead in your congregation. It's just a few times a month, but as Barbara Nugent, a synod vice president, shares, "Then life happens, and you find out the reporting required. Situations occur; personalities clash; decisions need to be made. Who do you go to for direction?"

The Southwestern Pennsylvania Synod provided that direction in February when it offered training to 70 congregational lay leaders that strengthened each person's skills and faith. From evangelism to the ELCA constitution and bylaws, they gathered to meet the passions and needs, offering workshops with special breakouts for presidents, vice presidents, secretaries and treasurers that covered such topics as worship and music, communications, advocacy, stewardship and social justice/anti-racism. The day started with Bishop Kurt Kusserow encouraging these valued leaders to keep the focus on our purpose:

"Your leadership in the life of your congregation ought always to bear in mind that your congregation finds its fulfillment in the universal church, and that the universal church exists in and through congregations such as yours. I think this means addressing local questions and concerns in the life of your congregation as if they matter to the whole church (because they do)."

Everyone was hungry to gather ideas, consider future steps but also have an opportunity to connect, be empowered, feel valued and cared for and remember the excitement of being church. Rev. Melissa Stoller, director for evangelical mission, said it this way: "The day was a very visible yet not necessarily quantifiable force that we are church together. Wandering but not alone. Feeling worry, power, uncertainty, and joy as one." Central to this gathering was living into the mission of this synod "to serve, connect and equip congregations of the SWPA synod to tell the story of Jesus." Everyone knew that the synod was there for the congregations with staff, volunteers and greater church support, not only this day but in the days to come, and synod staff are supported through the generous mission support of congregations allowing them to be there for our leaders. One leading Scripture for the day reminded each leader of their value: "Therefore, friends, select from among yourselves seven men of good standing, full of the Spirit and of wisdom, whom we may appoint to this task, while we, for our part, will devote ourselves to prayer and to serving the word" (Acts 6:3-4). Hoping each of our synods are seeking ways that work for them to encourage and empower congregational leaders. Knowing that we are church together, church that supports each other across the whole church prayerfully, financially, emotionally and with a hope for renewal.



June is Pride Month which celebrates LGBTQIA+ folx and their many achievements. Although injustices and prejudices still exist within our society, we have made great strides since the Stonewall Riots in 1969, attaining marriage equality. However, as previously mentioned, we still have a long way to go in the struggle for equal rights. By learning about LGBTQ Pride/History Month, congregational members are more likely to have an understanding and acceptance for all individuals, no matter what they look like, what gender they do or don't identify as, and who they love. An Epistle about a Hinge

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

On a small tray in my study, I have a small hinge that was made to be worn on a lapel.

The hinge ornament reminds me of my Clinical Pastoral Education at Phoebe Home Ministries in Allentown, Pennsylvania. Part of a seminarian's academic education is to go through a CPE program in the summer months.

As chaplains, the program allowed us to come to understand our strengths and gifts while working with patients at the senior living center.

Self-reflection of oneself, peers, patients, and surroundings formed a big part of the CPE program.

My colleague, Jean Huber, (today our Associate of the Bishop in the Northeastern Pennsylvania Synod) gave us a hinge pin to wear on our lapels. Huber passed them around saying that the hinge can serve as a symbol of our life's journey.

Instantly, the ornament stirred up in us an array of conversation. Our CPE self-reflection session would have to wait. All our energy focused on figuring out the meaning of this hinge that was given to us.

Chaplains took sides with some saying, "WE ARE the hinge." One chaplain objected, "We CANNOT be the hinge." Explanations and more questions began to burst forth. "If we are the hinge, whom do we HOLD together?" "Do we hold each other together? Do we hold the patients together?" "Do we HOLD God together?"

A brief silence followed until the questions started up again. "But if God is the hinge, how does God STAY together?" Our reflection turned to one of the tenets of the church for an answer - "The center pin is God, The Father. The right and the left sides of the hinge symbolize The Son and The Holy Spirit."

For a moment, the trinitarian answer seems to have worked. That is until someone said, "Who are the SCREWS?" Another chaplain suggested, "Then who IS the DOOR?"

The life story of this now personified hinge kept evolving. From our circle of chairs Jean Huber shouted, "Guys, it's only a [expletive] pin!" A roar of laughter broke through the circle.

Huber was correct - the hinge was only a pin meant to be a sign of camaraderie in our CPE journey together.

From the CPE Program, we went on to live God's abundant life. Some went on to their respective pastoral ministries. Others towards a ministry in social work. Others furthered their academic education. Still others saw the chaplaincy as their place of ministry. *(continued on the next page ⇒)*
