PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Preventative Medicine" September 2023 Peggy Saylor, RN

Summer is winding down and most of us will be returning to a more "organized" schedule. One item that should be included in our schedules should be "preventative medicine."

The American College of Preventative Medicine defines preventative medicine as the practice of promoting preventative health to improve patient wellbeing. The goal is ultimately to prevent disease, disability, and death by diagnosing medical conditions before they become a problem. Many employers now offer lower insurance co-pays to their employees if they participate in preventative screening as the claims submitted for preventing an illness and early treatment are much less than the claims for treatment once the illness is advanced. Some managed care insurance plans offer bonuses for completing diagnosis testing for the same reason. A woman can get her annual mammogram and the insurance company sends her a check or gift card for \$25!

For adults, examples of preventative screening would be:

- Screening for breast, colorectal, skin, cervical and prostate cancer
- Screening for blood pressure, cholesterol, and diabetes
- Immunizations such as flu shots, COVID vaccines, tetanus and shingles
- Education and counseling for healthy lifestyles, smoking cessation, and assessment of mental status

For children, the list would include:

- Well visits for growth and development
- Immunizations for childhood diseases
- Screenings for autism and lead poisoning

While this may seem like common sense to most of us, a study done in 2018 found that only 8% of adults in the United States who are 35 years and older received the preventative care that was recommended to them.

The most important step that you should take is to make sure that you have a primary care physician or health care provider. This individual can assess your screening needs based on your age and family history and make the proper recommendations for your screening needs.

The second most important step is that you <u>follow</u> the recommendations that your health care provider makes and follow up with the recommended treatment if needed. Most older individuals like me remember our parents as only going to the doctor when they were sick. Preventative medicine will hopefully prevent any illnesses from becoming chronic too late.

P.S. – if you need to have your blood pressure checked – the Parish Nurse committee will start holding monthly blood pressure checks again in October!!!

CONTINUING EDUCATION

In September, Christian education programs are in full swing. How wonderful to see classrooms of children learning about Jesus! But what about the grown-ups? Some parents who make sure their kids get to Sunday school don't attend Bible study themselves.

Following and learning about Christ are lifelong pursuits. If we are to love God with our *mind* (as well as with our heart, soul and strength), then we must keep learning even into old age. Plus, when we are well informed about God's Word and our faith, we can share it with non-Christians and express the reason for our hope (see 1 Peter 3:15).

To love God with "all your mind" (Mark 12:30), find an adult Bible study or small group that dives into Scripture. Then humbly wear the label of lifelong learner, knowing that God still has new things to teach even the most seasoned Christian.

Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.



We have opened the church, and we will still be sending cards to the members of the congregation. If you know of someone who is ill or hospitalized, please let the office know. We will send a card signed from the congregation.

Dear Members of St. Paul's Lutheran Church,

On behalf of the Food Bank, I would like to thank you for your food donation of 135 pounds of much needed items given on 7/11/23. Your donation allows us to keep our shelves stocked with items that we know our clients apprciate. It also allows our budget for purchasing food to be streched a little further.

Your support enables us to provide food assistance to 1,800+ lowincome households in the Allentown area every month. Your donation helps us provide vital food resources throughout the year. Due to inflation, we have seen an increase in need, and the Food Bank has served over 47,000 people this year. A recent Penn State University study reports 'over 12% of PA households were experiencing hunger at the end of 2020'.

Our Food Bank provided food to over 13,000 families this year. We anticipate that number will continue to rise. Each visit provided ouor clients with enough grocies, including fresh fruits and vegetables, for a short period. It is with the generous donations, such as yours, that allow us to continue to serve those who are food insure in our community.

THE THREE ROADS TO VITALITY

As we gather together in the embrace of faith and fellowship throughout the synod (from assemblies, worship, ordinations, anniversaries, and to other synod-wide events) we are reminded of the powerful journey we are on as a Church with a capital C. Our commitment to Christ's teachings has allowed us to evolve beyond mere existence and instead embrace life abundantly. Throughout our synod over the past few years, we've been celebrating three key phrases that define our thriving communities: Growing Young, Stronger Together, and Going Beyond Death to Life.

Growing Young

Embracing life is not limited to any particular age group; it is a concept that transcends generations. We are proud to be a church that nurtures an intergenerational atmosphere, where the wisdom of our elders and the enthusiasm of our youth combine to create a vibrant and dynamic community.

In the teachings of Jesus, we find the encouragement to become like children, embracing a childlike faith that is open, eager, and receptive to God's grace. Our thriving churches have taken this message to heart, fostering an environment that allows every member, regardless of age, to experience spiritual growth and development, to participate in leadership roles, and exude the various elements of the growing young wheel. In doing so, we not only remain young at heart but also enrich each other's lives by sharing diverse perspectives and experiences.

Stronger Together
