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Dear Members and Friends,

A significant event happened in the life of this congregation – the death of my wife, Nancy. I want to address the "elephant in the room" or, in this case, in the life of the congregation. I feel I cannot continue writing these articles as if nothing has happened. It certainly has affected my thinking, perspective and my life, and will

continue to do so as time goes on. So, I believe this event needs attention.

Nancy had Polycystic Kidney Disease (PKD) and had a kidney transplant in 2015. She was in pain for about 8 months, the cause being her right original kidney. She had an operation in August to remove both original kidneys. The pathology report indicated a cancerous tumor in the right kidney. The cancer along with her not eating (because of pain) seemed to be the cause of her death (the medical terminology is "failure to thrive").

I want to thank all those who have prayed and supported me. I feel overwhelmed with the support of this congregation, previous congregations I've served, friends, relatives, teachers with whom she worked, and so many others. She was on so many churchs' prayer lists, I lost count.

Those of you who attended the funeral service here at St. Paul's witnessed that support. Speaking of the service, she would have been happy to hear the singing! She was always disappointed when people didn't sing at funerals we attended. She loved to sing.

As I reflect on my situation, my faith in an ever-present God and Redeemer has gotten me through the last 8 months and will continue to be at my side in the future (even if, at times, I don't feel God is there). Thank you all again for your prayers and support.

2023 LEHIGH MISSION DISTRICT CHRISTMAS INGATHERING

St. Paul's is once again participating in the Lehigh Mission District Ingathering to be held on Wednesday, December 6, 2023. Instead of a list of items to donate to 10-12 different agencies, each congregation has been assigned two agencies to focus their donations. St. Paul's will be collecting items for the **Sixth Street Shelter** and **Bethany Christian Services for Refugee Resettlement**. Our WELCA group will be responsible to deliver our items directly to the Sixth Street Shelter rather than gathering at a site to sort and pack them. We will do the sorting of your donations right here at St. Paul's on Monday, December 4, at 10:30 am. Those of us that have been doing this project over the years really miss gathering with people from different congregations to do the sorting, attend a worship service dedicating the gifts and sharing a meal. Hopefully things will change back to the way they were in the future. Let Sandi Wagaman know if you would like to volunteer to be a delivery person.

We will once again also be purchasing gifts for specific individuals for two organizations: **Topton Home Children's Services** and **Good Shepherd Home-Raker**. A sign-up sheet will be in the Narthex. Choose a name from the sandwich bags on the table, sign your name and phone number on sign-up sheet. There are instructions included in the bags for what to purchase and how to wrap them. We will deliver the wrapped gifts to St. John's Lutheran Church in Emmaus on Wednesday, December 6, 2023 between 9:00-10:30. We also need volunteers to deliver these items to St. John's.

Place all items for the Sixth Street Shelter and Bethany Christian Services for Refugee Resettlement in the plastic bins marked Ingathering in the Narthex. Wrapped gifts should be placed on top of the coat rack. Please check off your name on the list when bringing the wrapped gifts.

PARISH NURSING NOTES

It has become a very common practice to seek health information from the internet. The internet can be a very good source of information for our own medical questions. However, it is very easy to find information that is not correct or based in fact. We all have a tendency to believe anything that supports our own beliefs. (myself included) Some people often believe everything that they read, or they can become very cynical and start distrusting all medical information. Often there is a promise made in an online article or video and something for sale at the end of the article or presentation. When you ask a question in a search engine, the information is gathered from **everywhere** on line. The information may be accurate, or it may come from an unknown and unreliable source. Ads often can look very official. However you should always look for a sponsored tag with the ad showing from where the resource has come.

Some of the reputable online medical sites include:
National Institute on Aging (nia.nih.gov), American Geriatic Society
(healthinaging.org), Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
(cdc.gov.), National Institutes of Health (nih.gov), American Academy of
Family Physicians (familydoctor.org), Mayo Clinic (mayoclinic.org).
Most of the sites include a health information page to help you look up the
information. Although, just because a website ends in .org (non profit),
that does not necessarily mean it isn't promoting its own agenda.

If a claim sounds too good to be true, it most likely is **not** true. Often it will have no links to the promised information or to studies that have been done. It's called clickbait, which is a red flag. Authors of the studies should always be mentioned as well. Check who conducted the study. A well respected University or research institution is generally good.

Always check with your physician or practitioner for advice on locating information, or with any questions.

She meets Christians, Jews and Muslims who journey there from around the world to be physically present in a place that our three religions all recognize as holy ground.

Over the next three months, we will explore three kinds of holy places: *home, sanctuary,* and *pilgrimage*.

Home is what you create and carry with you to the places you go. The study dealt with all aspects of *home*, home itself; at home in our bodies; holy places. This is very interesting and appropriate with current world events.

Join us on November 8th when we will continue with *Holy places*, Session two, *Sanctuary*.

On October 14th our Justice Event was at Allegheny Lutheran Church in Mohnton and centered around "Diversity". Registration started at 9:30 a.m.; worship began at 10 a.m. conducted by Pastor Labagh. Our keynote speaker was Rubina Tareen who spoke on Unity in Diversity. She spoke on *What is Islam?/What do Muslims Believe?* After lunch there was a session with Laura Lawrence on the Baha'i Faith and Pastor Hang who has services with the Lutheran Hmong Group. Pastor Hang gave a very

informative briefing on his history of coming to the U.S. and the formation of the Hmong Faith. It was a very interesting and informative event!!!!

The virtues of gratefulness and generosity are connected. When we're truly thankful for all God provides, we want to sow generous seeds in other people's lives. What will be the harvest?
















Interconnected, Diverse, and Wild Creation

Have you ever worked on a crochet or knit project, and got to a point where your yarn ends up tied in a bird nest-looking mess? Or maybe you're one that works with a fishing line, and while re-spooling a reel you end up with a knot with loops and swoops that make you scratch your head and wonder, "Now what?"

I've noticed that when I experience the dilemma of a knotted skein, I feel frustration and anger. If I'm not in my clearest headspace, I will reactively pull one loop at a time, looking for one with any ability to move. "This one moves? Great!" I'll pull it in either direction until it stops. Still knotted? Find another! And again, and again. If I'm not careful I can end up tightening the knot even further, never to be unwound and destined for the scrap pile.

On my clearer days, I can take a jumbled mess of a knot and get it unwound and collected into a smaller ball of yarn without even needing to cut it from the rest! In Times like this, I have found, that the frustration and the anger are still present, yet in letting them pass while I pause, I create the opportunity to take care and intention in my untangling.

I wonder if God feels like that sometimes when, as the interconnected, diverse, and wild Creation that God so deeply loves, we get ourselves all knotted up through broken relationships, judgments, and ignorant acts. I wonder, does God reactively start pulling at us to take action? Does God accept our jumbled mess, allowing us to make different choices and seek right relationships that honor our connectedness? Does God enjoy the feeling of seeing us come together to co-create something new and beautiful?

May you know and trust that the One who has knit you together in the womb is the One who is eager and ready to create goodness and mercy in and through you this day and always. Blessings on your detangling.

A Martin Luther Statue in North America, 1883

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

On Sunday, November 12, 2023, you are invited to the dedication of a Martin Luther statue at 10:30 A.M. at St. John's Lutheran Church, Fogelsville. The Luther statue once belonged to St. Peter's Lutheran Church, Allentown, Pennsylvania.

On November 10, 1483, Martin Luther was born in Eisleben, Germany. In 1517, the Protestant Reformation ignited with the publication of Luther's Ninety-five Theses posted on the Wittenberg Roman Catholic Church door. From that moment on the German-priest-professor-theologian became the face of the Protestant Reformation.

Subsequently, festivals commemorating the Protestant Reformation and Luther's birthday became a thing to celebrate. Luther objected to such use of his name by his followers. He wrote in 1522, "I ask that my name be left silent and people not call themselves Lutherans but rather Christian. Who is Luther? The doctrine is not mine. I have been crucified for not one." (Admonition Against Insurrection, 1522) Given Luther's statement, a statue for the Reformer would be out of the question as well.

In our mission district we have 25 congregations that bear Luther's name. In some of them there is a stained glass window with the figure of Luther in their church building.

In 1883, there was a statue of Luther at the corner of Ridge Avenue and Chew Street that stood outside of St. Peter's Lutheran Church made of white bronze by Monumental Bronze Co. Bridgeport, Connecticut.

It was St. Peter's Ridge hope to take their statue to a Macungie site for a new German descent congregation. Unfortunately, St. Peter's Church dissolved in 2019 as a congregation. The whereabouts of the Luther statue became unknown until I poked around and located the Luther statue in the yard of a textile mill where it had been stored.

According to The History of the Allentown Conference of the Ministerium of Pennsylvania by Preston A. Laury, under St. Peter's Church records the "Quarto-Centennial of the Reformation was observed in 1883, and commemorated by the erection of a statue of Luther, the first in America."

What does this mean?

I can hear the words of The Rev. Dr. Walter Wagner. The professor would caution Lutherans of possible "LUTHEROLOTRY".

However, we are not idolizing Luther. I have applied the law to Luther on these pages of the *(continued on the next page ⇒)*

I have also applied the gospel to Luther for his sight in advocating for proper approach in handling the plague in Wittenberg ("Help Out" October 2021, Volumen 26, No. 9).

In our modern time, dedication of a Luther statue from 1883 in North America speaks of our Lutheran tradition in our own Lehigh Mission District.

The 1883 Luther statue is a symbol of Lutheran history. It is part of our heritage. We don't worship Luther. We don't worship artifacts. We worship the mighty fortress that is our God.
