Parish Nursing Notes "It's Wintertime Again" Jan. 2024 Peggy Saylor, RN

As we enter the season of winter, it's important that we treat the season and its accompanying weather conditions with the respect that they deserve. If you are not one of the "fortunate" individuals who are retired, not employed at the present time or can work from home, you need to be aware of some of the safety issues with travel during the winter season.

First and foremost, if the weather is bad, try NOT to travel unless absolutely necessary. Research the weather advisories that are issued by the National Weather Service and plan accordingly. If you must travel, here are some important points to remember:

- Let someone know your destination and when you expect to arrive. Ask them to notify the authorities if you are late. Be sure to have your fully charged cell phone and a car charger with you.
- Check and restock the winter emergency supplies in your car before you leave.
- Never pour hot water on your windshield to remove ice or snow as shattering may occur.
- Don't rely on a car to provide sufficient heat; the car may break down.
- Always carry additional warm clothing appropriate for the winter conditions.

If you get stranded, staying in your vehicle is often the safest choice. These steps will increase your safety if stranded:

- Hang a brightly colored cloth out a crack in your window (or tie on your antenna if you have one) as a signal to rescuers.
- Move anything you need from the trunk to the passenger area.
- Wrap your entire body, including your head, in extra clothing, blankets or newspapers.
- Run the motor and heater for about 10 minutes per hour, opening one window slightly to let in air.
- Make sure that snow is not blocking the exhaust pipe this will reduce the risk of carbon monoxide poisoning.

- As you sit, keep moving your arms and legs to improve your circulation and stay warm.
- Do not eat snow, it will lower your body temperature.

Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

OUR SOURCE OF LIGHT

January 6 marks the day of Epiphany, when the wise men (who were Gentiles) came to worship Jesus and bring him gifts. During the church-year season of Epiphany, we remember that God's Son is the Light of the whole world.

Ponder the gifts of Epiphany with these two reflections, written centuries apart:



Worship in Collaboration with Oglala Sioux Nation

On November 12, 2023, St. Mark's Evangelical Lutheran Church, Birdsboro, PA, held their annual Native American worship service in honor of November being Native American Heritage Month. I attended the worship service and wanted to share my experience with you.

St. Mark's Lutheran Church has a partnership with the Oglala Sioux Nation of Native Americans in Pine Ridge Reservation, South Dakota, one of the poorest communities in the United States, and has been supporting them in many ways with their giving and their prayers.

In the worship service, the English translations used for the liturgy were:

Creator as the name used for God
Creator-Sets-Free as the name used for Jesus
The Chosen One as the name used for Christ
The Great Spirit as the name used for the Holy Spirit
The music for the worship service had a Native American vibe, words, and theme involving the sacredness of nature and life.

Copal incense from Central and Southwestern North America was used during the service as Native Americans used for sacred services.





Pr. Jim Farnsworth's message was dedicated to Native Americans and how the new immigrants treated them to America. He asked that we remember and honor those who have gone before us -- the original inhabitants of this land. He also asked that we have a right relationship with God and each other and that we have a responsibility to repair relations. We reconcile by learning the truth, loving each other, and breaking down barriers with others. He suggested that we learn the history of our area by looking through the eyes of our neighbors and that we are called to be good neighbors.

The Holy Innocents

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

As the world comes together to celebrate the New Year this 2024, I have wondered how can we celebrate a new year when the issues from last year trail right behind us?

Many Christians around the world celebrated Christmas a couple of days ago. We celebrated the birth of the Christ child coming into the world. Now move over Christmas fiesta! It is New Year's Day!

But the church liturgical calendar does not allow us to jump over that one prickly church festival - The Martyrs of the Holy Innocents.

The story is about Joseph and Mary taking their child Jesus to Egypt for safety. Herod had "sent and killed all the children in and around Bethlehem who were two years old or under." Matthew 2:16

The parent's shelter in Egypt served as a reminder of yet another massacre of innocent children under Pharaoh.

The death of one child is one too many. The Israel-Hamas War has caused the massacre of many holy innocent children.

According to Professor Geoffrey Claussen, "As a rabbi, Jewish ethicist, father, and human being, I am horrified by the continuation of attacks killing innocent children. While I understand responding to heinous crimes by attacking those who perpetrated them, I believe that all children deserve to live and thrive, whether they are Israeli or Palestinian. In the Jewish communities in which I travel, this view is widely shared."

The writer points out that "at least 7,000 Palestinian children have been killed by the Israeli military." ("In My Words: Killing children in the Israel-Hamas war is not justified" by Geoffrey Claussen.)
