

Dear Members and Friends,

We are in the Easter "season." If you haven't noticed, the Easter season, according to the church's liturgical year, is 7 weeks long. When I was a child, I thought Easter was just one day. I got up Sunday morning, went downstairs, hunted for my Easter basket which the Easter bunny hid, found it, ate some candy (out of sight of my

parents) and headed off to Sunday School (where I ate more candy) and then sat with my parents in church.

I had come to realize, probably in seminary, that there was more to Easter than just one day. Easter Sunday begins a season in the church year that ends with Pentecost Sunday, a day Christians remember the outpouring of the Holy Spirit upon the earliest believers in Jesus. The Easter season can be time of spiritual growth and a time of deeper intimacy with God.

The appointed gospels for each Sunday in Easter allow us to reflect on some important faith issues: like doubting of Jesus presence ("Doubting Thomas"); Jesus knowing his sheep; Jesus making himself known in meal and scripture, and the depth of Jesus' love. Come join us for the rest of Easter and be inspired by Christ's presence in Word and Sacrament.

Lobby, Michael's and JoAnne's craft stores. If you would like copies of knitted or crocheted patterns, please see Steph. We've made sample hats from several patterns, and can help if you get stuck.

Project Warm Up America (WUA)

If you are making 7" x 9" rectangles for <u>Project Warm Up America</u>, note that the pieces must be "finished" – i.e. yarn ends sewn in. The Web site has some <u>pattern suggestions</u>, but you can make rectangles in whatever patterns you like. It is a great way to use up partial skeins in your stash. And there are many partial skeins or single skeins in the yarn collection at church.

Plarn Project/Monthly Working Sessions



Thanks to our great plarn team, we have 3 newly-made plarn mats to deliver to the homeless ministry at Caring D.A.M. Hearts. In March, we got started weaving mats on our new peg loom, made by Bill Wagaman. Ken Ritter just completed a peg loom for us, so we now have two! Weaving the mats goes more quickly than crocheting – and more people can

help. But we will continue to crochet mats as well. Steph will pick up additional large hooks for crocheters who want to give it a try.

Just a reminder that we will be having working sessions for making Plarn – or any of the above projects –on the third Tuesday of the month from 1:30 – 3:30PM. Feel free to join us making plarn, working on a sleeping mat, or knitting/crocheting hats or rectangles. MOTHER — AND MORE

Though I've primarily known God as Father — along with metaphors such as rock, eagle, shepherd, potter — I also learned of Scripture passages portraying God as mother. For example (all NIV):

- "For a long time I have kept silent. ... But now, like a woman in childbirth, I cry out, I gasp and pant" (Isaiah 42:14).
- "As a mother comforts her child, so will I comfort you" (Isaiah 66:13).
- "Like a bear robbed of her cubs, I will attack them" (Hosea 13:8).
- In others, God is pictured doing traditional "women's work": making clothes (Genesis 3:21), sweeping (Isaiah 14:23), preparing and hosting a meal (Proverbs 9:1-6), baking bread (Luke 13:21).

One of my favorite images of God is tucked in Hosea. While many modern dads nurture their toddlers this way, the tender words surely call to mind a mama's care: "It was I who taught [Israel] to walk. ... To them I was like one who lifts a little child to the cheek, and I bent down to feed them" (Hosea 11:3-4). Most importantly, God — however known — is loving and good.

HOSPITALIZED?

Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.

OPEN HANDS



Liturgical scholar Balthasar Fischer (1912-2001) shared an "a-ha" realization about the significance of praying with open, outstretched hands, an ancient practice. The opposite gesture, a closed fist, is used to threaten others or even inflict violence. We also grasp things in closed fists, refusing to let go, to share, to hold gently or loosely.

When we pray with open hands, Fischer explained, we're saying before God that we renounce "all highhandedness, all pride in [our] own sufficiency, all violence." We hold up our empty hands to God, saying, "I have nothing that I have not received from you, nothing that you have not placed in my empty hands. Therefore I do not keep a frantic hold on anything you have given me; therefore, too, I desire not to strike and hurt but only to give and to spread happiness and joy."

AFLAME WITH FAITH

In the Old Testament, fire often symbolizes the presence of God's Spirit. For example, God called to Moses from a burning bush (Exodus 3:2-6) and defeated the prophets of Baal on Mount Carmel (1 Kings 18:30-39). In the New Testament, tongues of fire rested atop the believers gathered on Pentecost (Acts 2:3).



Some Christians have described a burning or current-like sensation when they encounter God. Methodism founder John Wesley said his heart was "strangely warmed" during worship. After such an encounter, people often feel compelled to share the Good News of Jesus. The flame of faith inside one believer can spark a revival of faith in others. As Charles Spurgeon said, "A burning heart will soon find for itself a flaming tongue."

A HOUSE UNITED

When President Lincoln declared in 1858, "A house divided against itself cannot stand," he was echoing Jesus. Scribes thought Jesus was casting out demons by Satan's power, so Jesus responded, "How can Satan cast out Satan? ... If a house is divided against itself, that house cannot stand" (Mark 3:23-25, NIV). There are countless modern examples: Civil wars. Families torn apart. Business partners going separate ways. Even churches splitting.

Jesus used the "house divided" image to point out the nonsense of the scribes' words. It takes someone *other than* the "strong man" (v. 27), or demon, occupying a space to cast that demon out. Evil can't drive out evil. Sin isn't stronger than sin. Hate doesn't solve hate. Violence doesn't end violence. Two wrongs don't make a right.

Jesus came to "bind" evil with goodness, conquer hate with love and teach us the same. Throughout the gospels, Jesus treats *all* people with love — even those who oppose him — so that, in the end, we all will be a house *united* by God's goodness.

Experiments in Ministry

A story from the Central States Synod As you read this story, what connects with you? What experiments are occurring in your synod and congregation?

How often have you heard folks in congregations lament that they just don't have the resources or learning opportunities they need to be strong leaders and vital congregations? The <u>Central States Synod</u> wondered how it could help address those needs and make access easy. That led to the beginning of the <u>Ministry Lab</u>. The synod envisions the lab as a place to ask questions, learn, work with different "tools" or resources, and experiment to see what works. A lab is not just a depository for resources; it's an active place where one can gather and engage with others.

When visiting congregations, attending conferences or meeting partners, staff and leaders in the Central States Synod diligently listen to folks to identify common needs and areas of growth so that they can equip and support ministry. The goal of the Ministry Lab is to provide "resources and tools so that we may live out God's purpose, united with Christ, as we walk the way of Jesus."





The lab has three areas of focus: *good order*, meaning leadership, policies, building use, stewardship and meeting protocol; *means of grace*, including biblical interpretation, worship, communication and welcoming; and *living faith*, such as community engagement, social statements, collaboration and technology. Since the Ministry Lab began in fall 2023, it has offered opportunities focused on Scripture interpretation, ideas for worship and preaching during Advent, and leadership development. People learn through active engagement, not passive observation, so the Learning Lab is always lively. Some opportunities are "one and done" whereas others consist of multiple sessions.



Moving forward, the Ministry Lab is excited to offer an open conversation with the Rev. Susan Candea, bishop of the Central States Synod, about the upcoming ELCA social statement *Civic Life and Faith*, a Collaboration Lab in May and a Communications Lab in the fall. Anyone anywhere can check out and learn from the Central States Synod Ministry Lab. See what's available now!

Remember that a portion of offerings given to Central States congregations becomes Mission Support for the synod and allows staff and leaders to address congregations' needs and interests through the Ministry Lab, today and into the future.




Join us for May Play Day and Family Work Day

Solar Eclipse 2024

Dear Lehigh Mission District,

About two weeks ago I was asked, "Oye, what do you think of the solar eclipse? Dicen que el mundo se va a acabar. They say the world is going to end."

I shared that the last solar eclipse I saw was in 2017 with my son. We took cereal boxes and aluminum foil. We poked a pinhole through the box to see the reflection of the solar eclipse inside the box. I assured this person that we will be here to see another eclipse and that our children will see many more.

Whether it was faith or fear from the combined long week of rain that followed the 4.0 magnitude earthquake felt from New Jersey, some Christians expected that the total solar eclipse was going to usher in an apocalyptic or an eschatological end of the world.

Some Christians, of course, believed that they would be taken up to heaven in the rapture before the end of the world, as if only Christians have a local direct line to God to deliver us from any fate to come.

On the morning of the solar eclipse, I listened to Ismael Rivera's album Eclipse Total. There were four eclipses in 1975 - the year the album was released.

As the hour was approaching, I went to the Fellowship Hall where the Ladies Aid and volunteers were baking the annual cinnamon bun at the church.

One church member had set a timer to halt production of the sticky buns so that they could step outside and capture the solar eclipse. It was a bit cloudy, but we got a chance to see God's creation.

We had a fun time watching the eclipse together. We included the Martin Luther statue in the fun by placing a pair of UV glasses on Luther.

Certainly, creation can bring fear and awe at the wonders of the galaxy. In the words of the Psalmist, "The heavens declare the glory of God; the skies proclaim the work of his hands." Psalm 19:1 NIV


