

Dear Members and Friends,

I was reading a devotional written by John Edgerton, a UCC pastor writing for the national United Church of Christ's website. He begins by asking three questions: 1. How has the recent Covid-19 resurgence affected your church? 2. Are there people you know for whom increased restrictions are bad news? Are there people you

know for whom increased restrictions are good news? 3. What is God calling your church to do in these days?

He quotes from Haggai 1:7-9 – "Thus says the Lord of hosts: 'Consider how you fared . . . You have looked for much, and lo it came to little; and when you brought it home, I blew it away. Why?' says the Lord of hosts. 'Because my house lies in ruins, while all of you hurry off to your own houses.'" This is about what to do when hopes and expectations are dashed.

The Hebrews in exile prayed for an end. When it came it was hard to believe. But joy didn't last. Trouble found them again and they felt let down. "Why was this happening?"

God explained that the people were not yet finished working. The Hebrews thought everything was fine with the homecoming from the exile but that was not true. The rebuilding of the Temple in Jerusalem was the important work that was left unfinished. God said "finish the work." And he said "only then can your hopes flourish." God gave them strength to do the work.

As we are in the midst of a resurgence of Covid-19, plans for schools, churches, and family are up in the air. We were hoping for an end to this pandemic or at least the restrictions. Our hopes have been dashed. Why is this happening?

I think of those who are most vulnerable in this pandemic. The work of caring for the vulnerable is never finished. God says "finish the work, only then can your hopes flourish."

Let us care for the vulnerable among us and do the work that must be done rather than "running off to your own houses." In other words, rather than thinking about our own selves who are the vulnerable among us and how can we care for them, as individuals and as a community. Caring for the neighbor is imbedded in the 10 Commandments. Caring for the neighbor is something Jesus always put forth.

MONTHLY MADDNESS FUNDRAISER – GIVE THE GIFT THAT KEEPS ON GIVING!

St. Paul's is once again participating in the Monthly Maddness fundraiser in conjunction with Dan Schantz Greenhouse. A purchase of a gift card for \$20 will give the gift card recipient a specific flower (or pumpkin) gift each month during 2022 – a \$75 value. St. Paul's will receive \$10 on every card sold – proceeds will go toward the cost of snow removal. Redeeming your monthly gift is easy - simply present the gift card at Dan Schantz Greenhouse on Lehigh Street in Allentown any time during the month and pick up your gift. Note that you do not need to make a purchase when picking up your gift. And if you cannot get there during a particular month, the card can be used during that month in 2023. Here is what is offered for each month in 2022.



We are taking orders for Monthly Maddness cards beginning September 12, and will continue through November 21. This time, we will have two delivery dates. If you purchase your card(s) by **October 10**, you can pick them up at church on **October 17**. If you purchase your card(s) between **October 11 and November 21**, you can pick them up at church on **November 28**.

You can purchase cards before/after Sunday worship. If you are attending indoor worship, look for the display – pick up an envelope and fill out your contact info along with number of cards requested. Price is \$20/card. Place your cash or check in the envelope and drop the envelope in the box labeled Monthly Maddness. If you are attending the parking lot service, ask an usher for an envelope, fill out your contact info along with number of cards requested. Place your cash or check in the envelope and return to an usher. Please make your checks payable to St. Paul's Lutheran Church, and write **gift card** on the memo line.

CONCERT AT ST. PAUL'S PASTIMES CONCERT

Add to the Halloween excitement by joining us for a concert on Sunday, October 31st at 2:00 PM. Pastimes is the next addition to our continuing concert series. There will be light refreshments following the concert, which will finish in plenty of time for you to distribute candy to all the trick-or-treaters. Join us for this exciting trip in musical history!

Pastimes is an early music consort performing music from the Middle Ages to the Renaissance. Their repertoire spans 500 years, from crusader songs to dances from Queen Elizabeth's court. Pastimes performs on authentic period instruments and in historical costume. Featured instruments include strings (lute, violas da gamba, medieval fiddle, renaissance guitar), winds (recorders, krummhorns, dulcians, shawms, rackett, pipe and tabor, and the ever popular 'screaming pipe'), drone instruments (a variety of historical bagpipes, hurdy-gurdy), and odd percussion instruments (assorted drums, clacking shells, string drum, rommelpot).

FOR LOVE OF ANIMALS

St. Francis of Assisi, known for his affection for animals, is honored on October 4. Some congregations observe this day by blessing pets, remembering that God pronounced animals — along with all creation good. God saved not only Noah's family but animals of all kinds from the Flood. And despite Jonah's protests, God had compassion on Nineveh — "and [its] many animals" (Jonah 4:11). How intriguing that the prophet adds this point!

Care for all living creatures is clearly part of the divine character. Animals don't do anything to earn God's favor except be themselves. From this, we can learn that God pours out love unconditionally. As Psalm 36:6 (CEV) declares, "All people and animals are under your care."

PARISH NURSE NOTES "Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness Month" October 2021 Peggy Saylor, RN

In 1998, President Regan designated October as "Pregnancy and Infant Loss Awareness" month and in 2006, the United States House of Representatives passed a resolution declaring October 15th as Pregnancy and Infant Loss Remembrance Day.

The statistics on perinatal loss which is defined as "the death of an infant during pregnancy or shortly thereafter" and may include miscarriages, stillbirths or neonatal deaths are grim. According to the CDC, 10% - 15% of all pregnancies before 20 weeks gestation are miscarriages and over 24,000 stillbirths (pregnancies between 20 and 40 weeks) are stillbirths. Advances in medical technology over the past 30 years have resulted in improved prenatal care but sadly the rate of early stillbirth (20 - 27 weeks) has remained the same.

Having a designated time for grieving parents and friends has provided a safe space for those trying to understand the loss and comfort those grieving. Most individuals who suffer an early loss suffer alone as there was no "body" to be seen and usually occurs before the outward signs of pregnancy are noted. These individuals may also have experienced remarks from well-meaning friends and family using clichés such as "heaven needed another angel," "it must have been God's plan," or other words meant to ease the pain, but they do not. Some suggestions for helping those grieving are:

Recognize that a baby has died, and this death is as real as the death of an older child. Realize that parents are sad because they miss their baby, and that baby cannot be replaced by a future child or an older child that they already have.

Let the parents know they are in your prayers. Send a card simply stating this. Long expressions are not needed.

Take time to be with them. Most times, words are not needed. What is needed is a listening ear, a shoulder to cry on, a hand to hold or a hug. If the baby was given a name, use that name in conversation. It is okay to admit that you can't imagine how they feel. A simple phrase to say is "I can't imagine how you feel but want you to know that I am here for you and am so sorry that you are going through this."

Offer to help with chores – grocery shopping, do laundry, etc. and any other way to help lighten the burden of daily chores. Bring meals to them as most mothers don't have the energy to do even the basic chores.

Most of all, give parents time to grieve. This process can last a lifetime, but our help, comfort and sensitive support can help to support them during their grief journey.

DAILY REMINDERS OF BAPTISM



One way Satan attacks Christians is by reminding us of our sins, both of commission (wrongdoing) and omission (neglecting to do right). And one way we can fight back is by remembering our baptism. The reformer Martin Luther recommended pondering that sacrament daily, whenever

we wash our face, because "in baptism sins are drowned."

Getting dressed can serve as another frequent reminder, Luther says, because baptism is the "daily garment ... the Christian is to wear all the time." He writes, "Christ instituted holy baptism ... to clothe you with his righteousness. It is tantamount to his saying, 'My righteousness shall be your righteousness; my innocence, your innocence. Your sins indeed are great, but by baptism I bestow on you my righteousness; I strip death from you and clothe you with my life.""

HOSPITALIZED?


Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the pastor can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the pastor will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the Pastor to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office or the Pastor.



WHAT GOD IS LIKE


Before her death in 2019, Rachel Held Evans started writing a book with her young children in mind. The goal was to help them explore images for God, who is love. What Is God Like? (co-authored by Matthew Turner) acknowledges, "That's a very big question, one that people from places all around the world have wondered about since the beginning of time." The book highlights such biblical images for God as an eagle, a shepherd, a fort, wind, an artist, a "strong and safe" mother, and a "gentle and safe" father.

Just as Evans remained open to questions as a means to grow in faith, her book concludes: "Keep searching. Keep wondering. ... But whenever you aren't sure what God is like, think about what makes you feel safe ... brave ... loved. That's what God is like." What images for God come to your mind? Indeed, what is God like — for you?

CONGREGATIONAL LEGACY & PURPOSE



I have to admit, I'm a sucker for history, especially church history. I love learning about times in the past that I'll never get to experience, in places I can only aspire to visit. I've been fortunate to go to some of those places: I've stood in churches that were 1,000 years old across Europe and marveled at the engineering, been in the cradle of the Roman Empire, lived in New York City and Philadelphia, laid down, in the rain, in the grass of monasteries from 800 years ago that is now in ruins. In all of these places, I try to imagine what it was like to be part of a community from long ago. Sometimes it's easier than others, I know something unique about a place or I know how a building was built, but the end is the same- I am in a place, remembering what I can about it, being part of its history and life.

There is a cycle to these things. Empires come and go. Leaders and rulers come and go. Institutions come and go. All of these life cycles, being born, going through a growth period, living adulthood, moving into the twilight of life, and finally, death, are all part of our lives, whether on a personal or institutional level. Part of the incredible message of Christ's suffering, death, and resurrection is that death does not have the final word. However, no matter how much we try to avoid it, duck it, or deny it, death will have a word. Jesus himself understood that the only way to resurrection was through death - after all, if there's no death before resurrection, what we are really talking about is immortality, which is certainly not the Christian message.

These "deaths" can come in many forms in the church. Maybe it's moving a worship time, moving from 2 services to 1 so that the community might be one and ministry might be effective. It may be struggling with how to do "virtual" church in the time of a pandemic. Maybe it's letting a go special ministry that the church can no longer support with financial or labor. Maybe it's giving up a building to move to a building that fits the congregation. Maybe it's merging or closing.

The truth is that none of these realities, these deaths, are easy to imagine or even embrace. There is real grief, fear, anxiety, anger, and sadness that comes with even thinking about them. It's also true that we are not alone in these decisions. We do not know what resurrection may look like, but we know that it is Christ's promise. History always seems short when we are the ones participating in it. Christ sees the long view and, I think, wondering how we can participate in trying to see that long view is part of our call as a Christian. We cannot see the end but we can think and pray about what next, faithful steps may be. As a church, we have to start thinking about what those faithful steps might be, both as individuals, as a church, and as a synod. Four years ago, I had the chance to go to the Isle of Iona in Scotland and visit the Benedictine abbey there, which is now a retreat center. Could a group of Benedictine nuns, living in the 1200's on a remote island of Scotland, possibly imagine that a guy from a land that had not been discovered yet to come visit their monastery? That, I would lay down, in the rain, in the ruins of their chapel, and imagine what it was like to worship there? 800 years ago, it would have been simply impossible to dream. What they did do was make faithful decisions that allowed that moment to happen and, even in the literal ruins of their communal life, there was a moment of that community's resurrection in my mind and heart, remembering them. As we move forward as a church, locally and as a synod, I pray that we can make faithful, prayerful decisions that are resurrection decisions and not immortality ones.



HELP OUT

We are beginning to feel the return of fall. By this time many families have completed their vacation outings. School is back in session both online and in the classroom. By now many congregations have celebrated Rally Day at the end of the month of September.

Rally Day signals the beginning of Sunday school and church activities in the liturgical calendar year.

But the year 2021 seems a bit more like the year 2020. The COVID-19 pandemic continues to surround us with its new Delta variant. According to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), as of September 16, there has been 666,440 total deaths in the United States.

The continual presence of the pandemic has caused pastors and congregations to approach in-person Sunday School and other activities with caution. Like many school districts, several churches follow the recommended guidelines of wearing a face mask, social distancing, washing hands, and getting vaccines.

In a similar situation around 1527 in Germany, Martin Luther had to deal with the plague in Wittenberg.

Basically, Luther's guideline was to help put out the fire of the plague in Wittenberg. This simple instruction was because the Christian community in Wittenberg was divided over whether to take the proper precautions to curb the plague.

When there have been natural disasters such as fires and floods, Christian churches have divinely extended their hands to help out.

Our Christian response now shouldn't be any different. At this time, our mission is to help put out the fire of COVID-19.
