

ST. PAUL'S FIRST ANNUAL BASKET SOCIAL

The Worship and Music and Fellowship/Evangelism Committees have decided to hold a Basket Social on September 17, 2022 from 9:00 am to 4:00 pm. For those who may not know, a basket social is a kind of silent auction. Numbered tickets are purchased and people drop their ticket in a can near their choice of a basket. A winning ticket is then drawn from each can at the end of the day of the event.

The committee established a **goal of 50 baskets**. The committee is seeking donations of gift baskets, and/or individual empty baskets, and items for the baskets from members of the congregation. New or nearly new items are preferred. For example, you can donate empty baskets, made up baskets, or items to put in a basket.

We are planning to have "special" baskets which will be bigger and more valuable than the regular baskets. We will also have a big-ticket item which will be a laptop computer. Another feature will be gift cards from local businesses and individuals. Another draw will be a large "basket" of paper products (paper towels, toilet paper, wipes, etc.). Everyone who brings a donated food item will receive a ticket towards winning the paper products.

Each month there will be suggestions of possible themed baskets you may want to donate. For the month of February, we are suggesting donations of baskets (empty), hot beverage baskets, paper products and possible donation of Christmas gifts that people wish to "re-gift." While these are suggestions, all gift baskets, and donations will be accepted any time.

We are also planning to have food and beverages available and plan to have a bake sale for which we will need donations.

Anyone wishing to help with this major project is welcome. We need help.

Please spread the word, talk to your neighbors and friends. They're welcome to donate baskets or items, too. Let's make this a real success.

"Heart Health Awareness Month" Go Red Day February 4 2022 Cathy Waltemyer BSN RN

Taking a break from all things COVID I want to share a bit of heart trivia before moving on to the meat of this article.

- 1200+ B.C.E. Ancient Heart Disease— Egyptian mummies, some more than 3,500 years old, show signs of cardiovascular disease, proving that heart disease isn't an entirely modern phenomenon. Researchers speculate that the high-fat diet and sedentary lifestyle of upper-class Egyptians may have contributed to their poor health, but other pre-modern factors could also be at play.
- 1924—American Heart Association Created— Several heart disease research groups combine to form the AHA, hoping to coordinate and promote efforts to understand and treat heart disease.
- 1950's—Diet Becomes Important—In the 1950s, doctors begin to understand cholesterol and the role of a low-fat diet in cardiovascular health.
- May 1967—First Bypass Surgery Performed—Argentinian surgeon Rene Favaloro from the Cleveland Clinic performs the first bypass surgery, changing heart treatment forever. Today, coronary artery bypass grafting is the most common cardiac surgery in the world.

In 1964 President Lyndon B. Johnson declared February as "Heart Health Awareness Month". You might ask why we observe American Heart month every February.

Every year more that 600,000 Americans die from heart disease. Heart disease affects all ages, genders and ethnicities. Risk factors of heart disease include high cholesterol, high blood pressure, smoking, diabetes, and excessive alcohol use and of course genetics may also play a role.

To observe Heart Health Month here are a few suggestions:

Take up a heart-healthy habit:

Staying active, eating healthy, and watching our weight are all important parts of maintaining a healthy cardiovascular system. Pick a new heart-

healthy habit like jogging or substituting sodas with water and try to stick to it for a whole month.

Educate yourself:

Learn about the risk factors for heart disease, the ways you can prevent them, and the lifestyle choices that can help you stay healthy.

Get your cholesterol and lipid levels tested:

your doctor can order this simple blood test for you.

Did you know

- One in 5 heart attacks happen without the person even knowing.
- Women may experience different symptoms than men. These include pain in the back, arm, neck, or shoulder; nausea, vomiting; fatigue and shortness of breath.
- Women under the age of 50 are twice as likely to die of a heart attack as men in the same age group
- Heart attacks are more likely to occur on Monday mornings than other days of the week. This is due to changes in sleep behaviors on the weekend.
- If you drink one or more diet sodas a day, your chances of having a heart attack are 43% higher than those who drink regular soda or none at all.

An ancient heresy — that the God of the Old Testament was a God of judgment and wrath, while the God of the New Testament is a God of grace and love — still persists a bit. Yet God is the same God, with the same characteristics, throughout time. Way back in Genesis 3, God graciously sewed garments to clothe humans, although they had disobeyed him. And even in the Gospels, God's anger was evident through Jesus' response to temple moneychangers cheating the poor.

God always works for life and goodness in all things. Sometimes people misunderstand God's ways; sometimes God, like a human parent, uses "tough love." Mick Brooks writes: "The Old Testament is God for us, the time of Christ is God with us, and the age of the Holy Spirit is God in us" (*Every Day With Jesus*, Sept/Oct 2020). That may be a bit simplistic, but it's a good reminder that while God's ways of interacting with us vary, he — the God of Love — does not.







Hunger is a real problem in our country and our area of Pennsylvania is no different. Last year we started a reverse Advent food drive where congregants collected food items each day during Advent, culminating with delivery to our local food bank. It was such a success that we decided to expand it to the community. Volunteers will collect, sort, and deliver food items to the pantry right after Christmas when the need is the greatest. This year's food drive was very successful as we collected 983 lbs. of food valued at \$1671 for the ProJeCt Easton Food Pantry in Easton, PA. Approximately 43 families from Arndt's and people outside the community participated in the project. A local moving company donated a truck and manpower for the delivery. We hope to make this project an annual event of providing for those in need.
