The Pastor's Corner – I WANT TO FOLLOW JESUS!

That tune has been going through my head for a few hours this morning. In Him there is no east or west...When I see these words I imagine only a straight line - - or is it a circle? I guess it is a circle.

So, I went to the hymn book only to find "I want Jesus to walk with me." Maybe that's a better way to understand "What a friend we have in Jesus."

From the ELW:

"When we were baptized, we were baptized into Jesus. Our gracious heavenly Father liberates us from sin and death by joining us to the death and resurrection of our Lord Jesus Christ. By water and the Holy Spirit, we are made members of the church, which is the body of Christ."

We do not have a choice. If we were baptized, we have been attached to Jesus.

- You can run the other way; Jesus will be there right along side of you.
- You can claim to be an atheist, Jesus will be there right alongside of you.
- You can be so angry at God for your life circumstances; Jesus will be there right alongside of you.

Jesus is like super glue. He is un-stickable. You can't pry Him off. We find ourselves as members in the church which is the body of Christ and Jesus is stuck to us. Go ahead – shake your arm, try to shake Jesus off. Nope, you can't do it. Try jumping up and down. No, doesn't work either. He's stuck to you!

Stuck - what? Can't <u>follow</u> Jesus. Wait a minute... Can't <u>follow</u> Jesus? Nope. He's stuck to you. We are left with the old acronym: WWJD. WHAT WOULD JESUS DO? Since Jesus is stuck **to** us, **in** us, **around** us, now, we have to rethink how we live our lives.

- To us How we dress, do we care about our physical appearance?
- In us What we ingest, what we think, how we spend our money and time.
- Around us Where we go, who we associate with, how we behave and carry ourselves.

And we thought it was once and done, and I'm home free. Yes, you are! Home with Jesus stuck to you.

That's why WWJD is so important. We have been giving the guiding light to follow the directions of our savior. WHAT WOULD JESUS DO? should always be the first question we ask when faced with any decision. Make it a habit. Study the Bible to learn WWJD. The best rule of thumb might be "For the Common Good" of those concerned. And then, would Jesus agree with your decision or should you rethink it?

COUNCIL HIGHLIGHTS

June

Council received interim Pastor Ginny Goodwin who introduced the council to her thoughts for the continued growth for St. Paul's.

A committee was formed to develop a new administrative assistant job description and place an ad for the position on the Synod site, Facebook, and the Free Press.

Council is looking at the possibility of a large screen for those having difficulty with worship.

It was welcome news that Pastor Ginny was very much into continuing the Monday morning Bible Study.

July

Council discussed our eligibility for a grant from ELCA Disability Ministries to put a ramp in front of the street entrance to the church for those that are dropped off and have difficulty with the curb.

The council had to quickly decide to replace one of the air conditioners for the sanctuary; and then about a week or two later, the air conditioner for the offices. This they completed via email which allowed them to act quickly.

August

Since our church pictorial is so outdated, members are working toward completing a church pictorial in-house. There will be more information on this when the plan is completed.

The application for the grant from ELCA Disability Ministries to put a ramp in front of the street entrance to the church was not submitted by July 31, 2025, deadline, therefore council will be looking into local companies to see what the cost would be.

Starting October 19th, council meetings will be after Sunday services.

PARISH NURSING NOTES

"Be the CEO of your Health" September 2025 Peggy Saylor, RN

I recently heard a story on Good Morning America regarding being the "CEO of your Health" and it reminded me of all the tips that we can use to help insure that we are being our own advocates with our health care providers. These tips will not only help us as the consumer but will also help the practitioner to provide us with the best care which is their goal.

Here are some tips to remember when going to your health care provider:

- 1. Try to arrive at least 15 minutes prior to your scheduled time. This allows for any issues that may need to be addressed during the check-in process. Due to scheduled appointments, some providers will need to reschedule your appointment if you are more that 15 minutes late.
- 2. If possible, try to complete any paperwork or on-line check-in prior to your appointment.
- 3. Remember to always have a photo id and insurances cards with you.
- 4. Have a current list of medications available for your provider. Most offices will review your medications at EACH visit.
- 5. If being seen for a new issue, try to have a list of when the symptoms started.
- If you have specific questions you would like to ask, have them written down or on your phone so that you remember exactly what you would like to ask.
- 7. If possible, it always helps to have someone accompany you. If new information is given, it helps to have two people listening. You can also ask the provider if the specific instructions will be included on your "after visit summary."

We are blessed to have numerous excellent healthcare institutions and providers in our area. If we work with our providers, we can be the "CEO of our Health!"

shifts, we are reminded of God's faithful hand over all of creation.



Let this autumn be a time to embrace God's steady rhythm, find beauty in change, and rest in His faithful promises that never cease—even as the world around us shifts.





Spirit-Led Summers at Bear Creek Camp

"I'm always struck by the simple but profound technologies that camp employs to build healthy, loving, Christ-centered community: silly songs and deep conversations, skits and games, shared meals and rituals." These words from Pastor Inge Williams of Friedens Lutheran in Shartlesville, a 2025 summer chaplain at Bear Creek Camp, reflect the deep joy and quiet transformation that unfold in the woods each season.

All Together was the theme this summer, focusing on growing stronger through love and service, grace-filled faith, and belonging and community. Pastor Inge witnessed this connection firsthand early in the summer



when she served as one of the camp chaplains during Family Camp. Pastor Inge shared, "On one of the first nights, I saw one of the former youth Synod Council representatives, now serving as a counselor this summer, give a high five to a toddler from Ireland who was running all over the field during a kickball game. The kindness and connection across ages, and even international borders, really exemplified what Family Camp is about."

While chapel time and worship services are typically led by the young adult summer staff, camp chaplains provide spiritual support throughout the week, leading devotions and Bible studies for campers and staff. They offer encouragement, listening ears, and join in the fun that camp has to offer. Throughout the summer, three Northeastern PA Synod pastors brought their time, energy, and Spirit-led presence to Bear Creek Camp as chaplains. Pastor Inge Williams and Pastor Jennifer Heavner of Star of Bethlehem Lutheran Church served during Family Camp, while Pastor Liz Koerner of St. John Lutheran in Stroudsburg closed out the season as chaplain during the final week.

The partnership with Bear Creek Camp, shared with the Southeastern PA Synod, is especially meaningful to our synod, as the values of camp and synod closely align. Both are deeply committed to building relationships and belonging across congregations, generations, and diverse communities. As synod, we continue to search for ways to raise leaders who serve with compassion, creativity, and courage in the church and the world, which is why our partnership with Bear Creek Camp is so important. It is prioritizing youth and allowing them space to search for ways to serve others as a natural response to God's love.

Serving others was the theme of one of Pastor Liz's Bible studies during her week as chaplain. When she met with the Junior campers (grades 2–4), she asked how they might take the ways they serve others at camp and apply them at home and in their school communities. Helping others at camp can seem second nature, especially after a full week of being together. However, campers are not only learning how to be kind to one another. They are learning life skills that will stay with them long after the week ends.

Throughout the week, they are learning how to be confident and independent through overnight tent camping experiences. They are learning about teamwork and communication as they encourage each other on high rope activities. They grow spiritually through the guidance of our chaplains, who are a daily presence within the camp schedule and help shape campers' understanding of faith and their connection to God.

We are extremely grateful for the passion and dedication of Pastor Inge, Pastor Jennifer, and Pastor Liz, who devoted their time this past summer,



and for the ongoing work of Bear Creek Camp as it builds inclusive community, nurtures faith, and develops leaders who carry their experiences into the world with empathy, joy, and purpose. This certainly could not be accomplished without the hardworking, compassionate summer staff and the leadership of Executive Director Collin Grooms, Program Director Kallie Handlong, and all the other camp leaders who contribute and put youth first.

Camp doesn't end when the summer does. In addition to summer camp, Bear Creek Camp offers retreats and camps outside of the summer timeframe including the upcoming Labor Day Family Camp, Fall Women's Retreat, and Winter Camp. The camp is also open to hosting congregations, committees, or organizational retreats through their facility rentals. All this information and more can be found at bearcreekcamp.org. All together, Bear Creek Camp and our synod continue to walk hand in hand, creating space for love, service, and faith to flourish in every season.

"Ohne Verdienst" part 2

Our ancestors eventually adopted the English language as the primary language for worship and preaching. This transition started all the way back in the 1740s when our ancestors began interacting with the English-speaking settlers of the Quaker colony called Penn's Woods, more commonly known as Pennsylvania. English was always the language of the wealthy and ruling class, especially as the original 13 colonies rebelled against King George III and wrote our nation's founding documents in English. Our German ancestors were divided in their allegiance: some remained loyal to the English Crown and others sided with the colonists. Zion's founding pastor, Rev. Henry Melchior Muhlenberg had to tread a very fine line in politics, eventually siding with the colonists because he thought that they would win. If he sided with the wrong side, perhaps our ancestors would have been sent back to Germany, or imprisoned, or some other less than ideal fate.

Muhlenberg started bilingual services in Trappe all the way back in the 18th century. He wanted Lutheran hymns, catechisms, and other Lutheran documents translated into English for the sake of the young people born in this country, but there's always been a resistance to progress in Lutheranism for some reason. Our ancestors were afraid that if you tried to translate Lutheran theology into English that you would lose something in translation. To some extent this is true.

Take for example the Reformation Day text from Romans. We read that God's grace is a free gift given to us by a gracious and loving God. This is still true. However, if you look at Luther's translation of Romans 3:24 you will not see the German word for 'gift.' Instead, Luther used the word 'Verdienst' which translates to 'merit.' Verse 24 reads: "und werden ohne Verdienst gerecht aus seiner Gnade durch die Erlösung, so durch Jesum Christum geschehen ist" (Translation: "and are justified without merit by his grace through the redemption that happened through Jesus Christ"), 'Ohne Verdienst' is the key phrase here. It means without merit. The old medieval system of penance assumed that after you confess your sin, you would receive absolution from the priest, and then the priest would assign you 'satisfaction' or 'penance'. Perhaps it would be as simple as reciting ten Hail Marys, or perhaps it was going on a pilgrimage to some sacred place. Whatever it was, our Christian ancestors believed that God's forgiveness required a contracted response on our part so that we would merit such grace. If we weren't truly sorry, or we lacked in keeping our end of the bargain, our salvation was in question. You can imagine how much of a revelation it was for Luther to be reading the original Greek text of Romans and coming to the insight that our salvation is "ohne Verdienst" (without our merit). Salvation happens through Christ alone. We don't earn or merit it. ...to be continued.
