

#### The Pastor's Corner – HOW AND WHERE WE GIVE

OH NO! IS THIS A STEWARDSHIP CONVERSATION? OK, Pastor. I'm putting this down and will get to it later. ACTUALLY, NO. It is NOT a stewardship Pastor's Corner.

It's about "Giving" - - it has to be. NO, it isn't. It is about how and where we give and what it means to give.

Are you still with me? OK – Let's go. We give extra fruit from our pear or apple tress to our friends and neighbors. We give those zucchini's that seem to sprout every day to whomever will take them. And those tomatoes that take all summer to ripen and then at the end of August and into September they multiply faster than the bunnies do. That is giving from abundance. We don't want them to go to waste. GREAT IDEA!

The bills come in the mail. Are we really giving to the electric company or the cable company, or the insurance company? No, I guess not. We receive something in return. That would be called an exchange.

What about the notice from the Lions or Rotary or Soroptimist club? Is that when you write a check to remain part of the organization? Did you take your dime, quarter or dollar to your scout, 4 H or youth group meeting for them to have enough to plan and offer a program for you to learn about what they promoted? Is that called dues? Yes, it is called dues.

When we put our giving/offering into our envelope and either mail it or bring it to the church, we call that our offering. Way back, I mean way back, like 70 or more years ago it might have been called dues. But it isn't dues. It is given freely. It is not required. There is no exchange we make. God has already given us the gift of eternal life. There is nothing we can do to buy it, purchase it, or earn it. It is in grateful thanksgiving of the gift God has provided to us that we offer what we have.

**The key word is offer.** That is why we call it offering, and it is why we bring our gifts humbly to the altar each Sunday. Our thoughts? "We offer with joy and thanksgiving what you have first given us – ourselves, our time and our possessions signs of your gracious love. Receive them for the sake of him who offered himself for us, Jesus Christ our Lord." (LBW)

#### FEED MY STARVING CHILDREN



On Saturday, October 11<sup>th</sup>, Carol Derr-Breinig, Melanie Dimowitz, Zack Dimowitz, Rosemary Lehman, Daisy Pearson, Ed Pearson, and Sandi Wagaman attended a workshop for Feed My Starving Children. It was held at Neffs UCC church. FMSC is a national organization that holds workshops all over the country to send food all over the world.

One meal contains vitamins, dried vegetables, soy, and rice in a plastic bag and all that has to be done is to add water.

After two hours of work, the four teams packed 76 boxes of meals. Each box contained 36 meals. Over the weekend there were six sessions of packing, one on Friday, four on Saturday, and one on Sunday. It was estimated that we would pack over 16,000 meals, enough to feed 44 children for an entire year.

It was fun and at the end, we got to shop at two countries Fair Trade markets.

# ALTAR GUILD, COMMUNION ASSISTANTS AND READERS ARE NEEDED



We are in need of people to help with the 10:30AM worship service – specifically Altar Guild, Communion Assistants, and Readers.

For Altar Guild, you would serve approximately every 6 weeks. Altar Guild is responsible for coming to church a half hour early and setting up the altar for communion – i.e. placing

the linens, wine, and grape juice on the altar, preparing the bread, and placing trays of communion cups in the sanctuary. At the end of service, Altar Guild removes everything from the altar, including fresh flower bouquets, waters them, washes the communion-ware and puts it away. You would be working with another Altar Guild member until comfortable.

As a Communion Assistant, you would serve approximately every 6 weeks. Communion Assistants assist during communion —usually pouring the grape juice while the lay assistant handles the wine.

As Reader, again, you would serve every 6 weeks by reading the lessons during the service. Readers are asked to move toward the mic during the last verse of the hymn, so they are already in place when it is time to read the lessons.

Currently, many of our lay assistants are serving triple duty and are scheduled multiple times a month - because there are not enough readers and communion assistants. Please consider helping out in one of these roles. Even if you can only volunteer at certain times of the year, the scheduler can work around and accommodate busy and varying schedules. Parish Code for hospitalized parishioners is 321. Please give this code when you are admitted to the hospital so the church can be made aware that you are a patient and can administer the pastoral care you require while you are hospitalized.

Please take note, that if you are admitted on a Thursday night, Friday, Saturday, or Sunday, the church will not be aware that you are hospitalized until Monday mid-morning, since the church does not have office hours on Friday, and the hospital pastoral care office is not available on Saturday or Sunday.

This means, if you would like the church to know you are hospitalized on the weekend, please call the church office and leave a message.

Why get vaccinated?

Influenza vaccine can prevent influenza (flu).

**Flu** is a contagious disease that spreads around the United States every year, usually between October and May. Anyone can get the flu, but it is more dangerous for some people. Infants and young children, people 65 years and older, pregnant women, and people with certain health conditions or a weakened immune system are at greatest risk of flu complications.

Pneumonia, bronchitis, sinus infections, and ear infections are examples of flu-related complications. If you have a medical condition, such as heart disease, cancer, or diabetes, flu can make it worse.

Flu can cause fever and chills, sore throat, muscle aches, fatigue, cough, headache, and runny or stuffy nose. Some people may have vomiting and diarrhea, though this is more common in children than adults.

In an average year, **thousands of people in the United States die from flu**, and many more are hospitalized. Flu vaccine prevents millions of illnesses and flu-related visits to the doctor each year.

#### Influenza vaccines

CDC recommends everyone 6 months and older get vaccinated every flu season. **Children 6 months through 8 years of age** may need 2 doses during a single flu season. **Everyone else** needs only 1 dose each flu season.

It takes about 2 weeks for protection to develop after vaccination.

There are many flu viruses, and they are always changing. Each year a new flu vaccine is made to protect against the influenza viruses believed to be likely to cause disease in the upcoming flu season. Even when the vaccine doesn't exactly match these viruses, it may still provide some protection. (continued on page 15)

Influenza vaccine does not cause flu.

Influenza vaccine may be given at the same time as other vaccines.

#### Talk with your health care provider

Tell your vaccination provider if the person getting the vaccine:

- Has had an allergic reaction after a previous dose of influenza vaccine, or has any severe, life-threatening allergies
- Has ever had Guillain-Barré Syndrome (also called "GBS")

In some cases, your health care provider may decide to postpone influenza vaccination until a future visit.

Influenza vaccine can be administered at any time during pregnancy. Women who are or will be pregnant during influenza season should receive inactivated influenza vaccine.

People with minor illnesses, such as a cold, may be vaccinated. People who are moderately or severely ill should usually wait until they recover before getting influenza vaccine.

Your health care provider can give you more information.

#### Risks of a vaccine reaction

- Soreness, redness, and swelling where the shot is given, fever, muscle aches, and headache can happen after influenza vaccination.
- There may be a very small increased risk of Guillain-Barré Syndrome (GBS) after inactivated influenza vaccine (the flu shot).

Young children who get the flu shot along with pneumococcal conjugate vaccine and/or DTaP vaccine at the same time might be slightly more likely to have a seizure caused by fever. Tell your health care provider if a child who is getting flu vaccine has ever had a seizure.

People sometimes faint after medical procedures, including vaccination. Tell your provider if you feel dizzy or have vision changes or ringing in the ears

# Do Justice, Love Kindness, Walk Humbly: The Work of the Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania

In a well-known scripture, the prophet Micah proclaims, "He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God?" (NRSV Micah 6:8) It has been pointed out that we Lutherans often are more comfortable loving justice and doing kindness; that is, we find satisfaction in feeding hungry people but shy away from calling out and addressing the root causes of hunger and poverty. For the past 46 years, Lutheran Advocacy Ministry in Pennsylvania (LAMPa) – funded in part by your mission support giving – has taken up the important, but daunting task of working to change systems that perpetuate inequity and injustice.

LAMPa's staff – Tracey DePasquale, Director, and Pastor Erin Jones, Communications and Advocacy Engagement Manager, joined this year by Hunger Advocacy Fellow, Daniella Garber – work with a Policy Council composed of representatives of

Pennsylvania's seven synods, the United Lutheran Seminary, and a synod bishop to develop a biennial Policy Agenda that guides our church's engagement with state legislators and departments in the governor's office.

The current Policy Agenda includes the following priorities:

- Hunger: improving access to healthy, affordable food;
- Creation Care: advocating for laws that protect clean air, water, and land;
- Poverty: addressing homelessness and housing insecurity;
- Education: working toward adequate and equitable school funding;
- Healthcare: working to ensure all Pennsylvanians have access to affordable care;
- Civil Rights: working to reduce hate crime and safeguard the right to vote;
- Immigration: standing for welcome to our newest neighbors; and
- Violence Reduction: addressing the root causes of violence, including trauma and extreme poverty.

The LAMPa staff and Policy Council pursue this ambitious agenda in several ways:

- By forming and participating in coalitions with leaders of other denominations, faith-based organizations, and community groups that are passionate about these same issues;
- By engaging with state legislators and those who work in the governor's office, regardless of party affiliation, to advance measures that benefit all Pennsylvanians;
- And, most important, by equipping and supporting the members of the 1,050 ELCA congregations in Pennsylvania so that each of us becomes more confident expressing our faith in the Good News of Jesus by becoming bold advocates for a just and compassionate

society. The widely used Bonhoeffer curriculum is just one example of this.



### "Ohne Verdienst" part 4

When our ancestors were converted to the Christian faith, we understood our relationship with God as being a contractual one. God provides for all our needs, and we respond with good deeds. Sin is a problem, because if good begets good, then evil begets evil. Every evil deed, every sin, has a consequence. Luther was terrified of God, because he never felt adequate in keeping up his end of the bargain. He saw himself falling short constantly. He felt an overwhelming debt to God for all of his sins, a debt that was crushing, and oppressive, and led him to despair. Then he discovered 'ohne Verdienst.' We cannot fulfill our end of the contract. We do not 'earn' or 'merit' our salvation. Only Christ can fulfill that contract for us, and like Tyr, Christ sacrificed himself for the good of others. But unlike Tyr, it cost Christ more than a hand, it cost his entire body and life.

This insight is our particular gift, as Lutherans, to the rest of the church. You need not speak German to benefit or understand it. People all over the world have received the good news of our salvation through Jesus Christ. In fact the Lutheran church is growing fastest these days in Africa where there are approximately more than 24 million Lutherans (that's more than 6 times as many Lutherans as there are in North America which has a little over 3 million Lutherans). Surprisingly, it is more likely to find a German speaking Lutheran in Africa than it is in the United States, which brings us back to the initial question: why did we cover up our back wall?...to be continued.


